TO SHUT PAUPERS OUT Money Qualification for Immigrants May Be Adopted by duty, an increase of \$10,000,000.

Ottawa, Sept. 15—The dominion government has under consideration a proposition to amend the regulations in regard to immigration so that all immigrants must have a certain amount of money in their possession before being allowed to land. Hitherto there has been no money qualification for entering Canada. There is in the United States. In this country it has always been regarded that an able bodied man willing to work and without a dollar in his pocket was as good an asset to the country as the man who had some cash but was not so particular about getting work. However to aid in solving the question of oriental immigration. W. D. Scott, has recommended that a money qualification be added to the regulations. This can be done under the act by the government passing an order in council.


