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WAS ORDERED TO DESTROY MACHINERY OF GERMAN LINER

Boston, Feb. 17.—Captain Charles A. Botack of the North German Lloyd steamship Kronprinzessin Cecilie testified today at a federal court hearing on a petition for the sale of the vessel that he had been ordered by a man connected in an official capacity with the German embassy, to disable its machinery.

This was done, he said, to prevent the use of the ship by the United States government in the event of hostilities with Germany. He refused to divulge the name of the man giving the orders.

THE FIG TING

Paris, Feb. 17.—Artillery duels in the sector of Maisons De Champagne are reported in this afternoon's official communiqué.

In the region of Eparges a German surprise attack was broken up by French.

After a spirited bombardment late yesterday, a French detachment penetrated the German salient at Ammerweiler (Alsace) and completely destroyed it. The enemy suffered appreciable losses.

On January 23 Captain Doumer brought down the fifth German airplane. Yesterday a French pilot destroyed a captive German balloon in the region of Marvaux.

Petrograd, Feb. 17.—At the war office today the following statement was given out: "Western front—Nothing remarkable. Snow is falling in the Carpathians."

"Romanian front—Military activity was limited to infantry firing and engagements among advanced detachments."

"Caucasian front—Heavy snowstorms are raging on the Black Sea. Outposts destroyed sixteen sailing schooners off the coast of Anatolia."

SHREWD BUSINESS MEN OF WALL STREET SEE GERMAN FINISH

(J. M. Robinson & Sons' Private Wire Telegram) New York, Feb. 17.—The conclusion beginning to be reached in many financial houses is that whether or not the United States becomes involved in the war, it will be but for a short time, owing to the fact that the Entente Allies are now fully prepared to move forward in a way that the German government, weakened in all directions by famine threatened, the Zeppelins a failure and the submarine bluff being called will be forced to surrender sometime during the present year or the complete economic ruin of the German Empire will soon thereafter result as a natural evolutionary condition.

These features are factors of speculative investment importance that should be carefully weighed in making new market commitments at present.

Bruges Attacked Again

London, Feb. 17.—"Naval airplanes dropped heavy bombs with good results on Ghent's airbase on Friday," says a British official announcement this afternoon.

"At the same time Bruges Harbor and shipping were again attacked. Bombs were observed exploding on objectives."

CHEERS FOR FLEMING

Premier Murray may as well bring Mr. J. K. Fleming out of his temporary concealment, and take him throughout the province to plead with him the cause of honesty and high ideals in public life.

"You have today those who go about this province scandalizing and abusing the Hon. J. K. Fleming. Not one of these men is fit to unlatch Mr. Fleming's shoes. He did more for the province in good and substantial work in one year than his abusers and the promoters of the past ever accomplished."

There is, in all his naked effrontery, has the province ever heard anything like it—with the possible exception of Premier Murray's eulogy of Fleming in the recent Carleton county by-election?

Why is this Fleming whose shoes the people are not fit to unlatch, and in whose presence, presumably, the people should take their own shoes from off their feet as if on holy ground?

He is the man who knew all about the \$71,000 hoolie fund taken from the lumber operators. He is the man who took "by compulsion," \$2,000 from a railway contractor. He is the man who had to resign the premiership in utter disgrace, but is still the guide and counselor of the men who betrayed their trust and whitewashed him.

The Hon. B. Frank Smith has taken off the mask. The government stands revealed as a Fleming government. The condemnation contained in the report of the royal commission falls on every man who upholds the Fleming conception of public duty and responsibility. The issue cannot be dodged by any government candidate. It is not a question of roads, or crown lands, or agricultural development, or the care of soldiers, or of immigration. It is a question of honor in public life. If the people fail to insist upon that they will give the grafters a new lease of life. Is it to be Fleming and dishonor, or Foster and good government, after Feb. 24?

ONLY ONE WEEK MORE

With one clear week for canvassing the electorate the opposition party stands today with strong candidates in every constituency. The government party, as it scanned the list developed an entirely new feeling of respect, mingled with fear, of its opponents. Its press has not altogether ceased to be abusive, but it has discovered that it cannot by abuse and sneers and ridicule dispose of the able and influential men who have responded to the call to join in bringing about a change of government. These strong men cannot be whittled down the wind as worthless chaff. For the very fact that they were today nominated proves that behind them is a great body of public opinion, and a widespread desire and determination to put an end to graft and dishonesty in the public life of New Brunswick.

There is a week of strenuous work ahead. The government has the advantage in organization and will not hesitate to spend money and use every influence, legitimate and otherwise, to gain a victory. The result rests with the people. If they feel that New Brunswick should do as Manitoba and British Columbia have done, there is not enough money or any other influence in existence to save the Fleming-Murray government.

DO YOUR BIT, GENTLEMEN

A great army of men who cannot go overseas will be able next Saturday to do their bit effectively by helping to rid the province of a government which has proved itself false to the principles for which the sons of New Brunswick overseas are fighting. Graft is an enemy, and the man who gives encouragement to the grafter is guilty of a crime against his country. No man will dispute the truth of this statement. Very well, let us make the application. Royal commissions in this province have exposed graft and the grafters, and next Saturday is the day of reckoning. What will people who have sons fighting the enemy overseas do with the enemy at home? The latter is entrenched in power and armed with patronage and other weapons well known to grafting politicians. **WINCHESTER ARMS PROFITS**

Munition Makers Earn \$26,441,075 in Gross Income in 1916

(New York Times.)

The Winchester Repeating Arms Company earned a gross income last year of \$26,441,075, a gain of \$4,181,090 over 1915. The annual statement yesterday showed that \$4,448,850 of this was saved as profit, a total \$20,242,225 less than the year before.

The report said that special business taken from August, 1914, to Dec. 31, 1916, exclusive of a contract for Enfield rifles which was amended recently, amounted to \$37,119,108. Of this amount, cancellations removed \$7,103,081, and at the end of the period \$30,016,027 remained to be completed. Deliveries were delayed and manufacturing costs greatly increased because of abnormal industrial conditions which affected the whole country.

Referring to the rifle contract with the British government, which was altered two months ago, the report said that the company would be reimbursed for expenses. The payment is to be made partly in cash and the balance in British treasury notes. Announcement of this plan appeared some time ago. Rifle contracts of the Midvale Steel and Ordnance Company were revamped in the same way at that time.

The number of directors was reduced from ten to nine yesterday. Henry Stoddard was elected and Henry Hoover and F. G. Drew retired.

**CHILDREN UNDER 15 AMONG DEPORTEES**

Belgian Laborers Arrested in Streets and Sent to Germany to Work

Have, Feb. 16.—The Belgian government says it has learned that laborers at Brno are being arrested in the streets by Germans and immediately sent to the German front along the Yser, where they are forced to do military work, such as putting up barbed wire fences and digging trenches.

It is asserted that 75 per cent of the men who were compelled to present themselves to the military authorities have been taken for work. These men are between the ages of 18 and 45. They leave their homes Monday and Saturday. On their arrival they are declared to be greatly depressed because of insufficient nourishment, which consists of a quarter of a loaf of war bread in the morning and fruit soup made of apples and prunes at noon. This is said to be all the men receive.

It is stated that no account is taken of certificates or affidavits given by employers. When employers make demands in behalf of employees the military authorities write them that they are disposed to return workers on condition that the employers designate two unemployed men for each employed workman liberated.

The situation, says the Belgian government, is no better in the rural districts, where all the sons of farmers are taken away in masses every Monday morning. All farms of 75 acres remain without hands for cultivation, and all complaints remain unheeded. Children of less than 15 years also are taken.

At Leffinghe, a youth of 16 was the eldest of his crew, which was composed of boys of fourteen and fifteen years of age. All these children live in the same sheds and suffering the same insufficiency of nourishment—a quarter of a loaf of bread, and soup each day.

IRON, STEEL AND METAL. In its summary of the iron, steel and machinery markets for the week ended Feb. 13, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following observations: "Although there has been no further development in the strained relations between the United States and Germany, the possibility of a war between these countries and its effect upon Canadian trade is still the main topic of discussion, particularly in manufacturing circles. Whether importations into Canada would be affected to any appreciable extent is a matter of conjecture. It is believed in some quarters that the situation would not be greatly changed. The severe weather has helped materially in further restricting the movement of cars on the railways and the situation is more acute than ever. In this district factories are closing down owing to shortage of coke, and for the same reason furnaces are operating at reduced capacity. This, in turn, is adversely affecting mill operations, resulting in reduced output of steel. In this respect the situation is particularly serious, as the production of munitions is liable to be affected unless conditions improve at an early date. Steel prices continue to rise, firm, advances in tubes, bolts and nuts having been registered during the week, while higher prices on other steel products may be looked for in the near future. On all raw material, the general trend of prices is upward, and this will be reflected in prices of finished goods. Prices of iron pipes are being well maintained, however, with advances in lead and antimony. The situation in the metal markets is generally quiet, with unsettled until the relations between the United States and Germany are definitely settled one way or another. Scrap prices are firm, with an upward tendency for most metals. Prices of machine tools continue to advance steadily. Business has, however, been quiet, although outlook is favorable.


