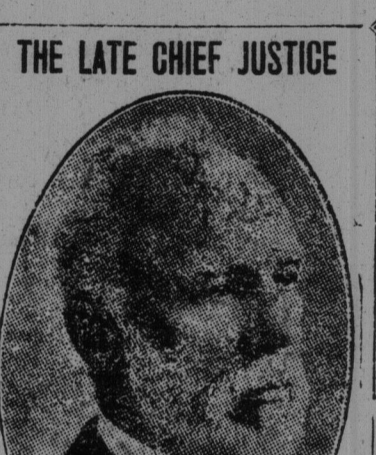
SEEK MISSING WILL OF WEALTHY MANUFACTURER

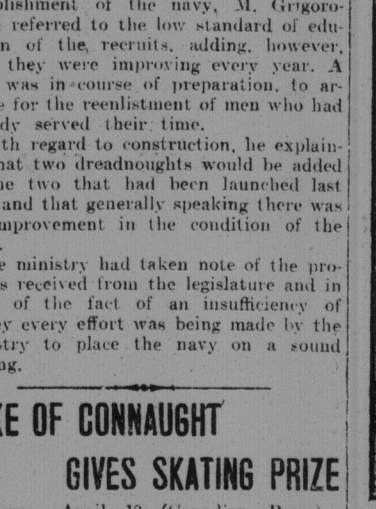

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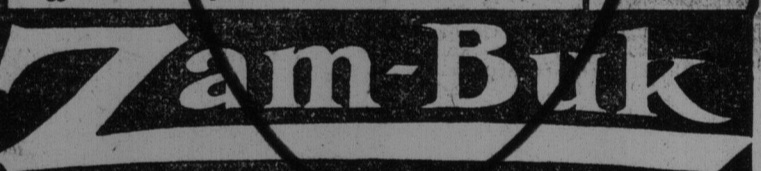

KNOW TOO LITTLE OF PROVINCE

(Continued from page 1)

... that built up the United States, it is British money that is building up the Argentine and many other foreign portions of the earth. I regret it—should come here.

Little Known of New Brunswick

It is a matter of amazement to me that so little has been heard of New Brunswick in England. We hear little enough of Nova Scotia but New Brunswick, well, it is blank silence. Why? Why should the English know so little of this beautiful country, with its splendid climate, its rich land, its magnificent scenery, its woods, its valleys, its streams, its hills, its good education, its social and religious advantages, its good government, and its sound, enlightened and thoroughly British people? I ask you, Mr. Chairman, why is this? Something is wrong.

As I reported to headquarters in a letter today little short of a fraud has been perpetrated on the people of Great Britain in keeping them in ignorance of this beautiful country and its manifold advantages. This is not the Canada of the American mind at home. This is not the land of eternal snow, of the monotonous and never-ending winter, of the dreary and uninteresting life, of all semblance to English ways; this is not even the charming but, far, far away British Columbia, this is another England better in many ways, more vigorous in climate, broader in outlook, and yet we know it not.

Mr. Chairman, there may be many reasons for this lamentable state of affairs. The dominant government, rightly, no doubt, have boomed the west, but unfortunately this has been at the expense of the east. The great cities, which have had no use for Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, except upon which to total their miles in the long haul of the settler westward, and every little shipping and booking agent throughout Great Britain has, perhaps naturally, advocated the west for settlers from motives not distinctly associated with the commissions drawn upon long journeys.

Those are some of the factors which have contributed to the present ignorance of this province, and, strangely enough, New Brunswick appears to have taken all its lying down. It may be that there are internal causes, domestic dissents, which have prevented you from inviting your fellow countrymen to come over and assist you in building up your great province. Well, if that is so, rise up and remove the cause. Do not let the province, dark, as a pigmy figure in the shadow of the colossal west. You have a great country, let us know it.

Possibilities for Moncton

Here in this very spot, in the city of Moncton, you have all the component parts with which to build a mighty city. You have your unequalled facilities, which are the Gibraltar, as it were, of the whole eastern transportation sea. You have your waterways, on which can be navigated vessels drawing up to thirty feet, you have your lumber lying all around you, your iron at Bathurst and other points, coal and coke at Sydney, limestone at St. John, and most of the best steel in the world. In addition to this, you now have what no other town in the east possesses, a practically mechanical plant, which can be used to carry on your manufacturing, to drive your machinery, to heat and light your workshops and your homes. What should now prevent you from progressing?

Being a stranger, it is true, that I perceive the advantage of your position a little more clearly than you who have grown accustomed to them by that dangerous friend of ours "familiarity" but to me it seems as clear as daylight. The two places that must rise, in order to be themselves, are Sydney and Moncton. There is a little town lying along the fertile marshes just across the provincial border that has risen from sheer grit, absolute perseverance and push, and is a credit to the whole dominion. I am certain that the same activities are present here in Moncton, and therefore you will advance. The future is all with you.

Sheep Raising

I have already spoken on what I consider the necessity for the province turning its attention to the raising of sheep. You have vast areas of the best possible land, and you should be able to raise some of the best sheep in the world. I understand that you are troubled with dogs, but surely you will not choose to rear sheep in preference to good sheep. Pending more drastic legislation, you have, under present acts, power to prescribe tincture of hulleys for this disease.

As I pass through your country, and am filled with admiration for your scenery, your climate, your dependents, your people; as I see mile after mile of good land lying idle, crying out, as it were, to the very heavens in mute appeal for cultivation, I am filled with a feeling that both depression and oppression. I will tell you why.

In London and all other great centres there are hundreds of thousands of good English people, dependents, the people who built up this empire, and yet these people now are shut in squalid streets, they are denied the freedom and air of the wide spaces of God's earth, they are shut off almost from the light of the sun, when they might be living a life of industry and freedom on the great undeveloped stretches of the empire.

Most of you men in Canada work hard; you have your struggles and your troubles; you labor with the labor of hope. The people I speak of have little or no hope. Now, that so many wide spaces of the world should be idle, should stand waiting for the tiller's hand, whilst millions of people should be clustered together in grimy centres is a great pity. Something must be wrong somewhere.

Advocates Colonies

I understand that Englishmen who settle here among the old inhabitants often become uncomfortable and unpopular owing to their ignorance of local conditions. I'm afraid that the ignorance is inevitable, and in order to counteract the unhappy condition I speak of, and also any feelings of homesickness, I have suggested to your government that they take steps to form small colonies. That is, to invite a number of settlers from one particular locality in the old country, who are all acquainted with one another, to come in and take up adjoining farms and so form a little community of their own. By this means I believe that they would live happily and successfully together, and soon add materially to the prosperity of the country. This scheme offers an excellent opportunity to an enterprising company who would take up large tracts of land and divide them into sections such as I speak of.

My last and most earnest word must be on the subject of Imperial federation. Ask, Mr. Chairman, that New Brunswick give this matter very earnest attention. It is a question far removed from any question of party politics, and is a matter which affects the destinies of us all. It is a time that we all joined hands in one great union, that Canada and all the other dominions were represented in a great Imperial parliament, and it is time that we had free trade within the empire.

FORTUNE FOR ST. JOHN GIRLS

Bath, Maine, April 18.—Miss Beatrice Alexander, a comely twenty-one year old waitress, has received word from her sister, Emily, aged twenty-two, that their uncle, Alfred Alexander, had recently died in Chelsea, Mass., leaving \$15,000 to be equally divided between them. The girls will leave the latter part of this week for Boston, to make arrangements for obtaining the money.

They are the daughters of Ezzar Alexander, of St. John, N. B., but for some years have made their home at Emily's Harbor and have been employed as waitresses in Bath and Brunswick.

Miss Alexander said last night: "I have known that my uncle intended to leave his money to us when he died, but I shall miss him much more than I welcome the money. I intend to help my father in St. John as long as he lives."

POLICEMAN CLARK FINED

Judge Ritchie Says Arrest of Wm. Waugh Was Unnecessary and Patrolman Assaulted Prisoner—Will be Appeal

A fine of \$20 or three months in jail was imposed by Judge Ritchie this morning on Policeman George H. Clark, on a charge of assaulting Wm. Waugh, of West St. John, while arresting him last week on a charge of drunkenness. S. Skinner appeared for Waugh, while Clark was defended by Recorder Baxter. The latter said that the fine would be paid into the court with the understanding that an appeal would be made.

In delivering judgment, His Honor said that it was questionable if an arrest had been necessary in this case. Waugh, according to the evidence, had been not far from home, and was proceeding in that direction. His Honor had his own opinion of any policeman who would arrest for drunkenness a man who was going peacefully towards home, but it was not necessary to give it then. There was no one more opposed to drunkenness than himself, but he did not think that a patrolman when making an arrest, particularly when no resistance was made, as had been testified in this case, should have to injure the person in custody. It was hard enough on the prisoner, himself, and to his mother, sisters, or other relatives, to be arrested for drunkenness, but when he is injured, it is doubly hard. His Honor ordered Waugh's deposit returned to him, and ordered him discharged on the charge of resistance.
