

Commissioner Wigmore said this morning that he was busy preparing plans and specifications for the water main renewals necessary this year and would present them to the council soon. He is also having plans prepared for a new leading main to the city which will do away with carrying the city water supply through Fernhill cemetery.

The biggest renewal job which he has in mind for this year, and the one which he considers the most important, he said, was the extension of the 16 inch main in Union street to Mecklenburg street, by way of Crown

Street. The main at present ends at the corner of Union and St. David and it is proposed to carry it from that point. The mains in Leinster, Princess, Duke, Orange and Mecklenburg street will be connected with the new main, which will replace a much smaller one, and will give the entire district a much better supply.

Wright, secretary, were also present.

Mr. Lewis was placed on the stand by Mr. Hayward and said that he had been forced to supply his own transformer when he wanted power for his mill and he contended this was unfair. He had always paid his bill under protest and in December 1922 the current had been cut off because he refused to pay a bill of \$165.70 which he contended was not due as the interest on the amount he had invested in the transformer amounted to more than that sum. ed to more than that sum.

TO BE CONSIDERED. At first the rate for power was 21-2 cents per kilowatt hour but later it was increased to four cents. He had applied at different times for current since it was shut off but had been refused until he paid \$165.70, which he contended was not due. which he contended was not due.

CHIEF INSPECTOR'S REPORT PRESENTED

447 Convictons Obtained During 1924, Says Hawthorne in Annual Resume

By D. LEO DOLAN FREDERICTON, April 22— Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, minister of health, during a discussion on the estimates in the House this afternoon announced that a bequest of between \$100,000 and \$150,000 would be made to the Jordan Memorial Sanitorium at River Glade, from

the Jordan Estate. the Jordan Estate.

The Minister of Health was giving the House certain information relative to the operation of the Sanitorium and added that certain capital expenditures were proposed for the institution which would cost in the vicnity of \$60,000. The province is to issue bonds for this amount and the interest on the Jordan Estate bequest would thus take care of the indebtedness resulting from the expenditure.

TWO ITEMS STAND OVER Today the House passed all of the 1925 estimates, with the exception of two items, one for \$50,000 covering salaries and wages at the Provincial Hospital, and the other of \$9,990, being grants to various exhibitions in the province. The House did not have sufficient information as to the details of the vote for the Provincial Hospital, while Premier Veniot decided to lay over the exhibitions vote to enable the members to debate this question at another sitting of the House.

FEW QUERIES FIRED

As was the case yesterday the various items in the estimates passed the House today with little or no acrimonious discussion. There was a brief debate on the vote for road patrol survices and during the afternoon various members of the Opposition, as well as supporters of the Progressives in the House fired queries at the Premier, as to the results which have accrued from this service.

this service.

S. J. Murlock, M.L.A. for Carleton, and member of the Farmers' group, was perhaps the most persistent critic during the afternoon, his greatest complaint being that too much attention is being paid the trunk roads, while the branch roads, those mostly used by the farmers were not being given the consideration due them.

CENSURES SUPERVISOR

Mr. Stekart, of Restigouche, criticized the work of one of the supervisors in that county and claimed the patrol men had not spent any appreciable length of time on the secondary

Mr. Dickson, of Kent, also declared the patrol work in his county was un-satisfactory and that the expenditure for the work done was too great.

CALLS N. B. COSTS LOWEST

Premier Veniot made a lengthy reply to these criticisms and quoted figures to show thata whereas the cost of patrol services in New Brunswick of patrol services in New Brunswicks was \$150 per mile, in Quebec the cost was \$265, in Nova Scotia \$225 and in Maine \$250. He pointed out that the farmers did use the main trunk roads to a great extent and quoted further figures to show the expenditures on the branch roads were \$374,000 from the automobile tax fund, and \$201,000 per of ordinary revenue; in addition to out of ordinary revenue, in addition to \$98,000 in road taxes. A total of \$668,000, while on the main trunk roads the expenditure had been \$405,000. The Premier pointed out that the people of

Saint John contributed one-fourth at the automobile fees and so far as the roads were concerned received no benefit from the expenditure, except when out in the country in their cars.

Premier Veniut tonight tabled the annual report of John B. Hawthorne, chief inspector under the intoxicating Chief Inspector Hawthorne also re-fers to the prevalence of smuggling and declares that liquor is landed on the coast and eventually finds its way to the bootlegger. He characterizes the bootlegger as a tremendous problem, but adds that the men on his stac are doing their utmost to cope with the smugglers and, in many instances, have been most successful.

TAKEN BY DOMINION.

During the past year contraband goods, totalling many thousands of dollars in value, had been captured by his men. However, these goods were in turn taken from them by the federal officers "after we had gone to the expense and work of making the seizures. In the future all such seizures are to go to the New Brunswick Liquor Commission on the payment of the duties to the federal government. This will doubtless be more of an incentive for my men to keep everlastingly after the smuggler," he says.

NOT TRUTHFUL, HE SAYS.

In closing the report the chief inspector says that much of the criticism of the licensees of the province are not based upon truth.

"I frankly admit," he says, "that there are some holders of retail licenses who have not adhered strictly to the conditions under which their licenses were granted. In these cases, when I have been able to secure the proof, information was laid against the offender formation was laid against the offender and punishment meted out in large doses. I have frequently been criti-cized for not cancelling the licenses of such offenders. I most assuredly would

"The fact is, and but few know it, the chief inspector has no authority to cancel a retail license. That power lies with the magistrate hearing the case and, in my own defence, I must report to you that in a few cases where I requested the license be cancelled the magistrate refused to act on that request."


Honduran Government Soldiers Replace U. S. Landing Force at Ceiba.






