The Conference prayer-meeting was opened in the Methodist Church, in the town of Port Hope, on Friday, June 3rd, at 9 a.m., conducted by the President, Rev. O. R. LAMBLY, M.A. It was a season of rich spiritual blessing.

OBITUARIES.

REV. HIRAM WILLIAMS.

Rev. Hiram Williams was born in Prince Edward County on May 30th, 1821. His father died while he was yet a boy. At twenty years of age he was converted to God through the ministry of Rev. James Gardiner, D.C.L. His conversion was clear and scriptural, God's spirit bearing witness with his, that he had passed from death unto life. His zeal and gifts were recognized by the Church, and he found a joy in striving to lead others to Christ. In 1844, he was sent by Dr. Gardiner as supply to the Matilda Circuit. This beginning of itinerant labor was followed by a life-long consecration to the work of preaching the Gospel. He was admitted on trial in 1845, ordained a deacon in 1847, and an elder in 1849. For five years prior to Methodist union he filled the office of Presiding Elder; he was useful in his work and beloved by his brethren. In the regular work of the ministry his fields of labor were often wide and difficult. He travelled through the entire territory of the Bay of Quinte Conference—from Durham to Renfrew—and wherever he labored souls were saved, and the cause of God built up. As a true shepherd he led the flock; they trustingly followed. His sermons were orthodox and full of manly thought. He served in unselfish devotion, combining gentleness, strength and courtesy. He well deserves but needs not our eulogy. He rests from his labors and his works follow him. He finished his course in the seventy-first year of his age, and the forty-seventh of his ministry on August 3rd, 1891. The disease which ended in death had troubled him for several years, but he bore the ills of life patiently, and kept the faith with reliance on the grace of Jesus Christ. He had many friends and they sadly miss him, but their consolation is "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord." On the day of his funeral a memorial service was held in the Tabernacle, Belleville, conducted by Rev. James Gardiner, D.C.L., assisted by Revs. T. J. Edmison, B.A., B.D., W. Bird, A. Campbell, J. Faull, W. G. Hudgins, G. J. Dingman, D. O. Crossley, and Rev. Mr. Barnes, of the Reformed Episcopal Church, after which all that was mortal was laid in the grave to sleep until the resurrection morning. May we meet him on the other shore.

REV. EZRA A. ORSER.

Rev. Ezra A. Orser was born in the county of Prince Edward, near the town of Picton, February 12th, 1819. He came of the U. E. Loyalist stock, who were amongst the first Methodists in the Bay of Quinte District. He was converted very early in life. After serving as a local preacher for some years, he entered the work of the ministry of the late M. E. Church at the Conference held at Farmersville (now Athens), September 4th, 1844. After thirty years in the active work of the ministry, he was forced by infirmity to ask for superannuation. In his retirement he continued to serve the Church as he had opportunity and strength. He had charge of the following circuits:—Brighton, Wolfe Island, Milford, Camden, Stirling, Matilda, Melville, Lyn, Easton's Corners, Elgin, Gananoque, Tamworth, Kingston, etc. Many seals to his ministry were given to him on all his charges. To his family he has left the memory of a blameless and useful life. Suddenly the call to reward came, and he entered into rest April 1st, 1892, at Kingston, aged seventy-three years and one month.

REV. DUNNING IDLE.

Another heart has ceased to beat. The lips of another messenger of mercy have been sealed. Another ambassador for God has been stayed in his embassy. Another voice is hushed, and another watchman on the Walls of Zion has been called from the duties of life to the rest and reward of heaven. Brother Idle was born in Yorkshire, England, on the 7th day of May, 1845. He came to Canada with his parents when he was twelve years of age, and at the age of sixteen he was led to Christ, largely through the influence of a devoted Christian mother, who for many years was a local preacher in connection with the Primitive Methodist Church. Up to that time he had enjoyed but few educational advantages; but being of a studious disposition, he read such theological works as he could obtain, and became an effective local preacher. At the age of twenty he was sent to supply on the Artemesia and Sullivan Mission. He was received on trial the following year, and labored successfully on the following Circuits:—Bradford, Walsingham, Woodham, McGillivray, Etobicoke, Palgrave, Temperanceville, East Toronto and Goodwood. Brother Idle was an earnest worker, and his preaching was practical and useful in building up the Church of God. He was married to Miss Wellwood, who was a helpmate indeed, and who, with three daughters is left to mourn the loss of a loving husband and devoted father. During the last four weeks of his life he was engaged in a special meeting where upwards of eighty persons professed conversion. Then he was stricken down, and at the end of eight days "He was not, for God took him." As the end drew near he said to his brother-in-law (Rev. N. Wellwood), "I know not what the outcome of this illness may be, but I am not anxious about that, it will be all right whether I live or die. I should like to live and work a little longer, but if it is God's will to take me home now, this is a glorious way to finish up." His last conscious hours were spent in arranging the affairs of his Circuit. He almost ceased at once to work and live. His remains were taken to Uxbridge for interment. His Chairman, Rev. Joseph Young, preached the funeral sermon. On the resurrection morning we shall meet again; till then, farewell.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Treasurer for the Year ending July 31st, 1891, as adopted by the Board.

We beg herewith to submit the Annual Statement of the Superannuation Fund:—

The affairs of the Fund occupied the earnest consideration of the General Conference, which body appointed a commission, consisting of ministers and laymen, representing different shades of opinion, to take the whole question into consideration, and report to the next General Conference.

The commission has met, and appointed sub-committees to collect information from a great variety of sources, and present it in tabulated form. Important beneficial results may be expected from the thorough and impartial examination of the whole question.

The amount raised from Circuits has exceeded that of the previous year by \$1,862.04. It is, however, just to state that a small portion of this increase arises from back payments on account of former years. The Interest Account is also in advance of the former year, \$1,249.37, and the Book Room has added \$200 to the grant of the preceding year, making the yearly grant now \$6,500.

We have received in legacies this year \$6,437.25, which sum embraces the half of the legacy of the late William Gooderham. There appears to be a praiseworthy disposition on the part of our people to remember this Fund in the final distribution of their property.

We are, however, still under the necessity of expressing our regret that there are a few Circuits that have failed to pay their apportionments in full, to the great embarrassment of the ministers laboring on them, and to the great injury of the Church. The aggregate amount is not comparatively very large, but the example is bad and it is not just to those Conferences and Circuits that are loyal to the laws of the Church.

The new claims this year are exceptionally large and amount to \$9,630, while expired claims are only \$5,848, leaving a balance of \$3,782, less \$382, being the difference between the debt of the last year and the present one, or \$3,400 to be provided for, the entire claims for the year being \$87,084. The estimated income of the Fund will be about \$85,534, so far as we can at present ascertain. The Treasurers did not, however, feel at liberty to increase the percentage on the assessable income.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

The Committee on Temperance beg to report, That in accordance with a memorial from the Cobourg District, we recommend, that whereas it is now almost universally admitted that the habit of using intoxicating liquors, as a beverage, is the greatest evil with which our country is cursed, and believing it to be a great wrong for a Christian country to license the manufacture and sale of such drinks ; and believing it to be the duty of the State to prohibit everything that has a tendency to demoralize and degrade the subject ; and believing it to be the duty of the Christian Church to do all in its power to bring about the prompt and total prohibition of this great evil, the liquor traffic ; therefore,

Resolved,—1. That steps be taken to form a Prohibition League, to be composed of electors who are willing to make prohibition the first and leading question of the day, and to subordinate all other questions thereto.

2. That the members of the said League be bound with the following pledge :—We, the undersigned electors of the county of , do solemnly pledge our sacred honor, in the presence of God and these witnesses, that henceforth we will do all in our power, by our vote and influence, to oppose any Government, Provincial or Dominion, who will not make the prompt and total prohibition of the liquor traffic a leading principle of their government, and honestly enforce the same, in so far as our Constitution will permit. We furthermore pledge ourselves to support, by our vote and influence, any Government, Provincial or Dominion, which will adopt our principles, as long as they honestly carry out or enforce the same.

3. That the officers of the League be, a President, Secretary, Treasurer, with additional canvassers for members.

4. That all our ministers be respectfully requested to have this report read, either to the congregations or at the Quarterly Official Meeting, or at such other occasion as they may deem best ; in the hope, that the people may be induced to take action accordingly—it being understood that such action may be taken conjointly with such other Churches and Temperance organizations as may be found willing to co-operate in this great work.

Your Committee recommend compliance with the request of the Dominion Alliance for the suppression of the liquor traffic, to appoint four delegates from this Conference to attend the Annual Meeting of the Council of the Alliance for 1892, to be held in the City of Montreal in September next, it being understood that such appointment of delegates will not entail any expense on this Conference.

Your Committee recommend that, whereas the appalling evils of the opium trade are continually becoming more manifest, inflicting untold evils on millions of our race, in China, India and other places, and whereas the great empire of which our Dominion forms a part, occupies the position of, perhaps, the mightiest force in sustaining and perpetuating this stupendous iniquity and curse; and whereas the conscience of the Christian people in England is awaking to the duty of freedom from and extinction of this hideous and terrible evil; and the sympathy, moral support, and prayers of the followers of Jesus in all parts of the empire are sought for guidance and success in the rectification of this great wrong.

Therefore we pledge our moral support, earnest sympathy and prayers to secure the abolition of the enactments authorizing the terrible opium curse.

Your Committee beg to call attention to the widely prevalent and, we fear, increasing abomination of tobacco smoking and chewing. Thousands of families in our goodly land are suffering for want of food and clothing, while the money, that should be used to meet those wants, goes up in tobacco smoke, polluting God's pure air by its stench. Thirty millions are annually spent in this Dominion in this traffic; fifty millions in the liquor trade.

Six hundred millions spent in the United States on tobacco, and nine hundred millions on strong drink! We stand aghast as we contemplate the enormous sum of nine hundred and fifty millions of dollars spent in the vile liquor drinking in these two countries, while the Church of Christ is in need of the money thus uselessly and injuriously spent. But who will undertake to define, in the sight of God, between drinking up the Lord's property to satisfy the cravings of an acquired and debased appetite, and burning and chewing up six hundred and thirty millions of dollars' worth at the demand of a similarly acquired, unclean and perverted craving.

Now that the Government of this Province has been led to regard tobacco as an evil of such magnitude as to legislate for limiting its pernicious effects, by curtailing its use among the youth of the country, such legislative action should be a voice, loudly reminding us of the duty of the Church of Christ to guide the people into all purity, by teaching and by example; therefore,

Resolved,—1. That we as a Conference cannot give countenance to a custom which forbids a man's entrance into the ministry in this body, and permits the men who stop him to perpetuate its use.

2. That it is a bad traffic, carried on as a commercial enterprise to make gain; does no good to any, but much harm in many ways, and ought to be discouraged by precept and example in the pulpit, the Sabbath Schools, and every other organization.

REPORT OF SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

We, the members of the Annual Conference Sabbath School Committee, beg to report as follows :—

Number of schools, 534; increase, 53. Officers and teachers, 4,391; decrease, 22. Scholars, 35,537; increase, 790. Conversions, 1,795; increase, 239. Members of Church, 7,796; decrease, 364. Learning catechism, 3,944; increase, 405. Pledged to total abstinence, 8,214; increase, 90. Volumes in libraries, 33,328; decrease, 2,807. Contributions to Missions, \$2,334.67; increase, \$467.29. Raised for School purposes, \$16,975.98; decrease, \$99.08. Sabbath School Aid and Extension, \$332.28; decrease, \$28.07. Teachers' meetings held, 43; decrease, 22. Schools open during whole year, 293; increase, 22.

The attention of your Committee has been called to the fact that some of our schools are not governed according to the principles of our economy, and therefore requests Superintendents of Circuits to have all our schools organized and governed according to the constitution laid down in the Discipline.

As only about one-half of the schools are kept open during the whole year, pastors will see the necessity of giving this part of their work special attention.

The spiritual results are gratifying, there having been 1,795 conversions during the year.

We would urge upon our teachers and officers the importance of holding weekly meetings for the study of the lessons, as at present only about twelve per cent. of the schools hold such meetings; we also think it advisable to ask our Sabbath School workers to give attention to the Home Department and Normal Bible training along the line indicated by the Provincial Sabbath School Association.

The periodicals issued by our Publishing House being surpassed by none, we ask our workers universally to adopt our own literature.

Your Committee would urge the introduction and study of our Catechism into all our schools, the report showing that only about eleven per cent. now do so.

We also recommend that all officers and teachers for example sake abstain from the use of tobacco in any form, and that the pledge found in the Discipline be presented for signature in each school.

There was raised for School purposes last year nearly \$17,000; for Missions, nearly \$2,500; but there is great need of improvement in the amount raised for the Sabbath School Aid and Extension Fund.

We in conclusion recommend that the Rev. J. J. Rae be re-appointed Secretary-Treasurer for the ensuing year, and that he be Conference delegate to the Provincial S. S. Convention; also, that all schedules be called for by the Secretary at the opening of Conference, so that the report for next year may be presented on the second day of Conference, and that an order of business be reserved for that purpose.

We recommend further that there be a children's day, and that so far as practicable, it be held on the first Sabbath in September.

The number of Epworth Leagues has increased from 60 to 98; the membership from 2,782 to 4,436, and \$2,808.46 has been raised for the support of these societies, while the evident increased interests taken in this department of our Church work is very gratifying.

Your Committee regret that they have not had a full report of the extent of this work before them, inasmuch as only those societies having the name of Epworth League can report. In order to avoid this difficulty in the future your Committee would urge on all our Young People's Societies to adopt the recommendation of the Provincial Organization of Methodist Young People's Societies, viz., that all such societies adopt the name of Epworth League of Christian Endeavor, and we would urge our young people that they should ever keep in the foreground the fact that these societies are distinctly religious.

REPORT OF MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to report:

1. That having heard the explanation of the Treasurer of the Superannuation Fund in reference to the memorial from the Uxbridge District, we are satisfied with the same, and we are pleased to learn that the total deficiency on this fund does not exceed \$400 from all the Conferences. This Committee would recommend that a list of all delinquents be kept for reference at any time, and that all possible pressure be brought to bear to prevent any such from occurring in the future; and if there be any such arrears, that each Conference be responsible for its own deficiency, and that such deficiency be distributed over the taxation of the Conference so in arrears, and not be taken out of the balance.

2. That the memorial from the Campbellford District *re* payment of taxes on parsonage property on domestic missions be referred to the General Board of Missions.

3. In the report of the Prison Reform Association, a copy of which has been placed before us, we are pleased to note: A conference was held in the city of Toronto, in the counsels of which our delegate, Rev. C. W. Watch, took a useful part. Important features, such as classification of prisoners, commitment of children charged with first offences, evangelistic and religious instruction work, were carefully studied. We heartily approve of the objects and aims of the Association, and rejoice in the growth of interest thus far apparent. We recommend the appointment of Rev. C. W. Watch and E. T. Crowle, Ph.D., as our representatives to any convention that may be held this year in this behalf.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE WORK.

In reviewing the work of the Conference for the past year, we feel thankful to the great Head of the Church for the success which has attended the different departments of our Church work. The increase in the income of the General Missionary Fund indicates the growing interest which is felt for this leading enterprise of our Church, and we likewise congratulate the Woman's Missionary Society in a similar advance.

Your Committee are also thankful to report a marked increase in the number of our Sabbath Schools, and also in the number of periodicals taken; and whilst they have been procured largely from our own Publishing House, we would take the opportunity of testifying to their superiority over those of foreign publication. We regret to find that whilst some districts report a considerable increase of membership, the great falling off of others leaves—after taking into account the inaccuracies of the previous year—but the nominal increase of some 30, and whilst this may be largely accounted for by the great number of removals, at the same time it should lead us seriously to enquire whether or not all our Church agencies have been so employed as to bring about the best possible results.

The interest which is taken in our Epworth League societies as manifested in many parts of our Conference, is very gratifying, and we would earnestly recommend the organization of Leagues throughout the bounds of our Conference, believing it to be an important auxiliary of our Church work, and meeting a long felt want, by which the young people of our societies may be kept in sympathy and association with the Church of their fathers.

Your Committee, in considering the memorial from the Peterboro' District, recommend, 1st, that at least one evening of the Conference be devoted to evangelistic work, and that said evangelistic service be held on Saturday evening; and 2nd, that when the state of the work is before the annual District Meeting, some facts be embodied in a resolution and forwarded to the Conference for the consideration of the Conference Committee.

Your Committee recommend that this Conference heartily and prayerfully support every clause in Mr. John Charlton's Bill, now before the Parliament, entitled, "An Act for the Better Observance of the Lord's Day."

And your Committee also recommend that while we appreciate the efforts of petitioners in their desire to close the Canadian section of the Columbian Exposition, at Chicago, in 1893, on the Lord's day, we also approve of the suggestion of the Picton District, and urge that a memorial under signature of this Conference be forwarded to the House of Commons, joining in the prayer that the Canadian section be closed on the Lord's day.

We also ask the Conference to urge our ministers to read, enlarge and emphasize the above from all our pulpits.

3. A Conference composed of the present Guelph Conference and the following districts from the present Toronto Conference, namely: Toronto

West, Brampton, Orangeville, Parry Sound, and Algoma; and from the Niagara Conference the Milton District except Waterdown and Millgrove Circuits.

4. A Conference composed of the present London and Niagara Conferences, but excluding the Milton District, with the exception of the Waterdown and Millgrove Circuits.

The Rev. W. P. Dyer, M.A., presented the report of Albert College. The College has had a year of unprecedented prosperity, both as regards the number of students in attendance and the results of the

scholastic work of the year. Increased accommodation is required if its work is to be done up to its full measure. The College is doing more to-day than at any previous time in its history, in the education of our ministry and in the supply of students to Victoria University.

Principal Dyer made a strong appeal in the interests of the debt on the College. He stated that the present debt amounted to \$31,425, of which about \$8,000 is covered by subscriptions. This burden must be relieved or the very existence of the institution is imperilled.

The general average has been the best in the history of the School. The religious interest has been well sustained; a flourishing Y. W. C. A. is organized, and is doing a good work. It was

Resolved,—That the very gratifying report of Alma Ladies' College, St. Thomas, be received. We desire to record our gratitude to God for His kind care of this valuable institution, and all its interests. We rejoice in the great success which has attended the College during another year. We pledge our sympathy and co-operation with the officers of the College to make its patronages and work a still greater success. We heartily appreciate the fidelity and diligence of Principal Austin, and his assistant, Professor Warner, as well as that of the whole of the professors and teachers. We beg to assure Principal Austin and his staff of the loyalty of this Conference to the institutions of our Church, and of our continued remembrance of Alma College.

The report of the Wesleyan Ladies' College, Hamilton, was read by the Secretary.

This institution, which has been doing a grand work for thirty-two years, during which time over 300 young ladies have graduated, still reports increased prosperity. The number of students registered this year is 140. The work in the College is all conducted on Christian lines, and no lady can graduate without an intelligent idea of Biblical history.

Resolved,—That we have heard with pleasure the Annual Report of the Wesleyan Ladies' College, Hamilton. We rejoice to see the signs of a growing public appreciation of the importance of these ladies' colleges, as evinced by the constantly increasing patronage they receive, and we believe their prosperity means benefits great and lasting to all who are

reached thereby. We heartily recommend the Wesleyan Ladies' College, Hamilton, to the confidence of the people of our Church.

The Report of Ontario Ladies' College was read by the Secretary.

The institution reports increased success and devotion to its educational work. Its students have been remarkably successful during the past year. The College is fully equipped in the various departments, and all are in a prosperous condition. It was

THE PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE TO THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHERN,—Assembled once again in our Annual Conference, our thoughts turn to you with prayerful and affectionate solicitude. Our temporary separation seems to enhance the strength and tenderness of the bond which unites us as pastors and people. You are ever in our hearts, but never more so than when we meet in council to review the labors of another year, and lay again our plans for a fresh assault upon the kingdom of darkness. It was with a becoming sense of responsibility that we entered on our duties, but this would have been much more oppressive had we not felt that we had your sympathy and prayers. Throughout our sessions we have been consciously under the guiding hand of our Divine Founder and perpetual President—the Lord Jesus Christ.

The devotional exercises have been times of refreshing, while the business has been transacted with efficiency and despatch.

The review of the year, as furnished by the district returns, awakens gratitude to Almighty God. We have not labored in vain nor spent our strength for naught.

On the other hand there is enough to remind us of our short-comings, and to humble us before God. We mourn that our success is not greater. With so many workers in the vineyard, and with all our resources and opportunities, we might reasonably look for greater results. We, your ministers, are willing to bear our own share of responsibility for this partial failure. We are all agreed that the divinely elected agency for the salvation of men is the preaching of the Word; at the same time you will bear with us while we remind you that success in preaching does not altogether depend on those who preach, even when they preach "in demonstration of the Spirit," but that success, to a very great extent, depends upon the kind of hearing the Word preached receives. "He that hath ears to hear let him hear."

We bespeak anew for the institutions of our Church your intelligent and liberal support. And foremost among these is the great cause of missions. We have been a missionary people from the beginning. The missionary spirit has propagated the system called Methodism. Without this spirit we had ere this become an extinct people. Through grace we have listened lovingly and attentively to the farewell words of our ascending Head. We have felt that to us, as certainly as to those who saw Him go up, is entrusted the great commission conveyed in the words: "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

"These words into our hearing fall
More deep than ocean's roar;
No lapse of time can drown their call,
They sound for evermore."

And because we have loved to carry out this last command He has never ceased to fulfil His good word to us: "Lo, I am with you alway." Feed then the holy fire of missionary zeal, for a decline of this spirit would mean a decline of life throughout all our organizations. Let it still be seen that we are a people zealous for the spreading of the Redeemer's kingdom.

Near to our hearts lies the weighty charge of the spiritual nurturing and guidance of the young. If, as we are told, there is committed to us in our

Sabbath schools throughout the Connexion, a greater number of scholars than the aggregate number in the Sabbath schools of all the other Protestant bodies in this country, it must follow that the religious well-being—the well-being in every respect—of this country for the future must largely depend upon the fidelity of the Methodist Church to this stupendous trust.

We have observed with exceeding pain in some of our Sabbath schools the almost total absence of "The Volume of the Book," a tiny leaflet being the trifling substitute in the hands of scholars. There are certain well recognized places of honor and influence where the Bible should be always found, and, without controversy, one of these places is the school of the church. Let us seek to attach every scholar to the Book itself, and to make him familiar with its component parts by placing in his hand the Sacred Volume unabridged. Another matter of first importance in connection with the religious training of the young is the earnest and persistent use of our Catechisms throughout all our schools. There can be no substitute for these little books; in regard to the indoctrination of our youth they are all in all. We deeply regret the disuse into which these invaluable productions of pious and learned minds have fallen, and earnestly call upon parents and Sabbath school workers to use their influence in securing a general revival of their use. We regret also the invasion of our Sabbath schools by papers bearing a foreign stamp. In two particulars, mainly, these papers fail to serve us: they tend not in the least to make our children either good Methodists or good Canadians, being issued for a constituency outside the boundaries of this Dominion and of this Church. But in the two particulars mentioned the papers issued by our own Book Room are steadily faithful. It is still a grief to us to know that many of our adult scholars slip out of our Sunday schools to be seen no more except in the general congregation, and when seen there are without any vital Church connection. How shall we keep them under our pastoral care? How shall we secure them for Christ? We are advised, sometimes, to make religion attractive to them. But, if we understand that phrase, it means to endeavor to decoy them into some sort of visible Church connection under false pretences. It means that the Church make concessions to their worldly tastes. But even if those for whom the bait is spread should take it, would they not know it as a bait, and despise us for offering it? Do they not know, as well as we, that the suppression written large over the door into the kingdom of heaven is: "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me." No, it is in vain we try to conciliate the carnal mind. Rather than make indistinct the clear, sharp line that divides the Church from the world, we prefer to tell them that though they are born Methodists and heirs to all the privileges of the Methodist Church, that in order to be Christians they, verily, must be born again. And only then, indeed, will they be our children in the highest sense.

We thankfully note the hand of Providence in our educational affairs, particularly in bringing to a successful issue the vexed question which involved the life of Victoria University. We invite you to rejoice with us that the chief educational establishment of Methodism is rearing its head grandly and conspicuously in the commercial centre of the Province, making a new start upon its useful career with a better promise to brighten its hopes than ever dawned upon it in the past.

The great cause of Temperance continues to engage our best attention. The statistics which show to some extent the evils of the nefarious traffic in strong drink are still portentous; while a broad stream of evil consequences flows from it which defy the powers of the actuary, and are never gathered up into figures. It is well that Temperance workers are united at last in contemplating but one measure of legislation for the suppression of the trade. It is well that at last all half measures are put out of mind; for it is better to labor longer, if needs be, and then secure a general prohibitory law, than to labor for a shorter space and secure only such legislation as would necessitate an indefinite continuation

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of the struggle. In addressing to you these observations we address you as citizens, and would remind each voter of what he owes to his conscience, to his country and to his God when he goes to the ballot box to fulfil the duty of citizenship there. He who casts his vote for an aspirant to public office who will not pledge his word to use his influence to put away the reproach and curse and shame of this vile trade, the enemy of every other trade and of every form of religion, accepts responsibility for all the consequences flowing from it. But addressing you as members of the Methodist Church, we say that our safe and wise course in the behalf of Temperance lies along the straight road of moral suasion. There is no need that as a Church we should enter the political arena in this or any other struggle. We are non-political. Adhering to our historical attitude in this respect, we shall exert all the more influence in not only helping to bring to a happy issue this righteous war upon our country's greatest foe, but in helping to bring to a happy issue every other question involving the moral and religious welfare of the people. What is meant here is that we should refrain as a Church from dabbling constantly, as if we were a political body, in the current business of legislatures, and keep ourselves more strongly to our more legitimate calling of creating a proper conscience on all matters of morality in our people. Not that it would be wrong for us, on a great question like this, when the set time is come, using our whole strength to aid in carrying a prohibitory law.

The foundation of society is the family. As is the average family so is the nation. We are on every account then deeply concerned that the homes of our people should be made pure and bright by a Godly example and discipline. We appeal to you, Christian fathers and mothers. Are you ordering your house in the fear of God? Is the morning and the evening sacrifice presented? If you would not have your own children, by and bye, dwell in homes forsaken of God, see to it that you lead them daily to the altar that sanctifies the home. The feverish competition in the race for riches, and the ever-increasing allurements to out-door life, which mark the times in which we live, endanger this pious practice. All the more, therefore, resolutely resolve, that that altar in your house shall not be broken down, so shall the honor that cometh of God be yours: "Them that honor Me I will honor." And as much as in you lieth, endeavor to make your home the most attractive spot on earth for those over whom you are placed in the parental relation. Resolve that, if it be possible, no son or daughter of yours shall be able to come upon sweeter delights elsewhere than those that gladden and brighten your own fireside. And this delightful achievement is happily within the reach of almost all.

Give the Bible its own place at home. Seek to secure for it the reverent respect of each member of your respective families. Make evident your own respect and love for it. Guard it as a holy thing. Pay it such daily tribute of esteem as its peculiar name and nature demand. Thus may you secure the reverence of your households for this divine treasure, and so the after life of those you love will not be, as alas! in too many instances it is, spoiled by a loose, trifling, or sceptical bearing towards the Book of books.

We think it next to impossible that you should have a well-regulated Christian home—a home under the restraining and elevating influences of religious truth—a home where reverence for sacred things shall mark the speech and manner of all who dwell therein, in the absence from your tables of periodicals of a sound religious character. While we rejoice in the constantly improving moral tone and power of the leading secular newspaper press, we yet believe that it cannot fill the void that is occasioned by the absence of the religious paper, pamphlet or magazine. Indeed we need neither hope nor fear that it will, since the ground occupied by the religious periodical does not come within the scope of the daily or weekly newspaper. In the homes of too many Methodist families no place is found for the publications of the distinctively religious press. This is in marked contrast to the avidity with which the early Methodists devoured such publications as nourished religious thought and feeling.

Very few, comparatively, of our people are familiar with the writings of our Founder, of the incomparable Fletcher, or those biographies of the early Methodist preachers, for which there was a keen and wide-spread relish among our co-religionists of a former generation, and which so much contributed to make them intelligent, aseful, Godly, and much-attached members of our Church.

In addressing to you a few simple and earnest counsels on the subject of *life at home*, we must emphasize our sense of the great importance of a becoming regard for the sanctity of the Sabbath day under the domestic roof. If we esteem the public observance of the day a worthy sign of our national religion, surely there should be a corresponding recognition of it within the enclosure of the home. A quietness all its own should reign throughout the day, and the cessation from the ordinary business of the week should be availed of for the coming together of the members of the family in loving fellowship for a longer space than is found possible during the other days of the week, and this weekly reunion should be sanctified by such exercises in reading, conversation and song as would be in harmony with the design for which the day was made.

We commend to you the study of the tithe. It surely cannot be that so important a duty as that of honoring the Lord with our substance is laid upon us in His Word, and at the same time no rule to guide us in the performance of that duty laid down. We believe, and are resolved to teach, that such a rule is clearly discoverable. Many and great are the evils arising from the failure to apprehend the divine law of giving. Give as the Lord has prospered you, and you shall prosper still more. "As the Lord has prospered you," teaches the duty of proportionate giving; then, as to what arithmetical proportion, ask your reason and your sense of gratitude to the Giver of all, whether it shall be less under the Christian dispensation than under the less favored one which preceded, during which one-tenth was the minimum offering to God. The general adoption of the principle of proportionate giving would revolutionize the present haphazard system, or rather no-system, of church finance, and inaugurate a brighter era of spiritual prosperity than the Church has ever seen—would, in fact, if our God is a covenant-keeping God, "open the windows of heaven."

We do well to keep steadily in view the providential design in our being raised up as a people. That design was to spread scriptural holiness. This is our high calling and our glory still. Holiness is our great central idea and our object point. Oh, that all our legislation and all our meetings might have but this one end in view, and lead up to it! Every other aim must be subordinated to the great connexional and historic aim. And it seems to us that if we are to pursue that one aim effectively we must hold tenaciously by all that in the past gave us our strength and secured us our prosperity. The rapidity with which Methodism has spread as a connexional and itinerant system is ample proof that it is well conceived with the view of propagating itself. Let us guard well then these two vital principles of connexionalism and itinerancy.

Have confidence in the long established means of grace. Let the pernicious and persistent cry for something new go unheeded. We really want nothing new. Rather we want a revival of the old—the class-meeting, the week-night prayer-meeting, the watch-night and covenant services, and the week-night missionary meetings, where these have become extinct. A multiplication of societies within the Church is not necessarily an evidence of much life. Much organization may mean much embarrassment. The increase of the religious life in our midst will create organization for itself. This is the law of all life. If we make machinery before the life prompts and warrants it, and is able to fill it, we but encumber ourselves.

We are still reaping the blessed results of the Union of 1884. May that union never be broken! One only ground of fear we have that schism will ever divide the one body: if we, unmindful of the lessons of the past, grow indifferent to those peculiarities of our system which have differentiated it from all

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other religious systems, and go on to mar, or obliterate, those peculiarities, we shall again become a divided people. We look to you, beloved brethren, to aid us who are resolved to preserve intact the familiar features of Primitive Methodism.

Our great need is a baptism of power as distinct from an increase of organizations. A plain and earnest evangelism carries the secret of our success. In the holy race with other Churches to take this country for Christ, we have lost the odds that a popular theology once gave us, for the preaching of the day from Protestant pulpits is substantially on a line with our own. And in this we greatly rejoice. But this fact should have the good effect of driving us to the Source of all our strength for the endowment of that power from on high, which made so effectual the preaching of the early Methodist preachers, and without which we but beat the air.

Do not postpone your expectation of seeing much good done under the preaching of the Word till the set time of special revival effort shall have come. This were to dishonor both the Spirit and the Word. Do not depend upon extraneous aid for carrying on the work of God. Every congregation is a Church within itself to which all the promises that pertain to the quickening and the enlargement of the divine life and the spreading of the kingdom of God are given.

Among the means for the strengthening of your own religious life we heartily recommend to you the study of Christian biography, and, above all, the study of the One Perfect Life.

Make much of your incomparable hymn-book. We are jealous for it lest your attention should be too much diverted from it to hymns of an ephemeral character, devoid of the true poetic fire, and often shallow and misleading in their conceptions of divine truth. Make it the close and choice companion of your private, as well as public devotions. Every doctrine of the Christian faith, every Christian privilege, and every aspiration of the soul after God finds therein a true expression.

Your Christian character is involved in your citizenship; therefore be good citizens, "Render unto Cesar the things which are Cesar's." Your vote is no light matter. Never cast it but in the name of God. Be fully persuaded in your own mind that it is, on every occasion, such a vote as will make for that all comprehending righteousness "which exalteth a nation." Cultivate the patriotic spirit because it is self-ennobling, and because it is approved by scriptural example:

"If I forget thee, O Jerusalem,
Let my right hand forget her cunning."

Because it is Christlike: "O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, which killeth the prophets, and stoneth them that are sent unto her! how often would I have gathered thy children together, even as a hen gathereth her chickens under her wings, and ye would not!"

The sigh which voiced itself in these words was the sigh of a patriot's heart. Then let all our people say, from eastern to western coast, and from the great river to the farthest north, "For (Canada's) sake will (we) not hold (our) peace, and for (the Dominion's) sake (we) will not rest, until her righteousness go forth as brightness, and her salvation as a lamp that burneth."

"The powers that be are ordained of God," therefore, cultivate the loyal spirit which ever prays for those in authority over us, and which ever blesses the Providence which cast our lot under a civil and political constitution, than which none other secures so well, safety to the person, security to possessions, and freedom to worship God. Cultivate the imperial spirit, for in doing so you will have apostolic precedent, as when St. Paul brought consternation to the authorities at Philippi by communicating to them the startling fact that he was a Roman whom they had beaten and imprisoned without cause, and as

when upon another occasion he made the proud boast of empire citizenship, saying, "But I was free born!" A nobler charter still is ours who say, "But we are Britons born!"

And now our last word shall be one of encouragement. To us the outlook was never more full of hope. The Lord reigneth over all. Discoveries which lighten the burden of labor upon the shoulders of the overwrought, and all the service science, properly so called, renders to mankind, are part of the ways of God, which He takes for the uplifting of the race.

The world is practically growing smaller, so that the nations which are all of the "one blood" intermingle more and more, and learn one of the other, and being thus drawn together, feel the pulsations of a common brotherhood. Blessed are our eyes for they see "in the desert a highway for our God" made "straight," the valleys exalted, the mountains and hills made low, the rough places plane.

The perfection to which military science has brought all the requisites for war fills the minds of statesmen with the awful spectre of a modern battle-field, and becomes a powerful deterrent against the arbitrament of the sword; while, on the other hand, the sublime example set by the two most potent nations of the settlement of international differences by the Christian method of arbitration will continue to allure nations into the same path of peace.

The prayer we were wont to hear in childhood, "Lord, open unto Thy Church the doors that are closed," is already answered, and now for the Gospel there is a free course everywhere that it may run and be glorified. And answering to the open doors are many hundreds of both sexes of the flower of the youth of the Churches who respond to the cry, "Come over and help us."

Notwithstanding the evils discernible in the socialistic movements of the day, we yet must see that there is a steady advancement of the masses in moral tone, in self-restraint and in domestic comfort; while the doctrine of the greatest good for the greatest number is swaying the minds and the lives of those who are most influential among the leaders of men.

A hopeful spirit of impatience with recognized public evils is manifesting itself more and more, so that great abuses are rectified speedily, and wholesome reforms are set in motion and carried quickly to completion.

Within the Churches, of diverse names, is a feeling after a closer fellowship, which will issue in the closing up of the ranks of the "one army of the living God," for the more effectual waging of the great spiritual fight.

If in an hour of despondency, arising from the religious controversies of the times, the foundation of your faith seem to shift beneath you, as sandy ground by rolling billows moved, remember that there is nothing new in principle in the weapons by which the foundation of your faith is assailed. The Holy Scriptures are still "the impregnable rock." While there is much that checks and chastens our persuasions concerning the subjects of our faith, there is nothing in the whole round of the controversy that can undermine the basis upon which we build our hopes. The negative criticism of the age is as a fire which but refines. The ultimate gain to Christianity will be immense, and the believer's warrant of faith will be enlarged and strengthened; and we doubt not that the present sifting time gives promise to the whole Christian Church of an abundant outpouring of the Holy Ghost, to whom, with the Father and the Son, be honor and glory for ever. Amen.
