QUEBEC, Nov. 1.

Monseigneur the Catholic Bishop of Montreal has addressed a mandement, or pastoral letter, to the faithful in the district of Montreal, on the subject of the present state of the district. He of course inculcates peace, and submission to the established authority; but it will have little influence with the leaders of this faction, who are disseminating the spirit of violence and rebellion. They are, for the most part, men who have embraced the doctrines of the French revolutionary school. Several of them are neither Canadians nor Catholics, nor indeed British subjects. They will attack the Bishop and his mandement through their presses, with all the venom and falsehood which are habitual to the school to which they belong. The recommendations of the respectable head of the Catholic Church in the district will, however, have weight with some who are sincere in the religion they profess, but have been deluded by the faction to contribute to their views, which are equally destructive of religion as of loyalty.

Nov. 3.

The Amidu People published at Montreal, on the evening of the 31st inst states, that in consequence of Resolutions passed at Napierville on the 26th, mobs headed by Dr. Cote, had gone to the houses of some militia officers in the country of L'Acadie and forced them to resign commissions.

One of the Resolutions is as follows:—"Resolved, 3.—That all those who wish to live among the inhabitants of this parish be invited to resign, without delay, the different commissions which they hold under the present Government and that we will consider, as suspected (*regardeons d'un mauvais œil*) those who may continue to hold commissions under Lord Gosford."

Several of the officers, it appears, resigned in consequence; one Mr. Timoleon Quesnel is mentioned as having yielded only after threatened violence on a second visit

Nov. 6.

The affair of Lower Canada are beginning to excite a more lively interest in Upper Canada, probably occasioned by the removal of the troops. The requisition to the high Sheriff for amending at Kingston on the 2d instant, is inserted in the Gazette. Other meetings were to be held at Brickville and Prescott. A private letter from Toronto, of the 31st ult., state that the last of the troops were then marching down to the steamer, to embark for Kingston, amid the cheers of the population. Two offers had been made by the citizens and the Rifle Corps to do military duty but His Excellency declined, stating that the civil authority was sufficient. Six thousand stand of arms had been delivered into the keeping of the Magistrates, and lodged in the City Hall, where they were guarded by Constables.

OUTRAGEOUS ATTACK.—On Friday night between the house of 10 and eleven Messrs. W. K. McCord, W. B. Lindsay and R. E. Carou, on returning from the Albon Hotel, where they had been on business connected with the Militia Artillery, of which corps they are officers, were overtaken in Fabrique Street, by eight or nine men, Canadians, who immediately attacked those gentlemen in the most brutal manner. The ruffians having knocked their victims down, commenced dancing upon them, and with heavy sticks inflicting severe blows, until interrupted by the voice of a person who had been attracted by the noise to the scene of action.

MONTREAL, Nov. 4.

We learn on the best authority that arrangements have been entered into to build additional barracks on the ground

now occupied as a wood yard between the Bonsecours church and the barracks and that the Commissariat Stores at the cross are also to be fitted up for the same purpose. Workmen are also busy on the Island making preparations for the accommodation of the 43d Regiment.

At a late hour last night we were informed that the house of R. B. McGinnis, Esq. in the Parish of L'Acadie, was torn down by the Rebels because he would not resign his commission, as Captain of Militia. How long will Lord Gosford wring his hands, and looking up at the ceiling, say "I can't help it."

Lower Canada.—The governor of Lower Canada has issued warrants for the payment of all the public officers, up to the 10th of July last. This measure was adopted in consequence of the refusal of the Assembly to grant the supplies in the usual way. The governor states that all the public officers, with the exception of the executive, his secretary, the judges, and the law officers of the crown, must here after rely for their salaries on the votes of the House of Assembly; Those mentioned above are to be paid out of the crown revenues, without consulting the assembly.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.

AGENT OF THE BANK OF ENGLAND.—It has already been stated that Mr. Cowell had arrived in this country on the mission from the Bank of England from all that we can learn, we have reason to believe that Mr. Cowell has come with instructions of the most liberal nature in relation to the debts due from our countrymen to England, so far as the Bank of England is concerned. A large amount of the proposed bills on the Anglo American houses came into possession of the Bank, so that the institution is, to a very great extent, the creditor of our merchants. We are assured that there is no disposition to oppress the debtors, but that on the contrary very facility will be afforded them. The Directors of the Bank of England, who are at the hand of the largest monied establishment in the first commercial country in the world, are convinced as well of the magnitude, as of the importance to England of the commerce of the United States; and a moment's consideration could not fail to convince such men of the folly, either for their immediate or ultimate interest of pursuing any course or taking any measures that might tend in the least to check or paralyze the exertions or enterprise of our merchants. They feel, also the necessity of more accurate and official information as to the resources, trade, commerce, banks, &c. of this country, than they now possess. This Mr. Cowell will obtain for them, in addition to the other duties with which he is

charged. Mr. Cowell is represented as a highly intelligent well educated and business men, with predilections in favour of our institution. He will proceed to Philadelphia, we are informed, in a day or two for the purpose of having interviews with Mr. Biddle & other gentlemen there; after which he will probably remain some time in this city, and afterwards visit all our principal commercial cities.

MIRAMICHI, Nov. 14.

The Weather.—With the exception of Sunday last the weather during the week has been extremely cold & boisterous, and large quantities of ice have formed on the river. The small craft which have arrived report that they experienced dreadful weather, one schooner from Prince Edward Island has been 15 days on her passage.

In consequence of the number of English residing, not only on the coast, but throughout the interior of France, a demand to a very considerable extent for certain articles has been the natural result, and although various English manufactured goods (paying the usual duties imposed by the French government) have been from time to time imported into this country, yet the state of the law was such that the speculators were forbidden to dispose of them by public auction, because they were new. However, a most important decision on this point has just taken place in the second chamber of the Civil Court of Donai, which at least for a time, has set this question at rest in this department. The court decided on the claim of M. Hure, that auctioneers, have a right to sell publicly all descriptions of articles that are new. It is well known that the royal Courts of Cession are divided in their opinions of this important question, are divided in their opinions of their important question to both natives and foreigners.

The Tanlonnais of 27th ult states, that at 3 o'clock on the afternoon of the 21st, the two French naval divisions composed of seven ships and one brig, were still at anchor in the roads at Tunis from Constantine, which he had left on the 14th. According to the report of this traveller, the French army was already within sight of Constantine, and during the course of the 15th he had heard a brisk cannonade, from which circumstance he inferred that hostilities had commenced. Admiral Laland appraised by our Consul General of this intelligence, went ashore to learn further particulars, and to visit the Bey agreeably to an appointment, but just as he was going to cross the threshold door

of the hall audience, three or four dignitaries of the Tunisian court came out to meet him, and treated him to put off his visit to another day; the Bey was too much occupied to receive him. He was at that very moment presiding at the strangulation of his Prime Minister, who was his intimate friend and nephew. Had Admiral Lande advanced three steps more, he would have witnessed that atrocious spectacle, of which the cause had remained unknown to all the European Consuls. An hour afterwards the Admiral waited on the British Consul from whom he learned for the first time that a revolutionary movement had just been suppressed. It appears that the Prime Minister of the Bey, who was a very able man, and enjoyed great influence among the natives of the interior, had been accused of conspiring with the Porte against the reigning Bey. Two hours afterwards tranquility was completely resorted to at Tunis.

A circular has been issued from the Horse guards' commanding that the cipher W. R. now borne upon the buttons and appointment of the different branches of the army, is to be changed to V. R.

A conspiracy, having for its object to blow up the powder magazine at the gate of Santa Barbara, to break open the prisons, and to effect a Carlist movement in Madrid, was said to have been discovered on the night of the 9th inst.

The Government intended shortly to carry into execution the levy of 50,000 men, to remove from the ranks of the National Guards all but single men and Widowers from the age of 17 to 40, and to organize squadrons of cavalry in the south of, at least 60 men each.

Mr. O'Connell is preparing a work for the press, called *Memoirs of Ireland*, descriptive of the past and present state of that country.

A new steam ship belonging to Sir John Tobin, and of unusually large dimensions, was to be launched at Liverpool, Oct. 15th. She is said to be larger than any craft of the kind afloat. Her extreme length is 240 feet, breadth outside the paddle boxes 50 feet, and measures 1100 tons, old measurement. She is to be furnished with engines of 400 horses' power.

To such celerity has the telegraphic system been carried in Liverpool, that an aggregate distance of 532 miles, were traversed in 1 minute and 50 seconds.

A calculation has been made of the profits derived by the French from the tax of gambling houses ever since its first imposition in 1793, by which it appears to amount to 460 millions of francs, or to £18,000,000 stg.

Between four thousand workmen are employed in different public works and improvements now going on in Paris.

The government is about to undertake the complete clearing out of the mud accumulated in the port of Dunkirk, at an estimated expense of £245,000.

It is not generally known, not even to military men, that a legacy was bequeathed by the late Arch-

deacon Lewis for the benefit of the army, to be exclusively employed in religious purposes. This legacy now amounts to ten thousand pounds, and is held over (to be applied to the purposes for which it was intended) by the treasurer of the Christian Knowledge Society.

Lord Bingham has presented to the mess of the 17th Lancers, a magnificent silver cierge, value 200 guineas on the occasion of his retirement from that regiment, which his lordship commanded nearly ten years.

LUTHER.—The university where Luther studied was suppressed in 1816; the convent where he became a monk is now an orphan asylum; and the church in which he once read mass is a Protestant one. His cell in the Augustine convent is preserved in the same state as when occupied by him; and his table, his portrait against the wall, and his beloved Bible, are still to be seen there.

A letter from Palermo of the 24th ult. published by the Frankfurt Post Gazette of the 31 instant announces that ten inhabitants of the small town of Misineri had been sentenced to death on the 22d, and immediately executed. Among the sufferers was a boy who, being too young to carry a musket, went through the streets armed with a knife stabbing to death the unhappy victims who still gave signs of life. The Palermo Military commission has assembled on the 24th to decide on the fate of individuals guilty of murders during the prevalence of the cholera.

Sir David Walker has finished a very fine likeness of the Queen, which it is probable will be placed in a conspicuous part of Guildhall, on the day of the annual civic festival next month, which her Majesty will honor with her presence.

The Spanish journals announce that the Queen has signed the treaty of peace and friendship with Mexico. By this treaty the Queen of Spain abandons all pretensions to the sovereignty of that territory.

The King of Hanover has ordered a report from his Lord Chancellor, on the question whether the existing constitution is obligatory upon the crown. The chancellor, it is said, declines a positive answer to this grave question, but suggests a modification of the constitution, to render it more acceptable and serviceable both to King and people. The King has not made up his mind on the subject.

ITALY.—THE CHOLERA.—The German and Italian journals, quoted by the Parisian papers, seem wholly absorbed with the ravages of the cholera. A Rome number of deaths from it were, on the 23d ult. 136; and on the 24th 174. At Naples, the King, seeing that the strictest quarantine had not in any case prevented the introduction of the cholera, and had only acted injuriously for trade, had ordered that all the precautionary measures taken in respect of that malady should be recalled and abandoned. At Marseilles the cholera had nearly subsided, but its severer stages were in the south of France, was raging with fearful mortality.

EAST INDIA SHIPPING.—The recommendations of the Chronicle are somewhat startling, and cannot fail to bring back to one's recollection, the utter recklessness with which the most splendid branch of our mercantile marine—the

East India Company's shipping—was annihilated, without any attempt having been made to secure its services for other national purposes. In that service there were fifty commanders, two hundred and fifty mates (equal to lieutenants), three hundred midshipmen, surgeons, purser, warrant and petty officers, and between five and six thousand seamen—all qualified to undertake duty in the Royal Navy, in case of emergency, and to form the nucleus of a naval force sufficient to encounter all the enemies that could be brought against us. This fine body of mariners was destroyed at one fell swoop, and how that regret is unavailing, its extinction becomes a matter of lamentation with those whose care it should have been to render it subservient to all the great purposes of national strength and defence. Thus it is that our statesmen and their sapient advisers occupy themselves in letting down buckets into empty wells, and grow old in drawing them up again!

If the number of persons in mourning whom you meet did not remind you of the cholera, you might almost believe it had never been in Rome. Everything has returned to its usual course; the former habits are resumed—the ladies and gentlemen look at each other as usual—the dead are forgotten, and the living enjoy the present hour. The approach of October engages the thoughts of many persons, but in different ways.—Some think to indemnify themselves for the abstinence and apprehension which the had to endure, while other dread from the same cause a return of the disorder; for the Government, with the best intentions, will not be able to forbid the amusements of this month. Experience does not make man wiser. His object is to live and enjoy his life. The poorer classes of the population have left to the charity of their fellow citizens the incredible number of 1,500 orphans, who have lost both their parents and everybody must rejoice to hear that charity has nobly manifested itself on this occasion. Many rich families have contributed by pecuniary aid to relieve, as far as possible, the distress of these wholly destitute children for the present moment. The name of Prince Borghese who is known by many similar actions, is at the head—he having subscribed considerable sums for that purpose.—The Princess, in conjunction with many other ladies, has a more extensive plan, and intends to collect all the female orphans in a particular institution which she means to found, and to take them under her care and superintendence till they are grown up.

A Sheffield gentleman, on whose veracity we have the strictest reliance, informs us that on passing up the Vistula a fortnight ago, he saw at Danzig heaps of wheat on each side of the river, five or six feet deep, of considerable breadth, and extending nearly seven miles. It is preserved from the effects of the weather by a peculiar kind of matting and sail cloth. Several thousand persons are constantly employed in turning this immense quantity of grain, and exist upon it—the simple preparation of their meals being to boil the corn in the water of the Vistula. They reside in straw huts, erected adjoining the scene of their employment. This astonishing superabundance of produce, consisting of nearly 600,000 quarters, has been brought from Galatz and Poland to its present situation for the purpose of being exported to foreign countries, as it is well known the corn laws prevent its introduction here.

The Prince de Joinville it is said in one of the Paris Prints, has been suddenly recalled from his intended voyage. A new bridge is about to be erected across the river Thames, from streetly in Berkshire, to the opposite shore, in the parish of Goring, Oxfordshire. It is an interesting fact, that turf is now used as fuel on board the steamers plying between Limerick, Clare and Kilrush.—The Garryowen had made the passage between Kilrush and Limerick, fired with turf in three hours and twenty minutes.

It is said that the Marquises of Westminster and Aglessea are speedily to receive dukdoms, and that Lord Mulgrave is, at the same time, to be raised a step in the peerage. Preparations are in progress in George's Square, Glasgow for the erection of a monument to the memory of Sir Walter Scott. It is, we understand, to be a pillar about 123 feet in height surrounded by a statue, and will be a great ornament to that part of the city, which is already adorned with the statues of Sir John Moor and James Watt.

Extract of a letter from Cadiz, dated November 17, 1837:—

The last accounts from Italy are very satisfactory; the cholera had disappeared in Genoa, Leghorn, and Naples, and clean Bills of Health issued. In the Roman Provinces a few cases still afflict some places. Three arrivals of fish had taken place at Naples, and sold to produce 16s. 8d. @ 15s. the cwt.

In Portugal an increase of duty, 1600 Reis the quintal, is to be levied on importations of fish from the 6th January next, according to a decree published in Lisbon on the 6th inst. It is likely to be of advantage to the Newfoundland trade with Spain, as much smuggling cannot be committed on the Portuguese Frontier with the interior Provinces.

Freights scarce, owing to the dull state of general business, in consequence of the continuance of the civil war, which I am sorry to say, is without a prospect of terminating soon.

(From late English dates.)

The Canton papers state that the de-  
parture from their respective countries  
of the English, American, and other For-  
eign residents at that place continued to  
be urged by the Chinese Government.—  
Every one of them have strict orders to  
withdraw to Macao within given periods,  
which are fixed according to the length  
of time required by the parties to wind  
up their affairs, and to proceed from  
thence as speedily as possible for their  
own homes. The introduction of opium  
into China, and the exportation of Sycee  
silver, appear to be the chief grounds of  
dissatisfaction with the authorities at Pe-  
kin.

The Precursor of Antwerp says—  
"We have often spoken of the various  
methods adopted to cheat underwriters,  
and we have now to expose a new plan,  
as related by our Bremen and Hamburg  
correspondents. In October last, in dif-  
ferent places, Marine risks were offered  
on grain shipped in the *Frau Catharina*,  
Tiemann; and the *Metta Margaretha*,  
Linhorst, on a voyage from Atenbruck  
for Dunkirk. They were insured at  
Hamburg, and a third cargo at Bremen,  
but no such vessels have ever existed.—  
The Bremen underwriters first entertain-

ed suspicions, and made enquiries; the  
result is that the *soi disant* consignor, at  
Cuxhaven, took flight; and the Custom  
House officer who gave certificates of the  
clearances of the vessels, has been arrest-  
ed and prosecuted." This discovery has  
led to another of a similar fraudulent  
insurance at Hamburg, of a simulated  
adventure for Antwerp, six or eight  
months ago.

We believe we may state with confi-  
dence that Lord William Bentinck is to be  
called immediately to the House of Peers,  
in which case a vacancy will occur in the  
representation of Glasgow. Patrick  
Maxwell Stewart, Esq., the late member  
for Lancaster, will be requested to offer  
himself for this important city.

It is said that strong representations  
have been made of the necessity of ap-  
pointing inspectors of steam vessels at  
the port of London and elsewhere, to be  
paid by a rate upon the vessels.

Accounts have been received at Vienna  
that the steamer *Pannonia* had succeeded  
in making the passage on the Danube to  
the Iron Gate, a part of the river, which,  
for a thousand years, has been deemed  
unnavigable, from its rocks and falls, but  
which has been made to yield to modern  
art and science.

Our readers can scarcely have failed to  
observe, by an advertisement which ap-  
peared in this paper, that the Mutual  
Marine Insurance Companies of Sunder-  
land have instituted a board for the ex-  
amination of persons intending to become  
masters of ships, and that the subscrib-  
ers have resolved to give no person em-  
ployment in that capacity who has not  
been previously so employed, without he  
has a certificate of qualification from the  
board they have instituted.

The consumption of gold for gilding  
at the various potteries is said to amount  
to upwards of £600 a week, and the con-  
sumption of coals in the same period to  
about 800 tons.

Sweden, though perhaps the poorest  
nation in Europe, is making extraordina-  
ry strides towards the advancement of  
steam navigation. Sweden already pos-  
sesses no less than twenty-four steam ves-  
sels, and others are rapidly building, and  
will be afloat before the close of the year.

Captain Napier, lately commanding the  
Queen of Portugal's fleet, is gone to Lis-  
bon by the last packet, ostensibly with a  
view of claiming some arrears of pension,  
but it is said in reality with the political  
object of settling the present dispute be-  
tween Saldanha and the Queen's govern-  
ment, having great influence with that  
general.

The Lord Chancellor has given his  
judgment in favour of the Marquis of  
Chandos, in the case of Chancery, *Bread-  
dane v. Chandos*, Lord Chandos is en-  
titled to the third share of four hun-  
dred thousand pounds.

Major-General Sir Amos Norcott, late  
commanding the forces in Jamaica, has  
assumed the military command in the  
southern district of Ireland, and has ap-  
pointed Lieutenant Norcott, Rifle brigade,  
to be his aid-de-camp.

So profuse is the crop of potatoes in  
this neighbourhood that it is expected they  
will be as low as one shilling per  
pot, a price not remembered for many  
years past. Indeed it is almost difficult  
to name a species of the earth's product  
in which nature has not, this season,  
dealt out her bounties with a truly prodig-  
al hand. A farmer in an adjoining  
county, cultivating about six hundred  
acres, states that he shall grow more hops  
and cider this year than the same land  
has been known to produce for the last  
century, during which time it has been  
in the holding of himself and ancestors.  
—*Worcester paper.*

The reported insurrection at Bombay  
is entirely without foundation. Letters  
have been received to the 6th May, which  
make no mention of such an occurrence,  
and there are other circumstances which  
show the whole story to be fabulous.

CENTENARY OF METHODISM.—It is in-  
tended, we hear, to hold a centenary in  
commemoration of the first formation of  
the Methodist United Society in 1739;  
and at the last conference a committee  
was appointed, including the secretary  
and president of that body and several of  
the most distinguished preachers, which  
will deliberate on the most suitable means  
of given due effect to this resolution.—  
*Doncaster Gaz.*
