Treatment of Seed. Potatoes, like the seed of grain rops, should be treated to aid in ontrolling disease. Either a Solution of Formalin or Corrosive Sublimate will aid in the control of but may not entirely prevent potato scab. If formalin is to be used the same strength recommended for treating wheat is best. One pound to 30 or 40 gallons of water is the proper strength and the potato scab bution for 1½ to 2 hours. If Corrosive Sublimate is to be used, one ounce to 7 gallons of water is the best proportion. The tubers should be soaked in this solution for 1½ to 2 hours. 




