Women in Germany. The American lady who travels in Germany views with astonishment and indignation some of the labors there assigned to her sex. All the most menial, the most repulsive, and much of the most exhausting work is accomplished by the German women.

Longitude on the earth's surface is now computed from various meridians by different countries. At the recent meeting of the Geographical Congress in Vienna, Prof. Barnard, of Columbia College, proposed a new system for universal use, the plan being to divide the globe into 24 meridians of 15 degrees each, corresponding to the 24 hours of the day, the first meridian to pass through Behring Strait.

The "square" as a constructive tool, most of necessity, has found a place in the "kit" of the earliest builders. Evidence of its presence has been found in the ruins of the pre-historic nations, and are abundant in the remains of ancient Persia, Nineveh, Babylon, Egypt and Petra. South American ruins of great antiquity in Brazil, Peru and other places show that the numerous races that once inhabited the South American continent were familiar with many of the uses of the square.

The effects of sea-water upon land have been thus determined at a German station of experimental agriculture: "Land that has been submerged by sea-water generally proves sterile for some time, in some cases for ten to fifteen years. This can be traced to the co-operation of the following chemical causes, in addition to the mechanical injuries produced by the inundation: To the introduction of too great a proportion of chlorine salts; to the hygroscopic property communicated to it, preventing it from drying properly; to the formation of green vitriol or sulphate of iron, which is known to exert a very prejudicial effect upon plant growth. Land which has thus been damaged should be drained as quickly as possible, sown with grass and clover, and allowed to rest. Experience shows that it recovers its fertility sooner if treated in this way than if cultivated all the year round as arable land."

Miramichi Advance, CHATHAM, OCTOBER 13, 1881. A Woollen Factory. On the occasion of a farewell dinner to a former resident and prominent business man of Chatham a week or two ago, Mr. Snowball, M. P., in referring to the cods of our people and the means that might be resorted to for keeping them at home, advocated the establishment of a woollen factory, and said that although his time and capital were both pretty fully employed in his present business, yet if such an enterprise were started under good auspices he would undertake to furnish one third or even one half of the money required for it.

The Tables Turning. Our Fredericton correspondent telegraphed last night: "Judge Steadman, Henry Blair, Esq., Clerk Assistant of the Legislative Council, and Edgar Hanson, Esq., of the Provincial Civil Service, have with deadly earnestness been in the Justice's Courts here a short time. The necessary documents for entering the writs have been filed, and the case is set for \$5,000. In the case of Mr. Blair, the writs were issued on the 10th inst., and Mr. Blair is said to have a plaintiff and present of a revolver at his place."—Sun of 7th inst.

The Assasin Guilt. HOW HE SHADOWED HIS VICTIM TILL A CONVENIENT SEASON. A MURDERER'S LONG VIOL. Guiteau has written up a long account of his motives for shooting the President, and his method of accomplishing his end. The chief reason was evidently selfish, his disappointment at not obtaining a foreign consularship. He then determined to assassinate General Garfield, but on the following Thursday, observing that the President was going to Long Branch on the Saturday, he resolved to do the deed on that day. He went with all his preparations arranged; got to the depot about half an hour before the President's arrival; watched him from the ladies' room of his carriage and would have fired on him then and there had not Mrs. Garfield, who looked very thin and ill, clung so tenderly to her husband's arm as to prevent his intention. He then determined to shoot him on the following Monday, the day of his return, and accordingly went to the depot. The heat, however, was so great as to take the heart out of him, and he had to wait until the next morning, and accordingly set out in expectation for two long hours, only to be disappointed, as the President did not go to the depot, and he was obliged to wait from the White House through Vermont avenue, accompanied by one of his sons and a gentleman. As they did not return the same way he missed them, after a long vigil. On the Friday the assasin hung out a notice that he would be in the evening when the President would call alone to Mr. Blair's house, on Fifteenth street. While General Garfield was there, Guiteau stepped into an ally opposite the house, took out his revolver, saw the President's carriage, and put it in his pocket. After waiting for half an hour the President came out, accompanied by Mr. Blair, and passed him on the opposite side, both being in earnest conversation and their heads being very close together. Mr. Blair was energetic in his action, his right hand was raised, and the President's left, who with his right would frequently strike out in the air. NEW VOTERS.—The Revisors of voters have had application made to them to add one hundred and twenty-six new names to the list of voters in this Parish. The names are now posted up at the office of W. A. Park, Esq., on the 25th inst., to adjudge thereon.—Advocate.

It is to be hoped that the Revisors, not only in Newcastle, but in all other Parishes of the County will do their duty faithfully and conscientiously in making or unmaking voters. 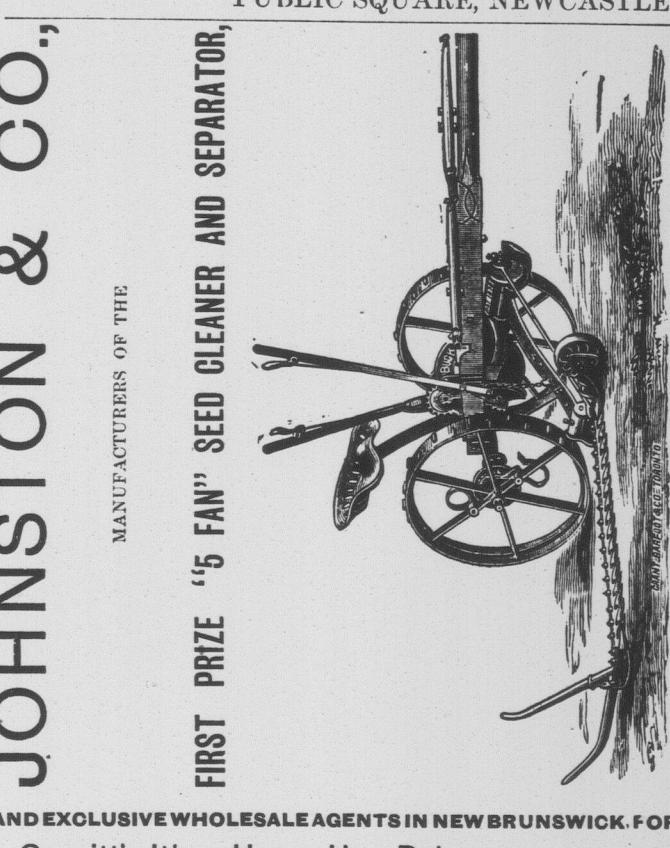
