NEW YORK, Feb. 18.-After an unremitting search of nearly seven weeks, during which she walked day in unsavory resorts, and exhausted every resource of a skilled detective, Mrs. Katie Duffy, of Brooklyn, early today caused the arrest of the man who is accused of being her husband's mur-

derer.


