





Military Service Act, 1917.

EMPLOYMENT OF MEN IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

The following Regulations, recently approved by the Governor General in Council, impose strict obligations upon every employer TO ASSURE HIM-SELF THAT EACH OF HIS EMPLOYEES OF MILITARY AGE AND DESCRIPTION IS IN POSSESSION OF DOCUMENTS PROVING THAT HE IS NOT IN ANY WAY IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

An employer who is charged with having a defaulter in his employ must be able to prove THAT THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE EMPLOYEE IN QUES-TION WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPEC-TION at the time when the employee was taken into his employment, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction that the man was not in default under the Military Service Act. It should be clearly understood that the Canadian Registration Certificates given on June 22, 1918, at the time of general registration, in no way define the status of a man under the Military Service Act.

REGULATIONS.

MEGULATIONS.

106. Every person who employs or retains in his service any man who has deserted or is absent without leave from the Canadian Expeditionary Force, or who is in default in the performance of any obligation or requirement for reporting or for military service, imposed upon him by the Act or Regulations, or any proclamation thereunder, shall be guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by a penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars, and of not more than Five Hundred Dollars, or by both such imprisonment and fine, unless such person prove that he made due inquiry and that THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR THE MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE MAN SO EMPLOYED OR RETAINED IN HIS SERVICE WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPECTION, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction by such inquiry and papers that the man was not a deserter or absent from the force without leave, or in default in respect of any of the man was not a deserter or absent from the forces without leave or in default in respect of any of the man was not a deserter or absent from the forces without leave or in default in respect of any of the BRANCH.

GENERAL ELECTIONS IN THE UNITED STATES HELD TODAY

Democrats and Republican Leaders Each Claim New Congress.

NEW YORK HERALD SEES DEM. SENATE

Predicts Election of Smith in New York and Republican

Washington, Nov. 4. Victory in Tuesday's congressional elections is claimed in statements issued by Dem-acratic and Republican campaign

claimed in statements issued by Demacratic and Republican campaign Homers. Cummings, acting chairman of the Democratic National Committee predicted that the Democratic majority in the Senate would be increased by the vote taken in senatorial contests and that the Democrats would make gains in the House of frem 30 to 66 members.

Republicans will control the next House by a majority of 25 members. Representative Foss of Ohio, chairman of the National Republican Contressional Committee declared. While no formal statement—was issued by the Republicans as to Senatorial contests, leaders of the party indicated that the next Senate would be Republican by a safe markin. In his analysis of the political situation, Chairman Foss said 230 concressional districts are "safely" Republican, 172 are "safely" Democratic and 33 are doubtful. The most noticeable gains claimed by the Republican chairman are from Ohio, his com state, the present delegation from which includes 12 Democrats and nine Republicans with one seat vacant. Pourteen seats will go Republican, five to the Democrats and three are doubtful, Foss claims.

Maine Is Sure.

Twelve states with 36 seats are claimed as solid Republican by Chairman Foss as follows: Deleware, Idaho, Iowa. Maine, Nevada. New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oregon, Vermont, Washington and Wyoming. Seven states, all in the South, with an aggregate of 64 members of Congress, are conceded by Representative Foss to the Democrats

Representative Poss to the Democrats.

"Our advices from every state point to a sweeping Democratic victory," said the statement issued by Chairman Cunmings. The tide is running strongly in our favor, especially in the Middle West and far Western states, with a prenounced drift toward Democratic candidates in every state."

The Democrats, Chairman Cummings claims, will control at least two-thirds of the states in which senatorial contests have developed. He predicts that the Democrats would gain in nearly every state in which there are contests for the House. Some districts are admittedly close, be said, but victories are assured in sufficient number of districts to insure Democratic majority of not less than 30 in the next House.

NOTICE TO EMPLOYERS OF LABOR

Every Employer shall, on or before the 15th day of November, cause to be furnished to the Workmen's Compensation Board at the City of St. John, an estimate or estimates of the probable amount of the payroll of each of his industries within the scope of Part I of the Act, together with such further information as may be required by the Board for the purpose of assigning such industry to the proper class or classes, and of making the assessment herounder.

And Further Notice that any Employer neglecting or refusing to furnish such estimate or information is liable to a penalty not exceeding \$20.00 per day for each day of such default, and is further liable for damages, as provided by Part II. of said Act, in respect of any injury to any workman in his employ during the period of such default.
