The Bennett Government, after clinging to office as long as possible, was finally forced to relax its devilish grasp of the Treasury benches, and Mr. Carter, the widely known advocate of Confederation, was called upon to form a new Ministry. Parties are so evenly balanced in the House of Assembly that the task was not an easy one. Some of the best friends of Confederation fear that their party have taken the reins of power too soon. They think the Bennett Government should have been allowed to blunder along helplessly for a time, and then kicked out.

All the supporters of the Ministry, with the exception of one man, are avowed advocates of Union with the Dominion of Canada.
