RIGHT WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,--

Your Grand Secretary, owing to a severe illness, has found it necessary to seek a change of climate, being advised so to do by his physican, and consequently will be unable to be with you during the present session of this Right Worshipful Grand Lodge.

The progress of the Order in this Province has not been as rapid this year as in the previous year, owing to a great extent to the scarcity of labor and money.

The correspondence during the past year has been equal to that of previous years, amounting to upwards of three hundred letters and answers to the same.

In accordance with a resolution passed at the last session of this Right Worshipful Grand Lodge respecting dormant warrants, your Grand Secretary prepared directories from the Grand Lodge Registrar and transmitted a copy of the same with a notice to each County Master, in order that he might make a return to your Grand Secretary of the standing of Lodges in his County. Your Grand Secretary has made a minute of the same, which will be laid before the Committee on dormant warrants. Your Grand Secretary has also notified all those who have not yet made returns to do so.

Your Grand Secretary has received during the past year quite a few petitions and appeals, which will be laid before the Committee appointed to consider same.

Your Grand Secretary has made the usual arrangements with the railways and hotels, and issued his circulars concerning same in time for County meetings.

The issue of warrants during the past year has not been as large as in previous years, but shows that the Order has lost

Bro. E. F. Clarke, by permission, read the annual report of the C. M. of Toronto.

To the Right Worshipful the Grand Master and the Grand Lodge of Ontario West:

The Worshipful County Master of Toronto begs to present his annual report:

The Order in the city of Toronto is in a prosperous and flourishing condition; although the returns submitted indicate a further falling off in membership. This is mainly owing to

the continued depression, and also to the fact that a new system of assessment of the Private Lodges in the County for County purposes has been introduced, viz.: the per capita plan, which causes Lodges to return to the County only those who are really and actually in good standing.

The adoption of a code of By-laws containing provisions for the organization of new committees, enables the County Lodge to dispose of its business in a much more expeditious manner than formerly, and with greater satisfaction to all parties than was hitherto the case. The by-laws under which our County is conducted having been approved and confirmed by the M. W. the Grand Master and Sovereign, they have all the force of law, and are, in fact, a carefully prepared digest of the constitution of the Order. In this connection I would respectfully suggest that the M. W. the Grand Lodge should enact that it be compulsory on all Private Lodges to submit their by-laws for the approval of the Provincial Grand Master of their jurisdiction; and that all District and County Lodges should submit their by-laws for the approval of the M. W. G. M. & S.

I would also beg respectfully to draw the attention of this R. W. body to the position occupied by the past Masters of the Association. A Brother, after serving his private Lodge faithfully and efficiently for years, is elected to the honorable position of Worshipful Master. So long as he retains that position he has a voice and vote in the District, County, and Provincial Grand Lodges to which his number belongs; but after his successor in the chair of his Lodge retires, then the Brother is debarred from voting in the higher Lodges named, and the Order loses the benefit of his counsel and experience. The same principle virtually obtains in respect of District and County Masters. It is a fact that when Brethren are thus deprived of a voice in superior Lodges, they grow cold in the cause, and too frequently withdraw from connection with the Order. An amendment to the constitution, conferring upon Past Masters of Private Lodges the right to vote and speak in their respective District and County Lodges, and also conferring upon Past District and County Masters the right to speak and vote in the Provincial and Most Worshipful Grand Lodges, would, in my humble judgment, be productive of great and lasting benefit to the Association; and the matter is submitted for your earnest consideration.

The suspensions for non-payment of dues amount to the large number of 173; and no less than 20 members have been expelled for contempt of summons; 1 for disgraceful conduct, and 1 for defrauding the Western District Lodge of its funds.

The suspensions and expulsions aggregate 95 less than for the year 1878.

The decrease returned for the year 1878 showed a loss from the previous year of 222.

These returns show that members who allow themselves to remain in arrears are speedily weeded out. I sincerely hope and trust that there will be a marked increase in the numbers returned next year, and that greater interest will be evinced in the various Lodges under my jurisdiction.

The finances of the County Lodge are in a very healthy

Owing to the false and scurrilous statements made by the opponents of the order, on the floor of the Ontario Legislature, two years ago, in reference to the benevolent branch of our work, our efficient County Secretary requested returns from the private lodges in the jurisdiction of the amount of money expended in benevolence, and in response to his request the following information has been obtained:

The Lodges of the County of Toronto have expended in the year past the sum of \$4,000.00 for charitable purposes. This sum, contributed by a membership of 1,863, amounts to a per capita of \$2.14 from each brother.

REPORT OF THE R. W. GRAND TREASURER.

To the R.W. Grand Master and members of the Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario West:

R. W. SIR AND BRETHREN,-

Your R. W. Grand Treasurer has much pleasure in submitting his financial statement for the year now ended. The financial standing of this Lodge is in a sound and satisfactory condition, notwithstanding the large drain upon its resources during the past year.

In the statement now submitted, it will be observed that the M. W. Grand Lodge dues were paid last winter after our Grand Lodge meeting, and that the dues for 1880 also, amounting to \$300, were paid in October last, that is twice during the same year. This was owing to the printing and binding of the Rituals, entailing a large expense upon the M. W. Grand Lodge, which they were unable to meet, and we were asked to anticipate the payment, which we have done. This leaves \$300 less in our hands than would otherwise have been the case, but leaves \$300 less liabilities.

Grand Lodge adjourned for the purpose of attending divine service. The Grand Lodge formed in order of procession under the direction of the G. D. of Ceremonies and marched to St. Thomas Church, headed by the Walkerton band. The Rev. Bros. Hugh Cooper, G. C., and R. S. Cooper conducted the services, when the following sermon was preached by the R. W. Grand Chaplain:

SERMON.

And it shall come to pass, when your children shall say unto you, What mean ye by this service.—Exodus xii., 26.

In the providence of that God, who has always kept His people, and who still watches over those who acknowledge Him in their ways and doings, we are permitted to meet again in our annual conference-met to consider the best interests of the society to which we belong. Since last we met we have had our position in the country tested, or at least an attempt has been made in that direction. It is desirable that something more definite should be yet arrived at; that we should be recognized in our true character. And in this contest which we are keeping up, and the advocacy of our principles, we are sometimes inclined to ask ourselves the question, which we often hear from others,-What is the use of this, or what is there in the society and its associations that can warrant further conflict, or urge us onward to renewed efforts and diligence to defend what has been so nobly given? Would it be well to give up the past and allow the future to shape itself by fate or chance? I think, my brethren, there can only be one reply, if we rightly understand the meaning of our service. Let us, then, endeavor to reply to our text, "What mean ye by this service?" Is ours a society whose

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principles are only of recent origin? Were they never in ex. istence before the memorable year 1690, which brought them into the British nation as the golden chain which should bind the broken fragments of a disturbed people in peace and harmony, by giving them something in which they could confide? Or does our society date back to earlier times, and do not our principles come down to us venerable with the hoar of ages? Who will dare to say that there ever was a year in which the people to whom the direction was given to reply to my text were unmindful of that direction, or suffered it to be entirely forgotten? Will we dare to say that the people of God's choice and favour failed entirely; or that God failed in his designs in delivering them, amidst mighty signs and wonders, to carry out his purpose on earth? Will we dare to say that all the everlasting covenants which He made with His people Israel have had to be abandoned? When I use the term Israel, I altogether exclude the Jews, for they are not Israel, though of Israel. Will we not rather say that God has been dealing with this same people since the day he led them forth from Egypt to the present moment. blindness with regard to their origin may have happened to them, yet in their dispersion from their own land, God is fulfilling the promise which He made to "lead them by a way that they knew not." And do they not, in that partial darkness, still trust him more than any other nation of the earth? And did they not, in all their wanderings, carry with them the grand heritage of religious testimony, telling it to children and children's children through all their generations? Along with these religious instincts they bore with them their national standards. And by the guiding hand which was holding and directing them, they were not permitted to rest in peace as a nation until they should have a union of their religious and political ideas which would form a constitution for their safety, embracing both their ecclesiastical and civil polity. It would not do to erect a Church separate from the State. It would not do to proclaim a religion separate from their national standards. Both must bear the same testimony in symbol and action. Hence, when the Prince of noble memory landed on the shores of our mother country, he would not proceed until this foundation was laid for the permanency of the Empire. And when he met the Archbishop of Canterbury there was no drawing up of any new code which was unheard of before. They both realized that they

stood on common ground, covered by a mighty past; and by common consent each acknowledged that that past, with its heritage, was a holy temple sufficient to canopy the king and the clergy, and the principles upon which each stood were a sufficient foundation for the permanency of the "altar and the throne." A temple formed in this manner would have to be according to the pattern shown to "Moses on the Mount," and the password by which admission is gained into such a temple would fittingly be the name of Him to whom the temple was dedicated. So that, like David of old, we may bend the knee and say, "Blessed be Thou Lord God of Israel, our Father." And here we expect one day to see the Ark of the Lord revealed to the glory of God and the glory of His people. And when that light shall dawn we will find ourselves in the midst of brethren, and those brethren members of ancient Israel to whom these trusts were committed; and to the hope of Israel we look forward—that hope which inspired St. Paul to suffer the many trials which he endured. This temple is to exhibit to the world the true religion and polity. But in what way are we to know it? I have said before, in symbol according to the pattern shown to Moses, and the colors divinely given in the coverings of the tabernacle. Let us look at these colors and their divine significations:

Blue denotes the presence of the Father upon the earth and His commandments. Num., xv., 38: "Look upon the blue fringe and remember the commandments of the Lord."

Purple denotes mediation, and is the color of the royal tribe

of Judah, from which Christ sprang.

Scarlet denotes the sins of man; Is. i, 18: "Though your sins be as scarlet they shall be as white as snow;" and so

White denotes righteousness, as in "the fine twined linen." Gold denotes Holy Ghost, and was interwoven with the fine twined linen.

In the precious stones which are given to us in Scripture we have the same significance, only the primary colors are mingled with secondary ones. We have here again the

Sapphire or blue, denoting the Father, as before.

Sardine or red, denoting the Son, red in His apparel.

Topaz or yellow, denoting the Holy Ghost, as the gold mentioned before.

Amethyst or purple, denoting royalty and redemption. Emerald or green denoting God's promise and provision. Jacinth or orange, denoting love, fire, affection. This is displayed in the national shield in the double border that is to its golden quarter, and examining the heraldic colors on our royal banner, attached to the quarterings of the shield, and comparing them with the national emblems we will find they harmonize. In noticing these colors there are a couple of facts we must not overlook. We have only mentioned six of these stones and their colors and significations. There is another which makes up the transieut number seven, which is the perfect number attached to light. Hence we have the

Diamond or white light, denoting light and perfection, and all the other colors come from and retire into the white light, giving us the "Urim and Thummim," the light of God.

There appears to be a glorious significance pourtrayed upon the banner of our nation, from all its bright colors and wonderful devices. Something strange if it is not the Israelitish emblazonry of the truth of prophecy. The sign of the fulfilment of God's sacred promise blindly leading his people "by a way which they know not," and according to the words of the 60th Psalm, "Thou has made us to drink the wine of astonishment. Thou hast given a banner to them that fear Thee. that it may be displayed because of the truth." And, my brethren, when we look at that truth pourtrayed in these colors and emblems the question is at once decided for us. We find that truth and our constitution worth contending for, worth living for, worth dying for, now as much as in the days gone by. Here we have pourtraved to us a true refuge for a nation -a true origin and foundation for a Church, and the truth which they are to proclaim to a sinful world.

Let us look for a moment, in closing, at that mighty truth. It is denoted by the position of these colors: We have blue, as we said, denoting the presence of God the Father upon earth. We have scarlet, denoting sin-stained humanity. We have the polluted creature and the Holy Creator. They must remain in their nature separated forever, holiness from impurity, unless something interpose. The blue and scarlet cannot stand side by side. So, by Divine appointment, and by Divine command, the purple covering comes between, and there is the great truth of a Royal Mediator between the High and Holy One and His sinful creature, and through this Mediator, and through Him alone, the creature becomes righteous, as he stands associated with the Holy Ghost the sanctifier. In Revelations, xvii., 4, we find that when national life becomes corrupt, it has disregarded the number and order of these

In action our life should follow the Divine idea, hold on to and stand by the Divine truth, and rise by the Divine assistance given us in and through mediation, until we all have that fitness for a higher place, when we shall be called to a share in that kingdom which shall be revealed in fullness one day, when the light and glory of God shall again dawn in all its splendor.

4th. With regard to the case of appeal of Bro. McKelvy, of L. O. L. 861, against the decision of the County Lodge of South Grey, your Committee would recommend that the case be referred back to the County Lodge of South Grey, Bro. McKelvy having discovered fresh evidence in the matter. Your Committee adopt this course, under the authority of a resolution of the Supreme Grand Lodge, at its last session. Your Committee would also ask the Grand Lodge to request

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following rethe names of the County Masters to see that the returns are made out in a plain and legible hand-writing, as some of the members of the Committee, particularly the young ones, have to strain their eyes to make out some of the writing sent in on the returns, and they do not like to wear spectacles, so that in these cases it is very distressing.

Your Committee are sorry to see so many cases of expulsions for what they would call venal offences, indeed offences only against the By-Laws, such as for non-payment of dues and contempt of summonses. In these cases your Committee think it would be better to suspend until dues are paid, and thus save a great deal of trouble to the Order if the Lodges wish to restore such again to good standing.
