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EXPLANATION OF THE CALENDAR PAGES.

The first column shows the days of the week and the corresponding days of the month.

The second shows the Time of the Rising and Setting of the Sun.

The third shows the quantity, by which the Sun is too fast or too slow of Mean Time, or that time which ought to be given by a well regulated clock; which, whenever the mean time is required, must be added to all the calculations in this Almanack, when the Sun is too slow and subtracted when too fast.

The fourth column shows the Rising or the Setting of the Moon; her Setting being given between the change and full, and the Rising between the full and change.

The fifth column shows the time of high water next after the southing of the Moon; for the tide preceding her southing, half the difference between the times of high water on the day preceding and the day following will be a correction sufficiently accurate; for example, let it be required to find the time of high water on the Morning of January 2d; by the Almanack it appears that it will be high water January 1st, at 1H. 4M. afternoon; and January 2d, at 1H. 56M. afternoon; the difference being 24m. 52M. the half of which (12m. 26M.) being added to the former time or subtracted from the latter, gives 1H. 30M. A. M. for the time required. Indeed all calculations of the time of high water are approximations only; as the direction and strength of the wind have great effect upon the depth of the tide and in accelerating or retarding the time of high water.

The sixth column shows the time of the Moon's Southing, or passing the Meridian.

The seventh column contains the remarkable days observed by the Church, and astronomical phenomena.

At the top of the page, the longitudes of the Sun and Moon for every second day, at Noon, is given in Signs and Degrees.

It will be remembered, that in conformity to the long established custom, which has now become nearly inveterate, all the calculations in this Almanack, (excepting the Catalogue of Solar Eclipses) are expressed in Apparent Solar Time, or that mode of computation which supposes the Sun always to be on the meridian, or to South at 12 o'clock. On account of the Sun being more distant from the earth in summer than in winter, and of the inclination of the Ecliptic to the Equator, which cause the Sun to have a greater motion at one part of the year, than at another, the natural days (that is, the interval between two successive Southings of the Sun) are not equal, some being more, some less than 24 hours. But as clocks and watches cannot without great difficulty and expense, be made to measure time *unequally*, it is customary to suppose the day to be divided into 24 *equal* hours; this is called, Mean Solar Time; the difference between the Apparent and Mean Solar Time (usually denominated Sun Slow or Fast) being called the Equation of Time. To convert the calculations in this Almanack into Mean Time, the quantity, by which the Sun is slow or fast must be applied according to the directions above given.

SOLAR AND LUNAR ECLIPSES IN THE YEAR 1826.

May 21. The Moon totally eclipsed, wholly invisible at Halifax,
at 11h. 2m. morning.

June 5. The Sun eclipsed, invisible at Halifax ; δ at 1h.
40m. evening, in long. 2° 14' 27" δ's lat. 1° 5' South.

October 30. The Sun eclipsed, invisible at Halifax, δ at 9h.
7m. evening, in long. 7° 7' 6 1/2" δ's lat. 1° 30' 1/2" South.

Nov. 14. The Moon totally eclipsed, wholly invisible at Halifax,
δ at 11h. 52m. morning.

Nov. 29. The Sun eclipsed, invisible at Halifax, δ at 7h 23m
morning, in long. 88° 6' 46 1/2" δ's lat. 1° 12' 1/2" North. This eclipse
will be very large throughout the North of Europe. In London the
Sun will be 6° 38' eclipsed, in Paris 6° 12' on his northern limb.

The Occultations of the Planets and the large stars by the Moon, during
the Year 1826, are not numerous.

The Star "2 Alpha Cancri" will be occulted, on the evening
of February 20th. The Immersion will take place about 5h 30m P. M.
the Emergence about 6h 20m P. M.

The Planet Saturn will be occulted on the evening of March 15th.
Immersion about 10h p. m. Emerson about 10h 30m p. m.

The Star "1 Alpha Cancri" will be occulted on the evening of May 13th. Immersion about 8h 15m p. m. Emerson about 9h 15m p. m.

The same Star will be occulted on the morning of November 21st.
Immersion about 0h 30m a. m. Emerson about 1h 30m a. m.

The reader will scarcely require an apology for the insertion of the following catalogue of all the visible eclipses of the Sun, between the years 1825 and 1901, computed for Cambridge, (a town 3 miles distant from Boston, Massachusetts) in lat $42^{\circ} 23' 28''$ North and long. $71^{\circ} 7' 25''$ West. Although, in many instances, the difference between the aspects of the eclipse at Halifax and Boston, may be considerable, yet it will rarely happen, that the sun is eclipsed at one of these places, without also being eclipsed at the other. Indeed this is the only catalogue of eclipses for this continent, now extant; and having been calculated with the greatest care and with prodigious labor, some confidence may be placed in its general accuracy.

as to be at Windsor on Tuesday; and will sail from thence the first high water that happens at or after eight o'clock in the morning of that day: the Packet frequently goes twice or three times a week when business requires it.

TIME OF GOING THROUGH THE FALLS.

THE Falls are level (or still water) at about three hours and an half on the flood, and about two hours and an half on the ebb, which makes it passable four times in 24 hours, about 10 or 15 minutes each time. No other rule can be given; as much depends on the floods in the river St. John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

A L M A N A C K.

Although the terms *Calendar* and *Almanac* are in general regarded as synonymous, there is, nevertheless, a material distinction between them.

The calendar, strictly speaking, refers to time in general—the almanac to only that portion of time which is comprehended in the annual revolution of the earth round the sun, and marking by previous computation, numerous particulars of general interest and utility; religious feasts; public holidays; the days of the week; corresponding with those of the month; the increasing and decreasing length of the day; the variations between true and solar time; tables of the tides; the sun's passage through the zodiac; eclipses; conjunctions and other motions of the planets; &c. &c.; all calculated for that portion of duration comprehended within the YEAR.

We may with propriety use the words *Calendar* or *Almanac* for any particular year; but, as allusive to Time in general, *Calendar* can alone be properly applied.
