**Sabbath School Teachers' Meeting** every Wednesday at the close of prayer meeting for the study of the lesson.

**The Regular Business Meetings** of the Sabbath School Association are held on the last Thursday of every month.

**The Ladies' Aid Association** meets every Thursday at 2.30 p. m.

**The Ordinance of Baptism** is dispensed on the first Sabbath of every month, at the commencement of the morning service, and on the first Wednesday of every month at the commencement of the prayer meeting.

**The Ordinance of the Lord's Supper** is dispensed on the first Sabbath of March, June, September and December.

## REVENUE.

The whole revenue of this congregation is derived from weekly contributions by envelope and the plate collections.

All subscribers by envelopes are supplied with envelopes on the first Sunday in each quarter.

Members and adherents who are not subscribers may be supplied with envelopes on application to any of the managers.

All subscribers are expected to contribute a fixed sum weekly, and if from any cause they are unable to do so, they shall be expected to make up all deficiencies at their earliest convenience.

Subscribers in arrears are notified of the same on the second Sunday of each month.

Any subscriber wishing to increase or decrease their contributions are requested to notify the managers so that a corresponding alteration may be made in the books.

Each subscriber is particularly requested to see that their envelopes are properly sealed and their name and pew number on the outside before it is handed in.

Special collections for reducing the mortgage debt are taken up on the third Sundays of June and October

### MISSION COLLECTIONS.

Collections for the Mission Schemes of the Church are received by envelope on the first Sunday of each month, and are placed in the boxes, which will be found on entering the Church just inside the doors.

If not convenient to give on the first of the month, any other time will do.

Those wishing to subscribe by envelope, and who are not at present supplied, can secure envelopes by applying to any of the members of the committee or to Mr. Warren, Church officer.

It is expected that as far as possible subscribers will give a definite sum every month, and if subscribers fall in arrears they will be notified of the same as often as the committee think it best.

*Held on the Evening of Wednesday, January 15th, at 8 O'clock, in the Church.*

After tea, which was served by the ladies in the basement from 6.30 to 8 o'clock, the regular meeting was opened by the Pastor engaging in prayer and reading a portion of Scripture.

Rev. Dr. Fraser then called on the congregation to elect a Secretary for the evening, which they did on motion of Mayor McLellan, who proposed W. H. McLaren. This was duly seconded and carried.

Moved by Ald. James Dixon, seconded by Mr. D. McLean, that the minutes of the last annual meeting be taken as read.—Carried.

In the absence of the Chairman of the Board through sickness, Mr. A. Richardson, the Manager's report was read by the Secretary, Mr. Moffat, when it was moved, seconded and carried that the same be received and considered clause by clause.

After considerable friendly discussion, Ald. James Dixon moved, seconded by Mr. J. G. Gibson, that the Managers' report as a whole be adopted.—Carried.

A letter of resignation to the Managing Board was read from Mr. F. H. Ross, which was accepted on motion of Mr. Moffat, seconded by Mr. J. Kilgour.

A similar letter was read from Mr. Brennen, when Mr. James Ogilvie moved, seconded by Mr. J. G. Gibson, that Mr. Brennen be requested to withdraw his resignation.—Carried.

The report of the Treasurer, Mr. Colin Arthur, was submitted, when W. H. McLaren moved, seconded by James Cheyne, that the same be received as read.—Carried.

Moved by Mayor McLellan, seconded by Mr. H. S. Wallace, that the Treasurer's report be adopted.—Carried.

The report of the Home Sunday School was read by the Secretary, Mr. W. J. Cunningham, when it was moved by Mr. E. Bethune, and duly seconded, that the same be adopted.—Carried.

The report of the Sunday School Treasurer, Mr. J. M. Gow, was then read, when Mr. J. A. Moffat moved, seconded by Mr. James Kilgour, that the same be adopted.—Carried.

In the absence of the Secretary of the Mission School through illness, Mr. A. McPherson, his report, along with that of the Treasurer, Miss Ida Malcolmson, and the Building Committee, were read by W. H. McLaren, when Ald. James Dixon moved, seconded by Mr. W. Macaulay, that they be adopted.—Carried.

The report of the Missionary Society was read by the Secretary, Mr. R. McRae, which on motion of Mr. Wm. Givin, seconded by Mr. James Ogilvie, was adopted.

The report of the Auxiliary of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society as read was adopted on motion of Mr. James Ogilvie, seconded by Mr. Kilgour.

The reports of the Secretary and Treasurer of the Ladies' Aid Society were adopted on motion of W. H. McLaren, seconded by Mayor McLellan.

Moved by Wm. Givin, seconded by J. G. Gibson, that the report of the Treasurer of the Missionary Society, Mr. W. J. Cunningham, be adopted as read by him.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. J. Scott, seconded by Mr. W. H. McLaren, that Messrs. A. Parkhill, Walter Turnbull, W. Mathie, J. A. McLaren, J. M. Gow, J. G. Cheyne, T. H. Smith, W. Brennen, W. Kilgour, John Russell, W. R. Davis, R. A. Campbell be ushers for 1890.—Carried.

The following gentlemen were appointed Missionary Committee and officers for 1890: Wm. Givin, President; W. J. Cunningham, Treasurer; R. McRae, Secretary; Messrs. J. A. Moffat, J. M. Gow, C. Kilgour and John McKenna.

Moved by Mayor McLellan, seconded by Mr. J. Ogilvie, that the hearty thanks of the congregation be hereby tendered to the managers, officers and teachers of the Sunday Schools, officers and committee of the Missionary Society, Ladies' Aid Society, Women's Auxiliary of the Foreign Missionary Society, Choir, Trustees, Auditors, Ushers, Y. P. S. C. E. and all other

workers in connection with the congregation for their valuable services rendered during the year.

It was moved, seconded and carried, that Dr. Fraser vacate the chair and that W. H. McLaren take the same.

Ald. James Dixon moved, seconded by Mr. Wm. Macaulay, that the salary of the Rev. Mungo Fraser, B. D., D.D., be \$3,000 to date from the 1st January, 1890, payable monthly in advance.—Carried.

Dr. Fraser thanked the congregation for their kindness, after which a most harmonious meeting was brought to a close by singing, "Blest Be the 'Tie That Binds."

## FORTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

—OF THE—

## Managing Committee of Knox Church

For the Year Ending 31st December, 1889.

Your committee beg leave to present their report for the past year as follows :

It will be seen by referring to the Treasurer's statement that the following amounts have been received: Envelope collections, \$5,408.64; loose collections, \$960.40; mortgage debt collections, \$548.35, with \$5.66 interest, making a total of \$6,923.05, and after meeting all current liabilities and reducing the mortgage debt \$1000, there still remains in the Treasurer's hands a balance of \$595.20.

The number of subscribers by envelope are 458, giving the sum of \$110.77 per Sabbath, an increase over last year of 25 subscribers and \$4.02 per Sabbath.

Appended to this report will be found a statement of the number of subscribers and the amount given by each, which your committee believe will be of interest to the congregation.

Your committee would continue to recommend that special collections be taken up on the third Sundays of June and October for still further reducing our debt.

Your committee have had under consideration the necessity of making repairs to the exterior of the church, such as new roof, new steps in front of the church, removing fence, painting, etc. and as these repairs cannot with safety be delayed any longer your committee ask power to have them done as soon as possible, and that the surplus of this year as well as what will be necessary from the income of next year be devoted to this purpose.

The following members of committee retire by rotation this year, viz.: Messrs. J. Kilgour, D. Brown and C. Arthur, and as the resignations of Messrs. F. H. Ross and M. Brennen are in the hands of the committee you will require, if you accept these, to appoint one in Mr. Ross' place to serve one year and one in Mr. Brennen's place to serve two years.

In conclusion your committee express thankfulness to God for every token of spiritual and material prosperity, and desire to unite with the congregation in asking, that as pastor and people we may be permitted to work together in harmony for the advancement of His Kingdom in our midst.

## FIFTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

—OF—

## Knox Church Sabbath School Association.

*For the Year ending 31st December, 1889.*

.....

The number on the roll, after going carefully over it, is as follows, viz. Officers and male teachers, 23; female teachers, 34; boys, 272; girls, 318: in all 647, or an increase of 76 over last year's total.

The average attendance for 1889 is as follows, viz: Officers and male teachers, 20; female teachers, 28; boys, 207; girls, 247; in all 502, an increase of 35 over last year. This makes the record for the past year, the best in the history of our school.

The collections for the year have been exceptionally good. We have raised altogether for general expenses \$383.88, and for missions \$124.14, or an average of about \$9.75 per Sabbath. Then independently of this, a number of the classes have contributed for missionary and other charitable objects, the handsome sum of \$177.05. Of this Mr. W. H. Davis' class of young men gave \$80.00; Miss S. H. McKean's class, \$32.00, and some of the smaller classes through missionary boxes \$18.01, this latter amount has been handed over to the Women's Auxiliary of the Foreign Missionary Society.

The system adopted about two years ago, of presenting prize banners at the end of each quarter, to the classes having the best average attendance, has been faithfully carried out during the past year, and has no doubt been the means of encouraging the scholars to be more regular in their attendance. We still present a small prize card to every scholar who brings a new pupil to the school, and this scheme also has had the effect of increasing the membership.

The scholars have been regularly supplied with the "Northern Messenger". We find this to be as suitable a Sunday School paper of its kind as can be had, and the scholars look eagerly for it.

Those of us who have been connected with the school for some years back, cannot fail to observe the wonderful improvement in the general order and management. Pupils and classes that were once considered almost beyond Sunday School control, are now to be seen behaving in a manner more becoming the House of God; and while we can yet do still more in this line, it is very satisfactory to know that we can at last commend ourselves on the good order which everywhere prevails. This improvement has been mainly the result of our worthy superintendent's untiring efforts, in seeing that the rules of the school are strictly adhered to by the scholars and teachers alike.

As far as we can learn, not a single death has occurred in our ranks during the past year; and for this merciful care over us at the hands of an ever loving Father in Heaven, our hearts go out in sincere gratitude.

A teachers' meeting for the study of the lesson, has been held at the close of the Wednesday evening prayer meeting, and although this gives everyone an excellent opportunity to prepare the lessons; we regret to say the teachers do not all make the best use of it, for it is not very well attended.

We are pleased to notice that the "Sunday School Times", an excellent paper of help and comments on the International Sunday School Lessons, has been more largely subscribed for by our teachers, for the ensuing year than formerly. The publishers have reduced the cost of subscription to the reasonable sum of 50 cents per annum, and this now places it within the reach of all.

Our quarterly services have been held as usual in the church, and have been very well attended by the teachers and scholars, but we fail to notice any particular increase in the interest shown by the parents in these services. It is the duty of every parent, who can possibly do so, to come out to these services, and thereby encourage our teachers in the task of educating the minds of the children.

At the beginning of the year the library was thoroughly renovated, and the number of books increased to 965. Owing to the delay in securing suitable books, and the labor involved in numbering them and preparing a catalogue, the library was not opened until the 14th April. From then until November 24th it has been made constant use of by about 497 scholars

and teachers. We are just now calling in the books so as to start afresh with the new year. Our librarian, Mr. Charles Kilgour, reports that books were changed during that time on alternate Sundays for boys and girls as follows, viz: For boys 15 times with an average of 106 books; girls 16 times with an average of 162 books. The library at present is in very good condition, and has been found quite sufficient to meet the requirements of the school.

In conclusion we desire to thank God for the very evident outpouring of His Holy Spirit upon our school during the year that has just closed, and to pray that a still greater measure may follow the labors of our officers and teachers during the year 1890.

*To the Members and Adherents of Knox Church.*

The officers and teachers of the Mission Sabbath School, in presenting their second annual report, would express their thanks to the Great Giver of all good, for the measure of success which has attended their humble efforts during the year just closed.

At the last annual meeting we intimated in our report that the building we then met in would only be available until spring, and that through the kindness of some friends who had taken an interest in our work, and expressed the hope that the congregation would take some action towards the purchase of a lot on which to erect a school room, which resulted in the meeting passing a resolution appropriating \$500.00 for that purpose.

The owners of the sail loft requiring that place for their own use, we had to leave it earlier in the year than we anticipated and there being no other building available in that neighborhood, we were compelled to hold our school in the basement of the church, which naturally cut the attendance down to a very few.

A circular was prepared and issued to the members of the congregation, soliciting subscriptions towards the erection of a building, which was responded to most heartily. Donations came in from other sources, such as the Young Men's Bible Class, Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor and several classes from the parent school, and even from persons outside of the congregation altogether.

Accompanying this report is the statement of the Treasurer, giving in detail the receipts and expenditure in connection with the building, and current expenses of the school for the year, which must be gratifying to the whole congregation, as it is indeed to those who have had the privilege of taking an active part in the work.

During the first part of the year, while the meetings were held in the basement of the church, no record of the attendance was kept, but since the opening of the new building the attendance has ranged from 132 to 182, the average attendance being 143.

## Report of Mission School Building Committee.

The Mission School Building Committee beg to report, that early last spring they set about the work entrusted to them by you at the last annual business meeting, namely that of selecting a site and the erection thereupon of a suitable building for mission school work. The lot selected was unanimously agreed upon by the committee, and we are glad to know that so far as any expression of opinion has reached us, the congregation endorse our selection. Tenders were then called for, and the lowest, that of Mr. Milne's accepted, it being over \$100.00 lower than any other. The work was pushed forward with the least possible delay, and on the last day of June it was opened by Dr. Fraser.

Your committee most sincerely thank the congregation and other kind friends, for the substantial aid and friendly sympathy shown them in their efforts to provide suitable quarters for carrying on Christian work, in a part of the city hitherto largely neglected.

Besides the large number of cash subscriptions as shown in the Treasurer's report, we wish to acknowledge as gifts from various friends, complete set of gas fixtures; a new clock; large quantity of new stove pipes; a new stove; mottoes brought from England for us; lumber for a wood shed; printing and supplying circulars and envelopes; legal services of preparing deed and searching title; and other gifts.

It affords us much pleasure to hand over this property, worth over \$2000.00 practically free of debt. The remaining debt is only \$275.00. \$200.00 of this is to be paid by Mr. J. E. Tuckett, whose cheque will be to hand shortly, and our good friend Mr. Brennen has a lady friend who is coming to our aid to wipe out the balance.

In presenting this, the 21st annual report, your committee desire to acknowledge, with grateful hearts, the blessings and privileges of another year.

Although the committee has been able to accomplish but very little, during the year, to stimulate missionary zeal in our congregation, yet we are pleased to be able to state that the Collectors' Books show an increase over last year, of \$50.00, and the special annual collections, an increase of \$77.00.

While this intelligence may be gratifying, yet, in view of our greatly increased membership, the increase in the collections falls short of what might have been reasonably expected.

The regular collections for the year, are as follows: Per Lady Collectors, \$596.57; Special Annual Collection, \$126.65; total, \$723.22. This is considerably less than one dollar per member per year, or less than ten cents per month.

We hope and trust that, during the year upon which we have entered so pleasantly, the congregation will be enabled and *inclined* to make the mission contributions average, at least, ten cents per month, which, with our present membership would amount to over one thousand dollars.

In view of the difficulty and uncertainty attending the collecting of the missionary funds, under the present system, your committee, after due consideration of the matter, desire to present the following suggestion, viz:

That, in future, or until such time as another change may be deemed advisable by the congregation, the subscriptions intended for missionary purposes, be enclosed in envelopes, with name and number of pew of subscriber thereon, and that these envelopes be deposited in the proper receptacles, at the doors of the church, on the first Sunday of each month, or as soon thereafter as convenient.

## Young Peoples' Society of Christian Endeavor.

It is with much pleasure and thankfulness that the Society of Christian Endeavor present their annual report.

In October 1888, the society was organized with a roll of 16 Active and 21 Associate members. Since then prayer meetings have been held with but two exceptions every Monday evening, numbering 60 meetings in all, 27 of which were led by young women, and 33 by young men; 16 young women and 12 young men having officiated in the capacity of leader. Although quite a number of our members have left the city, our roll is steadily increasing, having on December 31st 37 Active and 37 Associate members.

As each Active member is conscientiously bound to take some part in every meeting, we are, by a careful study of the given subjects, and the daily Bible reading, made more familiar with the Truth, consequently the members are becoming more competent, willing, and faithful in the service of the Master. The committee, though composed of young people who were never before engaged in church work of any kind, have done well. The Society has visited a great many of the strangers in the congregation during the year, and in order that these might become better acquainted, social concerts were given on the evenings of December 4th, 1888, March 22nd, 1889, June 4th, 1889, and October 17th, 1889. At each of these there was a large attendance and everything was satisfactorily arranged. On the evening of March the 8th, 1889, a missionary meeting was held, for which papers on Home and Foreign Mission work were prepared and read by members of the Society. Vocal and instrumental music varied the programme, making the evening a very pleasant and profitable one.

The society does not require much money to carry on its own work, but after paying all expenses \$65.00 has been devoted to the Mission School, and \$25.00 to the Mission Fund of the church.

# CONSTITUTION

—OF—

## KNOX CHURCH, HAMILTON.

1st.—The Church, Manse, Burying Ground, and any other Houses or Real Estate now belonging to or which may hereafter become the property of the Congregation, shall be held in Trust by three members of the said Congregation, in full Communion, in accordance with a Deed of Trust—bearing date the Sixth Day of September, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-six.

2nd.—The members in Full Communion with the Congregation shall have the sole power of choosing a Minister or Pastor and Elders of said Congregation.

3rd.—The election of a Minister or Pastor shall take place at a meeting of the Members of the Congregation, which shall have been called from the Pulpit of the Church by the officiating minister on each of the two Sabbaths preceding such meeting. The majority of Members present shall determine the election.

4th.—The method of the election of the Elders shall be determined from time to time, by the Session, as occasion may require; but the election shall be by the Members of the Congregation, and notice of meeting for such election shall be given as provided in Clause Third.

5th.—The constitutional duty of the Session to superintend the Spiritual affairs and watch over all the interests of the Congregation is recognized and reserved to them.

6th.—Nine managers shall be elected to take charge of the secular affairs of the Congregation, three of whom shall retire annually in rotation, but shall be eligible for re-election. In case of a vacancy occurring by resignation or otherwise, the Managers themselves shall fill the vacancy at their earliest convenience; and a Manager absenting himself from three successive regular meetings without leave shall cease to be a Manager.

7th.—The Managers shall elect their own Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary, hold regular meetings as often as their business may require, and may give notice of their meetings, either from the Pulpit on Sabbaths or by the Secretary to each Manager, when demanded by any three of them. Five Managers shall constitute a quorum. When the Managers shall themselves deem it necessary, or when requested to do so by seven or more Members of the Congregation in Full Standing, they shall with concurrence of the Session call a special meeting of the Congregation, stating the object in the notice thereof; and no business shall be entertained at any Special Meeting excepting what is mentioned in the notice thereof. Should any Manager cease to be a member of the Congregation he shall cease to be a Manager. The Treasurer shall open an account with some regular Chartered Bank in the city, and deposit in his own name, as Treasurer of the Managing Committee, monies from time to time as may be convenient.

8th.—The use of the Church property for public and general purposes not connected with the Congregation shall be under the control of the Managers, with the concurrence of the Minister.

9th.—The whole revenues of the Congregation, from all sources, shall be received and disbursed by the Managers in payment of Stipend, Salaries and other expenses, including such as may be required for preserving the property and providing for the dispensation of Divine Ordinances; but no repairs, improvements or alterations exceeding the sum of One Hundred Dollars shall be gone into without the consent of the Congregation. The "Poor Fund," however shall be distributed by the Session, and contributions for Missionary and Benevolent purposes shall be distributed by the Association appointed for these special purposes.

10th.—The Members of the Congregation shall choose their Organist and Precentor, and fix their salaries, and in the discharge of their duties they shall be under the control of the Session.

11th.—The Managers shall have power to engage or dismiss, and regulate salary of any one who may act as Church Officer or Door Keeper; and appoint or pay such person or persons as may be required to keep the Church clean and comfortable.

12th.—The Managers shall be accountable to the Congregation for their acts, and shall, at each annual meeting in January, submit a full printed, audited, articulate Statement of the Income and Expenditure of the preceding year—copies of which shall be distributed in the pews on the Sabbath before the Annual Meeting; and said Managers shall be regulated as to the proportion of revenue to be applied to any particular purpose by the instructions they may receive from the Congregation at any Special or Annual Meeting.

13th.—A Committee, consisting of the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of the Managing Committee, two members of Session, the Secretary of the Sabbath School, and Secretaries of all the organizations in connection with the Congregation, shall annually arrange for the printing—in pamphlet form—of the reports of all the different organizations in connection with the Congregation, together with the list of office-bearers, members and adherents, with their residences; said pamphlet to be distributed to the Congregation as early as possible after the annual business meeting and not later than March 1st. The Chairman of the Managers shall be Chairman of the said Committee.

14th.—The Managers or Trustees shall have no power to contract debt on property without the consent of the Congregation.

15th.—At each annual meeting the Congregation shall elect three Trustees and two Auditors to serve for one year.

16th.—The foregoing rules shall be in force until altered or amended; and no motion to alter or amend said rules shall be put, unless due notice of such motion has been given at the annual meeting of the Congregation; and when notice of motion shall have been made, a special meeting of the Congregation shall be called to consider the same—not sooner than two weeks, not later than two months after said annual meeting.

17th.—In the foregoing rules, no one shall be held to be a member of the Congregation who is not in Full Communion with the same, and whose name does not appear on the Communion Roll of the said Congregation, and no others than members in Full Communion shall be allowed to vote at any Congregational meeting.
