









race. The volunteer ran to windward of the Thistle in a way that satisfied all the spectators who knew anything about it that the American boat would win. On each tack that followed, the Volunteer continued to get to windward, and ahead as well.

The wind at the start was blowing about 20 miles an hour. It maintained that velocity all the way out except during a period of perhaps 50 minutes when it let down considerably, during which time the Thistle people claimed that they were becalmed while the Volunteer held the wind. Really the contestants were equally affected.

The boats set spinnakers coming hours, and the question as to whether the broad center could go fast enough before the wind to make up the latter's gain in windward work was soon to be decided. The Volunteer had a lead of fully 2 1/2 miles when the Thistle rounded and that was not diminished much on the run. The Thistle was the first to take in her spinnaker, but the Volunteer followed suit immediately. This move was occasioned by the fact that neither boat could make the lightship with the wind at and a haul up was necessary on the run home. The wind let up as well. It dropped to 10 miles an hour, yet the Volunteer got there all the sooner. The accompanying boats tooted their horns in grand style at every possible opportunity, and the spectators, by cheering and waving their handkerchiefs, evoked their delight at the result. The steamboats had much trouble in getting back to the finish line in time to see the Volunteer successfully defend the American cup. Most of them wanted to see the Thistle round the outer mark. That detained them nearly 15 minutes, but once under way for home they maintained a jolly good speed and leaving the Thistle far astern, they got there in time to see the American aloft across the line a winner by 11 minutes and 48 seconds.

In the windward work the Volunteer beat the Thistle 14m. 49s. On the run before the wind the Thistle beat the Volunteer 5m. 54s.

After the race Mr. Bell admitted that the Volunteer with her centreboard had fairly beaten the Thistle in the racing to windward. He was rather inclined to the opinion that a centreboard was a pretty useful thing.

#### HOW A POST OFFICE THIEF ESCAPED.

MONTREAL, Sept. 29.—An employee of the Montreal post office named Lester has been on trial for the last few days for stealing money letters from the post office. The evidence in the case was clear against the prisoner. The counsel for the defence, in their address to the jury, which consisted of six Englishmen and six French Canadians, urged the latter to discharge the prisoner as he was a compatriot. The jury were locked up all night, but announced yesterday they could not agree on a verdict. The six English jurors, in view of the undoubted evidence against the prisoner, were to be discharged simply on the ground of his nationality.

#### IMPROVEMENTS.

HALIFAX, N.S., Sept. 16.—The Intercolonial railway authorities are making extensive preparation for the carriage of the Asiatic mails this winter, which are expected to come by Canadian Pacific steamers to British Columbia, thence carried across the continent by the all Canadian route to Halifax for transportation to Europe. About 120 miles of new rails of extra heavy pattern are being laid down between Halifax and Lewis, replacing the light 66-pound rails. About eight miles of snow fencing and one and a half miles of iron and wooden sheds are to be erected before winter sets in. These improvements will, it is expected, render delays such as occurred last winter, next to impossible in any ordinary season. The total expenditure in this connection will reach \$150,000. Ballast trains are also working briskly on all divisions of the road, and the roadway will be put in better condition than ever to meet the constantly increasing traffic.
