### General Intelligence

**SOME ANECDOTES OF INGERSOLL**  
Col. Ingersoll always appreciated a  
joke, even when he was the victim of it.  
One which he delighted to tell was about  
the fidelity with which his wife attended  
his lecture. She never allowed her-  
self to miss a lecture, and she always  
occupied a seat in the prominent box, last  
seat shielded from the public gaze.  
After her husband had been speaking  
for a few minutes she would be lulled into  
sleep, and the result was that she was  
obliged to read in the morning news-  
papers next day the lecture she attended.  
Nobody else ever slept while the  
Colonel talked.

Col. Ingersoll and a friend were talk-  
ing one day about the man who was not  
to have an other shirt made for himself  
agreed to a shirtmaker who was  
honest enough to give the woman who  
did the work the 1.50 each that he was  
willing to allow.  
"I've all right," said he, "I'll wait," said  
his friend. "Shirtmaker's fortunes are  
not built that way."  
"Then, will you wait," was the reply.  
"Henceforth I wear no shirt until I  
have seen the woman who makes it, and  
she has told me herself that she got  
paid for her work."

In Ingersoll's early religious education  
the torments of hell played a large part,  
and he was so much affected by the  
story as to be a man of a very  
laid as soon as he began to be old enough  
to think. Accordingly to Col. Ingersoll's  
own account, the beginning of the  
minister described the man as well  
minister before a Sunday school. Dives  
and Lazarus was the subject, and the  
minister described the man as well  
suffering tortures and in vain  
begging Abraham for a drop of water.  
"Not up and went on the way," Col.  
Ingersoll, "knowing in my boyish heart  
that that was a lie. From that day to  
this I have never believed in the dogma  
of eternal punishment."

He was then less than nine years old.  
When his father having learned of his  
trouble for Robert. The trouble took  
place in the barn, and the instrument  
was used on the neck of the boy.  
Ingersoll's hands, after which there was  
prayer for the guidance of the erring  
son. He went out smarting, but was  
not convinced.

Great as his local reputation as a party  
animal had been before 1870, it was not  
until that year, the National Con-  
vention of the Republican party in  
Cincinnati, where he made the speech  
proposing G. Blaine as a candidate  
for the nomination for the Presidency,  
that he won his supreme national fame.  
A sentence that especially caught the  
popular fancy was this: "Like an  
armed warrior, like a plumed knight,  
James G. Blaine marched down the  
halls of the American Congress and  
there his shining lance fell and fair  
game was broken forth of the country  
defender of this country and malinger of  
its honor."

The phrase, the "plumed knight," was  
caught up by friend and foe alike and  
clung to Blaine until his death.  
One of the most exciting incidents in  
the life of Colonel Ingersoll, and perhaps  
the only one that has ever been re-  
corded by his audience occurred in 1884,  
which nominated General Harrison for  
President, and after an ex-  
ception had been extended by reason of  
the fact that the mention of Blaine's  
name had made it impossible for the de-  
legates to agree upon a nominee.

Upon the evening of the second day of  
the balloting the managers decided to  
take the ballot and then adjourn. The  
auditorium was packed to the ceiling by  
an immense audience, many of whom  
had arrived at a point on the hillside  
where they wanted something for their money.  
There were loud cries for speech, and  
finally Col. Ingersoll consented to  
talk. He made one of the most brilliant  
speeches of his life, relating the kind of  
man the Republican convention should  
nominate for President, and after an  
especially bright effort he said: "And the  
man who fills all these conditions, patriot,  
statesman and statesman, is General  
Graham."

Instantly the place became a pandemonium.  
The friends of the rival candidates  
felt that an improper advantage had  
been taken of them and they refused to  
allow the Colonel to speak farther.  
He endeavored for some time to quell  
the disturbance and finally left the platform  
dejected.

Col. Ingersoll regarded Victor Hugo's  
"Les Miserables" as the greatest single  
"literary achievement in history. He was  
also a great admirer of Dickens, though  
his author's last comments on American  
customs and habits so enraged Col. Ingersoll  
that he declined the invitation to  
visit the Englishman on the occasion of  
his last visit to New York, and ever af-  
terward regretted it. He was something  
of an art critic and was passionately de-  
voted to Wagner's music. In fact he  
used to say that, outside of his own home,  
the German opera was the joy of his life.  
He had a wide acquaintance among stage  
folk, and was one of those who helped  
Julia Marlowe to her success. Every  
actor who ever knew the Colonel declares  
that he would have made one of the great  
actors of the age had he turned his talents  
in that direction.

In connection with the manner of In-  
gersoll's death, it is recalled that when dis-  
missing his last moments, he always ex-  
pressed the hope that his life would sud-  
denly be snuffed out, and that was the  
manner of his taking off.

F. H. Ridgeway, and who said he was a  
promoter, called upon Farmer John

delphia and return in a few days with  
the remaining \$5000 in cash.  
Subsequently another stranger ap-

### LAWSON'S NARROW ESCAPE.

**THE CITY EXPERIENCES ANOTHER FIRE.**  
VICTORIA, B. C., July 26.—Miners  
just returned by steamer bringing news  
that the city of Dawson had a very nar-  
row escape from destruction by fire on  
the afternoon of July 7th. The blaze  
commenced at a point on the hillside  
of the town, between Second and  
Third streets, and fifteen cabins were  
quickly consumed. The fire soon  
spread to the westward and the fire soon  
expired from lack of fuel. The police  
are endeavoring to locate the man who  
caused the fire. The only man who  
is a fire protection other than that offered  
by a volunteer brigade. The force was  
without remuneration except as they  
were paid for their services. The fire  
was not extinguished until July 8th  
it was decided to disband as a body on  
July 10th.

A public school is to be established in  
Dawson, the Yukon council having made  
an appropriation of \$800 for books. A  
committee of the council will be held  
with clergymen and leading men in re-  
gard to organizing the school.

**WEST MURON ELECTION CASE.**  
OTAWA, July 28.—When the privi-  
leged 2nd elections committee met this  
morning Sir Louis Davies and Dr. Bus-  
well proposed to examine Michael Tobin  
and other officials who had been present  
in poll 4, Colbourne.  
Mr. Borden (Hallas) objected that  
these men had only been a day or  
two, while there were a couple of dozen  
others who had been waiting for a week  
or ten days and wanted to go home. He  
asked that they should first be disposed of.  
Sir Louis Davies pointed out that an  
order had been passed that all the  
officials were to be examined first, and  
he insisted that this rule should be  
observed. In that event he was willing  
to consider that there was a quorum  
present and go on.  
Mr. Fortin on being appealed to  
thought the rule might be observed.  
After some discussion the ruling of the  
chair that the officials be examined as  
arranged for before the other witnesses  
were called was sustained.  
Mr. Tobin was examined by Mr. Bus-  
well and stated that he had been in  
charge of the poll book all day except  
during dinner, when John Lawson, one  
of the Holmes scrutineers, kept it.  
There were eighteen entries, while  
Lawson was in charge. After he came

### BOUNDARY DISPUTE

**ACQUITTALS OF THE SITUATION BELIEVED  
AS A RESULT OF A CONFERENCE BE-  
TWEEN SECRETARY HAY AND  
MR. TOWER.**  
WASHINGTON, July 25.—The acquittal  
of the Alaskan boundary situation has  
been so much relieved, as a result of the  
conference yesterday between Secretary  
Hay and the British charge, Mr. Tower,  
that those who have taken the most active  
part in the negotiations feel they can  
leave the city for a summer vacation.  
Mr. Hay will go within a few days, and  
Mr. Tower leaves tomorrow for Newport,  
where he will establish the British em-  
bassy for the rest of the summer.  
One of the effects of renewing direct  
negotiations in Washington to establish  
the Anglo-American commission can-  
not re-assemble in Quebec on August 2.  
Toronto is only a week off, and as yet  
Great Britain has not named a commis-  
sioner to take the place of the late Lord  
Herschell. The purpose now is to secure  
a mode of settling the boundary question,  
and thus clear the way for a meeting of  
the commission late in the fall.  
The strong language used by Sir Wil-  
frid Laurier and Sir Charles Tupper has  
not found expression in the official state-  
ment, which are proceeding with every  
evidence of goodwill.

### FROM THE CAPITAL

**FREDERICK, July 26.**—Miss May

### WEST PRINCE ELECTION.

**A LARGE CONSERVATIVE MAJORITY AND CON-  
SERVATIVE ELECTED.**  
The first telegraphic report that Gal-  
land, the Liberal, had been re-elected for  
the Local House in the Third District of  
West Prince, P. E. I., though by a  
greatly reduced majority, appears to  
have been inaccurate. Pines, the Conser-  
vative, was elected by a majority of 21,  
the total vote being: Pines, 935; Gal-  
land, 904. In the election last year the  
total vote was: Galland, 1,083; Pines, 847.  
Liberal majority 236. The vote was  
slightly smaller than last year, as many  
were busy with the hay. The Conserva-  
tives made gains in every poll except  
two, and in one of these two they made  
the relative gain, the total vote being  
smaller. The Third District is largely  
composed of French Acadians, though  
there is a considerable English speaking  
vote. The Liberal government of the  
Island is rather a shaky coalition  
just now. The temperance people have  
declared against it as well as against  
the Ottawa combination and some suggested  
appointments from among the govern-  
ment supporters in the Legislature may  
not be made as the powers that be can  
scarcely afford to risk more by-elections.

### NEWS FROM THE PHILIPPINES.

**MANILA, July 27.**—Brigadier General  
R. H. Dild, with one thousand men,  
has captured Calamba, on Laguna Bay.  
The loss to the United States  
forces was four killed and twelve  
wounded.

Filipino circles in Manila that the  
number of deaths from cholera has  
decreased.
