The inducements that favored it in slavery days have gone forever, and a feeling of pride on the part of the race formerly 32. bondage has since sprung up that is in bondage massines spring up to the mingling of Caucasian and negro blood.

"Some philosophers have dreamed"

that the settlement of the vexed 'negro problem' would come easily and natural ly in the intermingling of the races. They argued that in course of time all the prejudice against the former slaves would die out, and that their descendants would intermarry with the descendants of the slave owners. So far all our experience has gone to disprove this theory. Race prejudice shows but little signs of abata ing, and, even at the North, where it is commonly supposed to exist in milder form than in the South, marriages between whites and blacks are very uns requent. In many of the States such a marriage is still illegal under the statue, teachers and classmates.
