

The balanced ration consisted of three parts by weight of corn and one part of wheat fed twice daily in the litter, and a mash mixture of two parts meat scrap added to two parts ground corn and one part bran fed in

self-feeding hoppers.

The 21 Barred Plymouth Rock pullets in each lot received the same house space and treatment, except for the difference in feed. The test period lasted for 140 days.


