Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 21.—American Legion posts throughout the United States were asked today by the Legion's national headquarters here to watch for a revival of German propaganda.

A bulletin sent out by the national headquarters said the object of the propaganda seemed intended to turn American sentiment against the Allies and to create "a powerful national political machine by the amalgamation of the disloyal elements in the population.

Mass meetings in New York, Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Chicago, Milwaukee, Louisville, Omaha and Cleveland have been planned, the bulletin said, as "one of the first national manifestations" of the propaganda campaign.





The trouble with the use of X-rays up to this time has been that they are not as penetrating as the so-called "gamma rays" of radium, and the problem of the Harvard physicians has been to secure this needed quality. It was known that to secure penetration it was necessary to employ a high frequency of vibration. The Harvard physicians, after a great number of experiments, at length found that a physical law known as the "quantam law" sphied to the X-ray spectrum and discovered that they could increase the frequency of the rays, and thus their penetration, by increasing the voltage of current used in the X-ray tube.

Professor Duane reports that the tube rose to pieces under a voltage of more han 150,000 volts, but that a sufficiently light voltage has been secured to make ha X-rays very nearly as effective for vertain medical purposes as the gamma are of radium.

The Germans, it is said, have made

creasing the medical value of X-rays, but much of it is being done simply with the scientific purpose of learning more about the mysterious rays and the laws which govern them.

Long-continued exposure to X-rays is so dangerous to the operator that the greatest pains have to be taken to protect him from them. In the Jefferson Physical Laboratory at Harvard, where Professor Duane makes his experiments, the X-ray plant is kept in a room by itself and the rays are sent out through a minute slit in the wall. The brick wall at this point is reinforced with lead, and a lead screen is placed across the door. Many experimenters in various places have been killed or seriously injured by the constant use of X-rays, although the exposure is so brief in the case of patients that there is no danger to them. In the new building of the Cancer Commission the X-ray plant will have a room to itself, and the rays will be sent out through slits to do their beneficent work.

Professor Duane was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in 1892 and from Harvard in 1893. He took his doctor's degree at Berlin in 1897, worked for many years in the Crule Radi, and Laboratory in Paris, and came to Harrard in 1913 as assistant professor of physics and research fellow of the Cancer Commission. In 1917 he was promoted to a new full professorship of bio-physics.

The discovery of the application of the quantum law to the X-ray spectrum was then made, according to which the frequency, multiplied by a certain well-known constant in physics, known as h, equals the energy which the electron has in the X-ray tube when it strikes the target.

It was also known that the energy was equal to the charge which the electron had, multiplied by the voltage applied to the tube. Therefore, it became clear that high frequency, and thus penetration, would result from an increase in the voltage.







Actually what Rheims will be doing is capitalizing the amount due for its reconstruction from the German indemnity. The city will itself have control of the expenditure of the money and will thus escape the delays and dangers of any state scheme.




