### THREE GREAT POWERS EXPECTED TO FAVOR TREATY REVISION

London, Feb. 21.—Agreement between Great Britain, France and Italy for alterations of the treaty of Sevres, favorable to the Turks, seemed probable here today, it was currently reported. Mr. Lloyd George called early this forenoon on Premier Briand, of France, going to the latter's hotel. They had a long conversation before proceeding to Downing Street for a conference with Foreign Minister Sforza of Italy. At this meeting the Italian representative formally ing the Italian representative formally presented to the British premier Italy's reasons for desiring a modification of reasons for desiring a modification of the Sevres treaty.

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 21.—American Legion posts throughout the United States were asked today by the Legion's national headquarters here to watch for a revival of German propaganda.

A bulletin sent out by the national headquarters said the object of the propaganda seemed intended to turn American sentiment against the Allies and to create "a powerful national political machine by the amalgamation of the disloyal elements in the population.

Mass meetings in New York, Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Chicago, Milwaukee, Louisville, Omaha and Cleveland have been planned, the bulletin said, as "one of the first national manifestations" of the propaganda campaign.







Aim to Avoid Loss of Time on Earth's Curvature.

Paris; Feb. 20.—That a straight line is not always the shortest distance beis not always the shortest distance tween two points has been realized by experts working on aviation maps, who have devised what are to be known as orthodromic arcs, representing arcs drawn to conform to the earth's surface while flying, just as navigators took their sailing directions from Mercator's projection chart rather than from flat drawn chartings.

These orthodromic arcs, according to

a report by the mathematical division of the French Academy of Sciences, give a simpler and more rapid solution to the problems of direction than has hitherto been possible, although to the uninitiated they might seem impracticable. For instance, if an aviator leaves Paris for Shanghai, instead of passing over central Europe he will save time by going northeast toward Petrograd and traveling diagonally across China to his
