WASHINGTON, Feb. 29, 1892 (received March 1)—Sir.—I am in receipt of your maren 1)—324th inst. respecting a renewal of the modus vivendi in Bering Sea, and I telegraphed its contents to the Marquis of telegraphed its contents to the Marquis of Salisbury. In that note, after saying that the delays have been much greater on the Part of Great Britain than on the part of the United States, you proceed to inform me that in the view of the President the modus should be much the same as that of last year in terms, that owing to the earlier date this year it could be more effectively executed, but that if Her Majesty's Government would make their efforts more effective the ing in the North Pacific Ocean should sealing in the North Pacific Ocean should be forbidden. After pointing out the great need of an effective modus, you state that holding on arbitration in regard to the rightful mode of taking seals while their destruction goes forward would be as if while an arbitration to the title to timber land were in progress one party should remove all the trees. I have to state that Lord Salisbury cannot adult that delays have been greater on the admit that delays have been greater on the part of Great Britain than on the part of the United States. Her Majesty's Governthe United States. Her Majesty's Govern-ment consented to a modus vivendi last year solely on the grounds that it was sup-posed that there would be danger to the preservation of the scal species in Bering Sea unless some interval in the slaughter of scals were prescribed. But Her Majesty's Government have received no information to show that so drastic a remedy is presessary for two consecutive seasons. On necessary for two consecutive seasons. On the contrary, the British commissioners on the Bering Sea joint commission have in-formed her Majesty's Government that so far as pelagic scaling is concerned there is far as pelagic scaling is concerned there is no danger of any serious diminution of the far seal species as a consequence of this year's huating. Nevertheless Lord Saltsbury would not object, as a temporary measure of precaution for this season, to the prohibition of all killing within a zone extending to not more than 30 nautical miles around the Priblylor Islands such prohibition.

Pribylov Islands, such prohibition being conditional on the number of seals to be killed for any purpose on the islands being a maximum of 20,000. Lord Salisbury being a maximum of 20,000. Lord Salisbury, referring to the passage in your note in which you compare the case to an arbitration about timber land from which the trees are being removed by one of the parties, observed that he hardly thinks the simile quite apposite. His Lordship suggests that the case is more like one of arbitration respecting the title to a meadow. While respecting the title to a meadow. The President cannot believe that the Government of Great Britain will, pending the flarbitration, countenance, much less justify or defend the continuance of pelagic sealing by its subjects. It should either assume responsibility for the acts of these sealers or restrain them from a pursuit the lawfulness of which is to be determined by arbitration. Lord Salisbury places his refusal to renew the modus of that year on the ground that there is no danger, as far as pelagic sealing is concerned, of serious diminution of the fur seal species. His Lordship seems to assume a determination of the arbitration against the United States and in favor of Great Britain, and that it is only a question of so regulating a common right to take seals as to preserve the species. Upon what principle does he assume that if our claims are established, any diminution of the seals, or indeed any taking of seals, is to be without recompense? In the opinion of the President it is not consistent with good faith that either party to an arbitration should, pending a decision in any degree, diminish the value of the subject of arbitration. Before an agreement for arbitration had been reached the prohibition of pelagic sealing was a matter of comity, and from the moment of the signing of that agreement it became, in his opinion, a matter of obligation. The proposition of Lord Salisbury to prohibit the killing of seals within a zone extending to sea more than 30 nautical miles around the Pribylov Islands is so obviously inadexuate and as impossible of execution that this Government cannot entertain it. The President hopes that Her Majesty's Government will consent to renew the arrangement of last year with the promptness which the exigency demands, and to agree to enforce it by retusing all clearances to sealing vessels for the prohibited waters and by recalling from those waters all such sealing vessels for the prohibited waters and by recalling from those waters all such vessels as have already cleared.

IN THE UNITED STATES SENATE.

WASHINGTON, March 9.—The Senate spent nearly three hours this afternoon in the consideration of the Bering Sea seal fisheries question. The Committee on Foreign Relations stated that it had not yet been able to fully consider the treaty and report it to the Senate. A large majority of the Senators were evidently of opinion that the treaty should be amended majority of the Senators were evidently of opinion that the treaty should be amended by the addition of a clause providing for the renewal of the meius vivendi, or that the resolution of ratification should be accompanied by a direction to the President to withhold exchange of ratifications until Great Britein consented to a renewal.

Artiole 15, the last, provides for the ratification of the treaty by the President by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and the Queen and the exchange of ratifications at Washington and London within six months from its date or earlier if possible.

TORONTO, March 9.—Among the bills introduced to-day was one by Mr. Balfour to provide for the admission of women to the study and practice of law.

Mr. Mowat, in reply to Mr. Hammell, said that it is not the intention of the Government at this session to place in the supplementary estimates a sum of money to be applied for the purpose of celebrating the 400th anniversary of the discovery of this continent. Mr. Wood (Hastings), in moving for a return showing the estimated quantity of pine now standing on Crown lands, charged that the Government had wasted these assets by devoting the money received from them to current expenditure.

Mr. Hardy, in refuting the argument that the capital of the Province was squandered when money derived from sales of timber was used not only on capital account but also on civil government, legislation, etc. said that it was contemplated at Con-

timber was used not only on capital account but also on civil government, legislation, etc., said that it was contemplated at Confederation that the receipts from these sources should be used as revenue. These resources are not capital, properly speaking. Supposing they were capital, the receipts from them had nearly all been expended on capital account for public buildings, railways, public works, etc. He repeated the statement made a couple of sessions ago as to the estimated mileage of unlicensed crown timber lands, and showed that there were 50,000,000,000 feet on unlicensed territory and 10,000,000,000 more on licensed territory. With these figures it was abaurd to talk of the depletion of the forests. The motion was adopted.

# DOMINION PARLIAMENT

The House Holds a Dull Half-Hour's Session.

Retaliatory Contract Labor Law Intro duced—Mr. Mills Moves for a New Dominion Map.

OTTAWA, March 9.—Mr. Taylor, Government whip in the House of Commons, has introduced a bill to prohibit the importation and migration of toreigners and aliens under contract or agreement to perform labor in Canada. This is a retaliatory measure against the United States. A similar one was before the House last session, but was withdrawn in view of the Conference between therepresentatives of the Governments of the Dominion and the United States at Washington, at which the Government hoped a compromise might be United States at washington, at which the Government hoped a compromise might be effected. However, as that hope was not realized, Mr. Taylor declares he will now press his bill upon the House. The bill provides that it shall be unlawful for any provides that it shall be unlawful for any person, company, partnership or corporation to assist the migration of foreigners under contract to perform labor in Canada, and that any such contracts shall be void. The penalty for every violation of the act is a fine of \$1,000. The master of any vessel landing immigrants in Canada who enter the country in violation of the act shall be liable to a fine of not more than \$500, and may also be imprisoned six months at hard labor. The exemptions from the operation of the act are servants of foreigners temporarily residing in Canada, and skilled workmen in new industries, actors, artists, lecturers, domestic dustries, actors, artists, lecturers, domestic servants and intending settlers; immi-grants unlawfully landed to be returned to

grants unlawfully landed to be returned to the country whence they came.

A Coal Famine in England. LONDON. March 10. - The coal crisis is suming an appalling aspect. In the manufacturing centers especially despair manufacturing centers especially despair prevails. The supplies are nearly exhausted, and unless relief comes immediately hundreds of factories will have to shut down, turning hundreds of thousands out of employment and depriving millions of their support. There is now no doubt that, with the coming stoppage of work by the miners, there will take place the greats and most, widespread stoppage of works. est and most widespread stoppage of work in the history of the coal trade of Great Britain and Ireland. The membership of the Federation comprises about 280,000 of the Federation comprises about 280,000 miners of whom 200,000 are bottom workers, the remaining 80,000 being employed on the surface, or at the pit bank, as it is called. In Birmingham there is only a week's supply of coal, and the manufacturers are in the utmost anxiety as to the future. A scarcity of coal and consequent stoppage of factories will mean a comparative scarcity of manufactured goods, and there is already a prospect that prices will soon stiffen. Bread has already advanced in London, owing to the rise in advanced in London, owing to the rise in coal, and the bakers look forward even to a higher price.

All these dresses were new, yet the arm-holes had deftly basted shields which, by themselves, indicated use. Soiled lace was basted around the bottom of one costume, but unfortunately the basting came some twelve inches and made a bad break in the business. One skirt, apparently of lace, proved on investigation to be made of some 30 yards of rich lace basted upon an old black silk skirt. There were four "beauties" of bonnets and six stout cloaks.

The total value of the undeclared goods is some \$3,000. The seven trunks were seized.

Mr. Aylesworth said that he had learned since his arrival in the city in the morning that a judgment had been given on certain undecided appeals. "He thought that there was no object in proceeding with the recount under the circumstances. Within six days from to-day any elector might request a recount. But he considered it a waste of time to begin with recounting the ballots when any

considered it a waste of this with recounting the ballots when any elector might within six days demand a recount. There would in that case be a Mr. Bayly said that judgment had been Mr. Sayly said that judgment had being given in favor of these appealed ballots being counted. According to clause 5 of the act he considered it imperative that

Mr. Aylsworth argued in reply that there was no reason why the recount should not be adjourned before it was begun. He con-sidered his reasons for adjourning as

Judge Davis then opened the envelope ontaining them and counted ten.

The undisputed ballets cast for Mr.

Iyman numbered 103. There were none Hyman numbered 103. There were non-of the bogus ballots marked for him in this

subdivision.

Mr. Bayly complained that no ballots cast in this subdivision had been initialed by the deputy returning officer, and that, therefore, there was no evidence that these ballet papers had been supplied by him.

therefore, there was no evidence that these ballot papers had been supplied by him. His honor said he had not the slightest doubt about the ballots having been supplied by the officers, and he would count them are good.

Eight subdivisions were recounted before 6 o'clock. At the end the figures were pre-cisely the same as those furnished by the deputy returning officers, with the single exception that in subdivision 7 Mr. Car-ling got only 109, instead of 110 votes as previously recorded. This increases Mr. Hyman's majority of good votes to 17. The court adjourned until this morning.

Judge Elliof Cornered by Mr. James Magee, Q.C.

A Queer Explanation for Going Back on a Previous Judgment.

The following argument at the close of

The following argument at the close of the extraordinary judgment of Judge Elliot, declaring the bogus voters good, reveals some of the methods of procedure of this strong partisan functionary:

Mr. Magee—Your honor has given judgment in the case of Lewis Allin. Are we to understand that it is to apply to all the other appeals as well? Our reason for inquiry is this: Your honor has dealt with the original notice given to Allin. His was the only case in which an amended notice was not served. The revising officer directed that the notices given by Mr. Lilley should be amended, and pursuant to his directions amended notices were given in every case but that of Allin, who by some oversight was omitted. Your honor has just now overruled the judgments in the Queen's Bench Division and the Court of Appeal, delivered in this very case of Allin on the question of the original notice. We wish to know if by applying your decisions in Allin's case to all the other appeals in which amended notices were given, your honor overrules also your own judgment that you had no power to interfere with the discretion of the revising udgment that you had no power to inter-tere with the discretion of the revising

fere with the discretion of the revising officer in allowing the amendment. Judge Elliot—What judgment do you refer to?

Counsel—When this question first came before your honor on the interim appeal in November last, you held that the original notices were invalid, but that you could make no order, as you could not interfere with the revising officer's powers of amendment. Your honor's judgment is reported in the Ontario reports in the case of Lilley ys, Allin.

vs. Allin.

Judge Elliot-I do not regard the amended notices as before me at all. I go by

amended notices as before me at all. I go by
the statement of the revising officer that
he proceeded upon the original notices.

Counsel—How could that he so when
amended notices were given? He must
proceed as the facts were. Even if he had
not done so, your honor must on these
appeals deal with all the facts as they
exist. Now, amended notices were given,
and the fact cannot be ignored, and we are
entitled to judgment as to them.

Mr. J. H. Fraser—I distinctly stated at
the time that I proceeded under the mandamus on the original notices.

the time that I proceeded under the mandamus on the original notices.

Mr. Magee—The revising officer certainly directed amended notices to be given. Mr. Macbeth, myself and other counsel were present. For the revising officer to say that he proceeded upon the original notices is idle. The mandamus directed him to proceed even on the original notices. But in fact the amended notices had been given, and that could not be ignored, and your honor also must here deal with that fact. In the case of Allin, in which you have just given judgment, there was no amended notice given. I ask you now whether your judgment applies to the others as well, who were furnished amended notices.



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

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

TURKEY AND THE TURKS. Mesrob Baghdasarian Addresses Large Audience on His Native People and Their Habits.

People and Their Habits.

The basement of the First Congregational Church was crowded last evening, when Mesrob Baghdasarian, a Turkish missionary, delivered an interesting and at times hu orous address on "Turkey and the Turkish People." He was clad in his native costume, in the garb the wealthy populace usually wear. Rev. Robert Aylward, paster of the church, introduced the speaker.

populace usually wear. Rev. Robert Aylward, paster of the church, introduced the speaker.

Mesrob Baghdasarian said he was not going to speak about the turkey that the children were so fond of for dinner, but of a large country. The Turks' time of prayer was at 7 o'clock, according to Turkish time, or 1 o'clock by European time. The speaker illustrated the way in which the Turk prayed, which would seem rather odd to Canadians. Sometimes 10,000 Turks were heard at one time yelling in their own language, "May the Sultan of Turkey live forever." Constantinople, he said, was called "the city of dogs," New York "the city of saloons," and Brooklyn "the city of churches." Turkey in Asia Minor was a very beautiful country. It abounded in fruits. We can truly say the Garden of Eden was in Armenia. Twenty cents will buy a load of watermelons, which consists of twenty melons. A workingman gets about 10 cents s day. Some get only 8 cents. A man with \$2,000 could go out there and live in grandeur with fine carriages and plenty of servants."

Mr. Baghdasarian sang a love song in the Turkish language. A young man when singing a love song held his finger in his right car. The young ladies sang such songs as if they were crying. The Armenians were very intemperate, but the Turks twee more temperate. "If I were in Turkey I could not look on the face of a woman unless I did it secretly," the speaker continued. "Thank God when I am here I can look at all the young ladies. A prophet has said that women are the servants of the devil. The ladies of Constantinople have their own time for sport and enjoyment. Sometimes they have their chance to display their love for a young man. The ladies of Constantinople are the handsomest women in the world excepting Canadian young ladies." The conduct of a woman weeping over the corpse of her dead husband was shown. She uttered such exclamations as: "O, my darling," "O, he was a handsome man," "He had sparkling eyes," etc.

When a boy arrived at the age of 12 years it was the duty of his father to take him to school. The teacher was allowed to beat his pupils as much as he pleased. The pupils were expected to study as loudly as they could in school. The boys kneeled on the floor, held their books in their hands and studied in a lond voice. They needed no gymnasium. They received enough physical exercise while they were at their books. If a single mistake were made by a pupil when reciting his lessons he was subjected to a severe thrashing. There were very few schools for women. The Turks believed that if women could write they would be always writing love letters.
