WHAT SENATOR HILL SAYS.

of ex-President Cleveland and a just
tribute to him, but it is a vindication of
the Democratic principles which he championed. The people were opposed to a
forcebill and desired tariff reform, and upon
those two issues we have won the victory.
I trust that our victory will carry with it
the control of the United States Senate,
which will enable us to place Democratic
egislation upon the Federal statute book.
We will then cease to be a mere Opposition
party and can secure the remedial legislation which the people demand and that opportunity will build up the Democratic party and can secure the remedial legislation which the people demand and that opportunity will build up the Democratic party and make it strong. We must carry out our pledges by reforming the tariff and reducing federal taxation, not by harsh and extreme measures, but upon the conservative lines indicated in our platform and in the speeches of our candidates. SENTENCED TO DEATH.

A Boy Murderer Will Suffer for His Crime.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Peter Schultz, the 16-year-old boy who was convicted of the murder of the 3-months-old child of Mary Worthmier last week, has been sentenced

worthmier last week, has been sentenced to death.
Judge Moore said, in sentencing him:
"You will be taken hence to the county jail, whence, within ten days, you will be removed to the State prison at Sing Sing, and there be put to death in the mode and manner prescribed by law, during the week beginning Dec. 19 next ensuing."

The horrible crime for which Schultz was sentenced has been fally told. Hitherto the prisoner had evinced absolutely no feeling in regard to the crime, or his own fate. Even his counsel could not see the least size either of fear or remorse, but yesterday, after he realized the fearful fate which awaited him, he weakened. He begged pitcously, with tears streaming down his face, that his counsel interfere in his behalf, that he would do something to save him.

Schultz will be the youngest victim to suffer death by means of the electric chair, unless he is granted elemency by Gov. Flower. He has no friends in his country to look after his interests, but his counsel will do all they can to have the sentence commuted to life imprisonment on account of his youth.

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

WHAT CLEVELAND'S TRIUMPH MEANS.

Later dispatches more than bear out our estimate of the strength of the popular uprising against trade restriction in the United States.

Cleveland is elected by a vote sufficiently large to show that the principles of which he is the embodiment are approved by a large majority of his fellow-countrymen.

It is a signal triumph, and may well rejoice the hearts of those who are opposed to class legislation the world over.

The people of the United States have had their eyes opened to the inequalities of the pratective system, and they are practical enough to recognize the philosophy of voting for the changes necessary to effect a remedy.

They permitted themselves to be severely They permitted themselves to be severely taxed to provide funds for paying off the enormous war debt. They grumbled not when called on to pay generous pensions to participants in or survivors of the great civil conflict. But when they found that the taxaying payer had been prestituted. the taxpaying power had been prostituted for the benefit of millionaire monopolists, they refused to be longer cajoled into sup-porting the system of class legislation. The revolt began when Cleveland was elected in 1884; it received added impetus when, in 1890, Congressman McK nley, interpreting the defeat of Cleveland as an indication that the people were ready and willing to submit to increased taxation, brought in his obnoxious restrictive measure. This was followed by the great This was followed by the great Democratic sweep in the Congressional elections of two years ago, a victory which has now been supplemented by the signal defeat of the protectionists in the Presidential campaign. The prospect, indeed, is that not only the Presidency and the House of Representatives, but the Senate, will be in the hands of the tariff reformers before many months are over. the defeat of Cleveland, as an indication





THE PEOPLE'S FORUM.

The Fruit Crop in Lambton.

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER:
The season of 1892 has in many important respects been very peculiar. No frosts occurred either in the late spring or in the early autumn severe enough to affect vegetation even in its tenderest forms. This we consider peculiar, because we always expect a pretty severe frost in our county about the last week of May or first of June, and again in or about the last week of September, that will if not totally, yet partially affect vegetation to its serious injury.

Itally affect vegetation to its serious injury.

Another point of peculiarity has been the great and sudden extremes in the rainfall. In June this was so heavy and continued that the ground was rendered unworkable, but by the early part of July an unprecedented drought set in, and continued almost without a break until September. So severe upon the soil was this large rainfall, followed immediately by intense heat and continued absence of moisture, that it was rendered unsuitable large rainfall, followed immediately by intense heat and continued absence of moisture, that it was rendered unsuitable for the proper support and maintenance of vegetable life. In consequence of this all of our spring crops, not excepting in many places our grass crop, have not come up to the averages. If we have any good crops this year it has been in the line of fall wheats and grass. Yet the domestic animals have done well, and the pastures on the whole have not

been in the line of fall wheats and grass. Yet the domestic animals have done well, and the pastures on the whole have not been so bad, but it is felt that in this respect supplied fodders must be relied upon especially for milch cows and working horses on all our great farms.

Still another peculiarity of this season was the severe and early fall of a fungoid blight upon our fruit trees, especially upon the apple, pear, peach and cherry trees. This very severe blight caused, no doubt, by a certain peculiarity of the atmosphere just at a time when the young and tender just at a time when the young and tender leaves of those trees and their early fruit was most easily affected, was not by any means local, but very widely spread over the whole length of our southern frontier, and extending considerable distances in land northerly, affecting the whole fruit crop of many counties, but ours was one of the very worst affected and our loss was great.

The leaves of the apple and peach trees

great.

The leaves of the apple and peach trees fell from the trees, and so severe and serious was the injury that these trees never fully recovered from the shock during the whole season. In the case of the apple and pear the fruit was also very badly affected on its upper side, appearing as though scalded or frosted, so that the skin then lost its expansibility and proper function. It became ill-formed, one-sided, blackened, and opened in deep black cracks so large that the fruit was rendered almost worthless for any purpose save feeding to the yard animals. This unusual calamity caused an immense loss in money value to the fruit growers, and especially to the apple orchards of this county. It is now our firm persuasion in this relation that we must more and more resort to sind depend upon artificial means for fruit and tree protection from these direful influences, and that protection must resolve itself into systematicapplications of arsenic compounds in the form of fine spray scattered entirely over the trees. This is by no means a pleasant subject to contemplate, but in a climate such as ours and in our peculiar location, liable as we are to those powerful influences annually so destructive to our tender fruit crops, it is a necessity.

Yet another peculiarity of this season must not be forced from notice as the most cheering of all, viz: It was the most cheming October in our remembrance. To have such enjoyable weather such captivating landscape seenery, such delightful lowely gladioluses, golden chrysanthenums and waving tropical cannas on the first of The leaves of the apple and peach trees

To have such elegished weather such captivating landscape scenery, such delightud flower growths as handsome varied dahlias, lovely gladioluses, golden chrysanthenums and waving tropical canas on the first of November is not by any means a usual or common thing in this section of our varied and promising Daminion.

Strawberries and raspherries were the finest and most abundant ever seen in this acction. They were most admirable in quality and beautiful in form and color. The sorts of the first fruit mostly used are are Crescent, Seedling Wilson, Captain Jack, Daniel Boen, Manchester and Eureka. The three last are specially noted as good. Cuthbert is the variety of raspberry having more good qualities than any other at present introduced. Turner, Highland Hardy, Shader, Marlboro and some blacks are also used and have good market value.

Blackberries this season were something attonishing to us, both in quality, size and heauty. No table queen could be decked more brilliantly than blackberry bushes were. The one sort mostly used is Snyder, and it is good.

Mulberries and dewberries are not handled here in quantity. They are shy and unsatisfactory and consequently uprofitable.

Carrants of all colors are good and extensively grown for the market and home use. The sorts used are: For red—Ruby and unsatisfactory and consequently uprofitable.

The old Kentish red cherry so much used in this county has of late almost entirely disappeared, the tree being so liable to the "black knot." English and other sorts are not much used, and we are not sure they will be a success. This is to be much regretted on account of their fine qualities and values.

The plum crop when the trees were healthy was good and the fruit very fine, but healthy-bearing trees are as yet very scarce indeed. The varieties used are not many, but the ever-popular Lombard is the most to be relied upon for a crop, though

unfortunately the tree is most liable to the deadly "black knot." The other standard sort is the Imperial Gage.

Scarcely any peaches are grown here where once there were great numbers. The cause is supposed to be the great change of our climate incident to the clearing up of our natural forests. The best peach for us is the Early Bernard, but many seedlings are also used.

There are scarcely any quinces, but what few were grown were extra fine and good. The sort most used is the old Orange.

Pears seem to be quite at home and the quality asually is very fine indeed. This year the crop was most abundant, but many, especially Flemish Beauty, were much diafigured in form, and an unastural russety skin. Many sorts were very good, especially Clapp's Favorite and Barliett, but the market was almost surfeited by the quantity. Sorts mostly used are Bartlett, Clapp's Favorite, Flemish Beauty, Louis Bon de Jersey, Onondaga, Howell, Scakel and many others, but nothing better than these old sorts.

The crop of most sorts of apples is small, and the samples Ill-formed and below the standard. It was one of the most despicable apple crops ever known in the country, and of the least possible value. The sorts used are almost everything on the lists, but for really good and valuable results nothing has yet superseded the good old standard sorts long in use, viz. Baldwin, Wagener, Northern Spy, Ben Davis, Rhode Island Greening and King Tompkins.

Scarcely any nuts are grown other than the old forest sorts, and this season not many of those.

Grapes were one of the finest crops seen here. The samples were good, the ripening perfect and the quality all that could be desired. This fine fruit is receiving increasing attention.

A protective duty of 20 per cent, increases the profits of a skewer trust with a capital of \$60,000. A tombstone trust, \$100,000, has from 35 to 60 per cent protection. Teazle, indurated fiber, snow-shovel, stove board and castor oil trusts, each with a capital of \$200,000, are protected by a duty of 30, 35, 45, 50 and 128 per cent respectively. A sandpaper trust, \$250,000, has protection of 25 per cent. Hop, soap, sponge, snath, leather board, and whip trusts, each with a capital of \$500,000, has protective duties varying from 15 to 50 per cent.
