LONDON, June 6 .- In the House of Com

Butengr (Conserva-tive) moved to amend the Irish Home Rule Bill so as to prevent the Irish Legislature from enacting laws in reference to the crimes of conspiracy, unlawful assembly,

crimes of conspiracy, unlawful assembly, etc.

Chief Secretary Morley said that nothing would be surer to momote friction between Great Britain and Ireland than the adoption of such an amendment.

Mr. Butcher's amendment was rejected by a vote of 317 to 276.

Sir Henry James (Unionist) offered a motion to the effect that among the powers reserved from the Irish Legislature should be the power dealing with sedition.

Home Secretary Arquith opposed the motion on the ground that there might be sedition against the Irish Government, and therefore the Irish Legislature ought to have power to deal with such sedition.

The amendment was rejected by a vote of 304 to 255.

THE DEATH CHAIR.

Does Its Dreadful Work in Danne mora Prison.

Sapone Martella Pays the Penalty of Murder-The Victim Shows Remarkable Nerve

DANNEMORA, N. Y., June 6.—Sapone Martella, on this his last day upon earth, though he rested fairly well last night, was rather nervous. He arose carly, and before though he rested fairly well last night, was rather nervous. He arose early, and before breakfast was visited by Father Belanger, who administered holy communion. After he ate a hearty breakfast, Father Belanger, accompanied by Father Blanchard, of Malone, returned to remain with him until the final moment. At 8 o'clock the condemned man was shaved and dressed and all his personal preparations for the execution were completed. Martella was, electrocuted at 11:55 a.m. Two contacts were necessary to cause death. necessary to cause death.

The witnesses were conducted into the death chamber at 11:25 o'clock. The madeath chamber at 11:25 o'clock. The machinery was then tested and pronounced in good order by Electrician Davis. At 11:42 Martella entered the room, Warden Thayer leading. Martella was pale, but showed remarkable nerve. The prisoner was the usual looking Italian of short statute. When he approached the chair he knelt down and made an act of contrition, the priest meanwhile granting him absolution. He then seated himself in the chair unassisted, without saying one word. At 11:45 he was strapped to the chair, the electrode applied and the current turned on. The contact lasted 1 minute and 7 seconds.

for which Martella paid the penalty to-day was committed on the evening of May 5, 1892, in Saratoga, when he cut the throat of another Italian named Giovanni Parille, and stabbed him in six other places. Jealousy was the cause.

THE EXECUTION.

During the first period of contact the voltage was 1,660 for two seconds, and was then gradually reduced to 150 volts. As the full force of the current was turned on the full force of the current was turned on the body straightened up in the chair so that the straps creaked, and gradually fell back limp. An examination of the beart was made by physicians, who agreed that the man was not dead, and several moments after the first contact was cut off a second contact was made lasting 55 seconds, the current again being turned on full force and gradually reduced as before. This time, as before, the body straightened, but relaxed. An examination was made and the man was pronounced dead at 11:51.

At Examination of the heart was continued, and at 11:58 the body was removed from the chair. Dr. Ransom said that just before the current was turned on the first

time Martella took an inspiration, which was the cause of death not being instantaneous. There was no sign of burning. The only outward effect of the electric current was a scorching of the calf of the right leg. Dr. Ransom says the electrocution was successful. Warden Thayer also thinks it was successful, but not so much so as the last one. All the physicians were outspoken as to the extraordinary muscular reaction shown by the murderer in the chair, and as evidenced by an examination of the body. This was another reason, said Dr. Ransom, why the first centact did not kill instantaneously. Dr. Ransom said he had often given Martella different drugs to produce sleep, but what would have more than sufficed for an ordinary man had no effect on Martella.

His eyes were set and his mouth was wide open. He was breathing heavily, and as the terrified woman gazed on the scene of horror she heard again that awful groan which had startled her at the door.

A physician was summoned. When he arrived he found that Dr. Elderkin was beyond human aid. Elderkin sank rapidly and died a lew minutes later.

The doctor who had been summoned made an examination of Mrs. Colton's body and announced that she had been dead some time. but he was unable to say from his examination, what had caused her death. Only an autopy will reveal the cause, though it is supposed it was heart failure. The coroner will make a careful investigation.

It is supposed that Mrs. Colton called on Dr. Elderkin for medical treatment, that he administered ether to her and that she died while under the influence of the continue.

Dr. Elderkin had evidently gone about killing himself in a very deliberate manner. He had written a will carefully and placed it on his office table where it could be easily seen. Lying near it was a note, ap-parently written in great haste. The note was as follows: "Mrs. Colton died of heart failure and I

"Mrs. Colton died of heart failure and I have taken my own life with morphine used hypodermically. No use, can't save me; no need of autopsy; must die, but hate to leave my friends."

The general belief is that Dr. Elderkin feared the consequences of his mistake or lack of care and that his fear caused him to take his life. Some people say the doctor had paid some attention to Mrs. Colton and give the tragedy a rouch of romance.

MIDDLESEX SCHOOLS.

Inspector Johnson's Annual Report to

the County Council.

The comprehensive and interesting report of Mr. H. D. Johnson, public school inspector of No. I division, county of Middlesex, presented to the county council this week, gives many figures and much general information, both interesting and instructive to the ordinary reader as well as the educationalist.

educationalist.

The trustees in the inspectorate collected for the year, including a balance of \$9,375 from the previous year, a total of \$60,175, of which \$41,287 were school taxes. The dishursements were \$49,779, of which \$39,776 were teachers salaries. The total expended in 1891 was \$52,085, showing a decrease this year of \$2,305. In 1891, \$4,326 were paid on sites, buildings, etc.; in 1892 \$1,302 were paid, this item alone accounting for the decrease shown in the total. The halance carried over by trustees from 1892 is \$9,569, or an average of about \$118 per school, being something more than in 1891. In Adelaide they have \$550; in Caradoe, \$2,351; in Efrifid, \$1,903; in Lobo, \$1,431; in Metcalfe, \$762; in Mosa, \$1,125; in East Williams, \$741; in West Williams, \$703. Many years ago, Prof. Saunders, of this city, undertook a study of the habits and predilections of the English sparrow, in order to settle once and for all time the question of whether or not the bird was more hurt than help to the farmer and fruit rower. A most careful investigation resulted in the discovery that the sparrow never touches a grub as long as he can get fruits or cereals, and that he is practically worthless as a grub exterminator. The sparrow is not altogether a useless bird, however, He has vindicated his right to exist in a rather remarkable manner. MIDDLESEX COUNTY COUNCIL. Inspector Dearnées' Annual Report-Interesting Statistics.

The County Council resumed this morning at 10 o'clock, the warden in the chair.

Inspector Dearness presented his annual report. His division comprises East Middlesex, Delaware, Biddulph, McGillvray and the included villages. That district raised by direct favation \$43,205, and obtained \$26,735 from all other sources, including a balance from last year of \$14,425. As compared with the former year there is no appreciable change in the salaries paid teachers. For both soxes the salaries averaged \$551 76; for males \$400 and for formales \$305. The corresponding average di rural salaries for the Province was \$386 and \$268 respectively. The cost per unit female. \$305. The operesponding average of rural salaries for the Province was \$386 and \$268 respectively. The cost per unit of average attendance varied from \$11.25 in London West to \$14.90 in London township. The average rate per 100 acres, including municipal grants and minor sources of revenue, but excluding Legislative grants, varied from \$11.30 in McGillivray to \$18.70 in Westminster. The decrease in the amount of Legislative grant was accounted for in large part by the movement of the population from the older townships to the newer parts of the country and to the towns. In 1882 the Legislative grant to Middlessx was \$3,785, while last year it was \$6,784. In cities and towns of the Province the grant in 1872 was \$33,817; in 1882, \$63,079; in 1892, \$92,026. During the past year a further decrease of 263 took place in the number of pupils registered. The average attendance for the division was 55 per cent. of the number registered. 
