



IN GRAND SHAPE

The Canadian Pacific Receives Advices That Are Most Satisfactory.

Winnipeg, July 26 .- The weekly report of the C. P. R., dated July 25th., shows the grain crop throughout Manitoba and Saskatchewan to be in magnificent condition. At three or four points there is mention of red rust, but over 100 stations send in what might be characterized as wholly rain, others have had too much rain. but normal conditions have prevailed in almost the entire farming country.

One of the worst storms in years passed over Snowflake between midnight and 2 p.m., which consisted of rain electricity and a bad gale, which left the grain in a tangled shape, but the present weight of the head will not prevent it rising again.

Reports from Portage Plains indicate a severe rain and windstorm There was hail at Beaver and much wheat was laid low.

From Calgary-The following crop bulletin is issued by the C. P. R.: All crops are looking well throughout Alberta. Winter wheat averages 25 to 30: increase in height and headed out. Fall wheat is ready for harvest in some localities the first week in August. Fall wheat is two feet tall. Barley and oats well advanced, and weather favorable for an enormous yield. Samples of barley are shown over four feet in throughout the province during the week. Hail fell in the vicinity of Crowsfield on July 23, but not heavy flax and brome grass never shown to better advantage, and good hay crop is assured.

Battleford, Sask., says: Seeding was completed May 24 in this section, and the harvest will start Aug. 18, a week earlier than usual here. The straw is heavy, and the grain is well headed out. 
