Washington, April 29.—The nine clauses proposed by the commission on international labor legislation for insertion in the peace treaty, as adopted by the peace conference in plenary session at Paris yesterday, were made public here today by the state department.

Among the principles incorporated are a standard eight-hour day, a weekly day of rest, the abolition of child labor, equality of pay for men and women and workmen's "right of association for all lawful purposes."

# GERMAN WOMEN MAKE UP ONE-THIRD OF THE LATEST DELEGATION TO VERSAILLES

Enemy Commissions On Limitation of Armaments and Commercial Affairs Arrive At Scene of Peace Congress-Mayor of French City Appeals to Populace To Remain Calm and Dignified.

Versailles, April 29.-Eighty-seven members of the German peace mmission arrived here last night, being the second party to reach the scene of the presentation of the peace terms. Of these, thirty were women. The Germans included the commission on limitation of armaments, composed of Doctors von Becker and Schall and Major Botticher, and that on commercial affairs.

Sixteen of the latter commission are women. The party left the train at the little station of Vaucresson, twelve and a half miles from Paris, from which place they drove to Versailles in automobiles. The mayor of Versailles posted a proclamation appealing to the population to maintain a dignified and calm attitude, and has also appealed to the visitors to abstain from "Inopportune manifestations and

April 29.—After the more favorable showing in net earnings made in January and February of the current year, the Canadian Pacific Railway's net earnings for the month of March declined to the extent of \$1,453, from the level for the same period last year, the total of \$1,539,044 last month, comparing with \$2,992,781 in March 1918. This represents a drop of

Returns for the first quarter of 1919, owing to the substantial decline in March, show a decrease in net earnings of \$678,000, the 1919 figures of \$4,073,672 in the same period last year, representing a falling off of over 14 per cent. Working expenses for the three months increased \$4,352,643, or upwards of 15.5

## Hard Swats For Bolsheviki

It is cheering to learn that things are not going at all well with the Bolsheviki of late. Lenine's outlaw armies have been soundly trounced by the Ukrainians, have had reverses in South and Southwest Russia that offset the recent success in the Crimea, and have suffered heavy blows from Allied forces in the Archangel district and Siberia. The failure of the Red campaign in North Russia and Siberia is what might have been expected. The Allied troops engaged have with their excellent morale and complete equipment stiffened and steadied their Russian comrades. Against skillful organization and leadership the half trained, largely irresponsible Red Guards are not likely to make permanent headway.

Still more encouraging are the reports of Bolsheviki defeats in the west and south, as it indicates a widespreading determination on the part of decent Russians to clean out the destroyers. Russia is heaving mightily to shake off the monster of anarchy.

Tossing the torch into other countries too has not caused the conflagrations hoped for and without which Bolshevism cannot progress. Hungary, lukewarm towards the Bolsheviki from the beginning of its revolution, has turned cold and turned out Lenine's agents. Poland and Rumania are standing pat, giving the Allies valuable assistance in keeping back the Red tide and restoring order. Apart from Bavaria, where the issue is still undecided, Germany has successfully resisted supreme efforts of Bolshevism to secure a footing, and Germany, mad and reckless from disaster, furnished the most promising material Lenine has ever had to work on. With the Allied nations expanding and increasing their food distribution throughout starving sections of Europe there will be a steady Cecrease in recruiting sources for the Bolsheviki. That and continued military pressure on all sides may presently destroy these pests.
