London, Aug. 3.—The Government legislative programme has become so congested that the cabinet has decided that it will be unable to clear the decks without resort to an autumn session, and today officially informed the House of Commons that Parliament would be adjourned on Aug. 18 to reassemble in the end of October or the beginning of November.

The interim preceding adjournment will be occupied with the Opposition's vote of censure of Aug. 7, the disposal of the veto bill on Aug. 8, with the rest of the week devoted to the overdue finance bill and a resolution providing to the payment of the members.

This is particularly pleasant news this season, for if this year's potato crop had to withstand the usual ravages of the voraclous Colorado beetle the prespective supply of popular ages of the voracious Colorado beetie the prospective supply of popular tubers for this season might be an-nihilated. The insect to which Mr. McKone has called attention in some respects resembles the milk weed leaf respects resembles the mink weet lear beetle and is distinguished by various markings, some black and brown, some red, others black and green, and some even green and white. It possesses a long, sharp antenna by means of which it pierces the shell

of the potato bug and sucks out its

A Turn to Bugs.

It naturally prefers the young Colorado beetle, but if these cannot be found on the plant the insect will even attack the full grown potato bugs.

This useful little insect has, it is said, never appeared before in this district, and Mr. McKone is not yet certain as to the particular species and variety of the welcome newcomer.

A FINE OF \$100 OR FINE OF \$20?

As the information laid by Chief Williams reads, Mr. Shea is charged under section 72, which provides that all persons shall be liable to a fine of \$100 who are found guilty of selling without the license by law required.

Mr. Graydon contended at some length that his client has paid for his license "to sell liquor," and that he should be fined under section 86, which provides for a fine of \$20 on all persons found guilty of any infraction of the bylaws not already provided persons found guilty of any infraction of the bylaws not already provided

for.

Will Look Up Law.

The difficulty that Magistrate Judd finds himself in is that in a case similar to that of Mr. Shea heard in the common pleas divisional court in Toronto before Mr. Justice Teetzel some time ago, the defendant was found guilty under section 72, and fined \$100.

Mr. Graydon argued that the case did not apply to that of Mr. Shea.

Magistrate Judd, after listening to arguments for half an hour, finally decided to reserve his decision a week, and look up cases further, although he stated that his impression at the present time is that Mr. Shea is guilty under section 72. Will Look Up Law.

London, Aug. 3.—The London Times says that Mr. Balfour's decision to move a vote of censure on the Government on the ground that Mr. Asquitt's advice to the King to create peers for the purpose of coercing the House of Lords, was come to after consultation with the leaders of the Unonist stalwarts, who opposed the official policy of their party as regulated by Mr. Balfour and Lord Lansdowne.

The paper hopes that the new plan may bring about a reunion of the two sections, and commends it as free from the objections attending the creation of peers, which the stalwart policy of resistance, if successful, would have necessitated. This is tantamount to suggesting that the impeachment of the Liberal Premier for treason may serve as an Opposition battle cry.





JUST HOW TO MAKE THOSE DELICIOUS CREAMS, ICES AND SHERBETS.

BY ALICE GITCHELL KIRK. PHILADELPHIA ICE CREAM,



Scald half the cream and all the sugar in the double boiler until it looks thin and blue. Remove from the fire and cool. Add the flavoring and the remaining cream, or if thick enough it may be whipped stiff. Freeze as directed. If different fruit flavorings are desired, such as peach, strawserry, etc., these may be added when half frozen.



Mix milk and cream and scald in a double holler. Beat the yolks very light and add the sugar. Pour the staded liquid from the double holler slowly over the egg mixture, stirring al. the while. Return to the holler and cook. Stir until a slight coating covers the spoon. Turn into a howl and when cool add the flavoring salt. Freeze as directed. The cream in this custard may not be heated with the milk, but heaten stiff and added last if preferred. A great variety of changes may be had from this one recipe, such as adding nuts, candied cherries, figs, chocolate caramelizing the sugar, or using maple syrup and caramelizing that.

ICES AND SHERBETS.

Ices of all kinds should be frozen very slowly. For sherbets, turn the freezer rapidly and a meringue, made from the white of one egg and one tablespoonful of sugar, may be added after it is frozen. France is simply partly frozen water. Parfait or mousse is flavored frozen cream. Not by agitating the cream in the freezer, but putting it into a mold covered and packed in ice and salt.



LEMON CREAM SHERBET.

Boil the sugar and water 20 minutes. This gives body and the shertet when exposed to the air will not become watery. Soften the gelatine in a little cold water and dissolve in two tablespoonfuls of boiling water. Strain, cool, add the lemon juice. Pack the freezer with three parts ice and one of salt. If desired very light, one or two beaten whites of eggs may be beaten in at the finish. Serve in sherbet cups or glasses and decorate with fresh or candied mint
