CHINA'S NEUTRALITY IS ONLY TEMPORARY; NATION SYMPATHIZES WITH JAPANESE

Chinese Ambassador to Berlin Intimates That His Nation May Form an Active Alliance With Mikado==-Crisis Korea, stating that Mr. and Mrs. Mc-Rae and Miss McCullan, the Canadian Hague Tribunal Agrees Unanimously to Their Right to at Shanghai Over Refusal of Russian Gunboat to Leave Harbor.

New York, Feb . 22.-The Chinese minister here, says a cable to the World from Berlin, with an ostentation that has been entirely foreign to him has proclaimed that China's neutrality is only temporary; that no one, even the astutest diplomats, can tell what change a day will bring forth in China's attitude.

Says the Chinese ambassador in a published interview: "It should never be forgotten that the war will be fought out in Manchuria, on Chinese territory, and that the excitement of the Chinese people will increase as the war

progresses.
"Naturally, therefore, the Chinese Government may be expected on any one day to decide that its continued neutrality is neither possible nor de-



Russia's Significant Move.

Russia announces to the world that she has abolished the censorship on telegrams to the foreign press. When w empire, the step taken is deeply significant. The official explanation is that newspaper correspondents, chafing under the censorship, have revenged themselves by flooding the foreign press with false statements, intended to injure Russia in the world's estimation. It is probable the London Times is chiefly responsible for the latest move About a year ago the Russian authorities ordered the St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times to leave the country on the ground that he was systematically traducing the Government. The Times at once organized a secret corps of correspondhave turned the light on many things that the Russian bureaucrats would prefer to keep the dark. Having been circumvented by the Thunderer, it looks as though Russia is making a virtue of necessity in relaxing the censorship. It is a frank admission, however, that she can no longer afford to be indifferent to the world's opinion. She hopes by cenceding full liberty to the foreign press to secure from it more considerate treatment, and to create a more favorable impression of Russian methods among the people of other countries. The change of policy is shrewd tactics, but it also illustrates one of the most encouraging developments of modern times - the growth of a world conscience, to which every nation seeks to justify itself in its treatment of other nations. No country Tatunkow, now can live to itself, as Russia has tried to do. It must take into account sentiment which knows no international boundaries. Russia has bowed to this universal conscience, though perhaps not from the highest motives. The impact of western civilization will sooner or later destroy the Russian despotism, but its downfall may be

MANGLED BY CARS.

Comes to a Temporary Standstill—The Russian Treaty.

London, Feb. 22. - Col. Younghusband's mission to Tibet at present is at a complete standstill. Gen. Mac-Donald with a flying column has returned to Chumbi. The big Tibetan force assembled at Gurn has dwindled to 2,000 men, and there is nothing to indicate what will be the next phase in the event of the dalai lama maintaining his present attitude.

The Indian Government has taken the greatest pains to emphasize the fact that the mission entirely is political and its sole object the amicable settlement of outstanding difficulties with the lama government. It lays stress on the fact that Col. Younghusband has the most careful instructions not to excite hostility, while Gen. Mac-Donald has been ordered to act on the defensive only, his sole duty being to safeguard the commissioners. His force unquestionably is stronger than really is necessary for that purpose, and sufficient to make its way to Lhassa, where its presence would give Col. Younghusband a strong "argu-

ment" in dealing with the lama. The Indian Government claims to have possession of documents constituting an invalid treaty signed by the Czar and the lama's governments eighteen months ago, wherein concessions were made to Russia so extensive and so exclusive as practically to give the development of Tibet entirely into the

hands of Russia Russia formally has denied the existence of this treaty, but Russian denials carry little weight, especially when Tibetans do not deny it, and in their intercourse with the British commissioners at Khambajong made no secret of the support they actually were re-ceiving and upon which they relied in the event of further trouble. It is possible now that when news of Russia's disasters in the opening of the war penetrates Lhassa Tibetan reliance on her support will be shaken and an

amicable settlement reached. One of India's chief ostensible grievances is the boycotting of the normal channel of Tibetan trade through India to Bengal, but the firm establishment c' Russian influence on the India border probably is a more potent factor in the present proceedings.





London, Feb. 22.-Rudyard Kipling which appear in the Daily Mail, sing praises of motoring, and to lend further novelty to his new role, Kipling has elected to adopt the style of Chaucer's "Canterbury Tales." The poems, which consist of fourteen parodies of Chaucer, are prefaced with an introduction by H. B. Marriett-Watson, in which he lauds Kipling as a prince among parodists. The first of the series, entitled "The Advertisement, in the Manner of the Earlier English," is in praise of the motor car, and is an imitation of that alliterative poetry which flourished before Chaucer and is probably best known through "Piers Plowman." 


