What shall I say in attempting to de scribe the wonderful events which took place in the historic First Baptist Church of Boston, Mass., April 26, 27, 28?

Now let us take a seat in one of the comfortable cushioned pews. Notice if you please, the stately proportions of the beautifully decorated walls and galleries. The fine pipe organ, and magnificent stained glass windows. Is there not a feeling of rest and repose creeping over your weary spirit, after the mad rush of the City streets?




