Local Real Estate Market Very Dull DEMAND EXISTS FOR GROUP INSURANCE

Many Trying to Rent Their Houses Furnished for the Summer--No Big Sales

Report of Insurance Commissioner for State of Connecticut Plainly Shows that the Demand for Group Insurance is a Pertinent One

COTTAGES IN DEMAND

Although Everything is Quiet in the City, There is a Fair Demand for Summer Cottages near the City

There is practically nothing doing in the local real estate market of importance, these days, although mostly all the big real estate men expect to see more or less of an improvement in the fall.

The demand for summer cottages in the vicinity of the city is fair, but in the townships about Knowlton real estate business is considerably better, and there are only very few cottages at present being offered for sale or to rent.

Mr. G. W. Badgley, a local real estate man who is interested in the purchase and sale of real estate on Lake Ontario in the city, stated that in the twenty years he has been in the business he has never known things to be so slack.

GROUP INSURANCE NOTHING NEW

This Form of Insurance is Based on the Same Principle as Individual Insurance--The Law of Average Applies to Both--Facts About Group Insurance.

In his report for the year 1914 Mr. Burton Mansfield, Insurance Commissioner of the State of Connecticut, upholds the claims of group insurance, following are some extracts from his report:

It appears to me that all so-called insurance is in a sense group insurance. Insurance of an individual can be accomplished only when he is considered as a member of a group.

Cost of Production. In connection with the cost of production, it should be remembered, that the waste due to lapse, which is so marked in the case of individual insurance, will probably be less noticeable in the case of group insurance.

Concerning Death Rate. Will the death rate among the lives insured under group policies be higher than the rate experienced among individuals?

Mr. H. Pierson Hammond, actuary of the Connecticut Insurance Department, recently inspected an establishment for the purpose of considering a concrete example of group insurance.

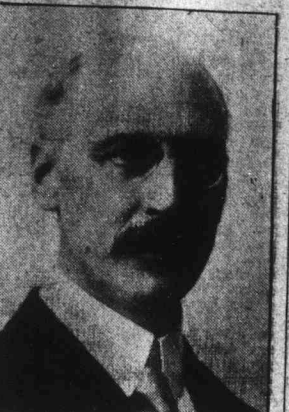

CAUSES OF THE FAILURE OF CO-OPERATION IN AMERICA.

In Canada and the United States co-operative distribution has been marked by almost utter failure. So universal has been the failure to make the system work on this side of the Atlantic that the term "co-operative store" has finally become a term of derision.

Since its commencement the co-operative movement on this continent has never been satisfactorily organized. Fought from all sides are these co-operative enterprises. It is surprising to learn that few attempts have been made to organize them into protective associations.

Another cause for the many wrecks which lie strewn over the field of consumers' co-operation is the fact that in times past, there have been no wholesale houses from which local societies could obtain their supplies.

But the greatest obstacle of all has been the lack of the true co-operative spirit. We have seen glimmers of that spirit in Quebec, especially in the credit societies established by Mr. Desjardins; and it has been recently in evidence in the West and in Ontario.

The greatest cause of failure, however, is the lack of business knowledge, so conspicuous among the members of a co-operative society. They take a man from his plow, like Cincinnati of old and place him in charge of a co-operative store, expecting that he will carry on the business satisfactorily.

There are signs, however, that the pressure of the high cost of living is causing a profound change in these particulars, both in Canada and the United States.
