How Soldiers Are Paid.

A statement as to the method of payment of troops and the basis upon which certain sums are withheld was given to the house of Commons at Ottawa last week by the Minister of Militia. Ten dollars is withheld from the pay of the soldier while in Canada as a set-off against issues of clothing, etc. If the man deserts or is discharged for misconduct, the officer commanding has authority to direct that such men be given the same rate of pay as the British soldier. While at the front, in compliance with the British army regulations, pay is issued in limited amounts of six dollars a month, but men at the various stationary bases receive more. When there is assignment of pay enough is kept back, spread over months; to build a credit equivalent to the amount assigned. When this amounts to fifty per cent no more is withheld. Amounts withheld are paid to the men on their return to Canada or discharge from the force; but men at the front receiving a smaller pay receive a balance up to fifty per cent of their pay on leaving for England. In case of death all monies standing to the credit of the soldiers are paid to his heirs, under the provisions of the law.

Lt.-Col. Weir wired recruiting officers last week:—Work every man to the utmost to complete the Batt. by April 1st. It must be accomplished. The honor of Bruce is at stake."

The Debt Owed The Navy.

It is to the Navy, and particularly to the Grand Fleet, that we owe our safety every hour and the plenty of our daily bread. And on that safety and plenty depends on our ability to give our Allies the support in men, money and materials without which they could not long sustain the onslaught of the enemy. That is what the Grand Fleet have been doing and are doing, not for Britain alone, nor yet for Britain's Allies alone, but for the whole world, whose freedom is at stake.

"The world," Mr. Balfour said in a weighty sentence, "has yet to know, and it does not yet know how much it owes to the British Fleet, and how the assured victory which is coming to us in the near future is coming at least as much as the gift of the British Navy as it is of the splendid valor of the Allied troops whether British or foreign." When the great drama is seen in its real relations the part of the Fleet will be rightly appraised.

First County Sale a Success.

The first annual consignment sale of Shorthorn and Holstein cattle, staged in Walkerton on Thursday afternoon last by the Bruce Co. Pure Bred Stock Breeders' Association, drew a large crowd to town and proved a big initial success. Twenty-one animals were sold, the price averaging about \$100 each. A two-year-old Shorthorn bull, consigned by Henry Hossfeldt, had the honor of bringing the highest figure at the sale, Yule & Bowes, cattle dealers of Calgary, buying this animal in at \$140. All told about \$2,000 changed hands under the hammer of Auctioneer Purvis, who conducted the selling end of the sale. This is to be an annual occurrence here and it is expected will have the effect of stimulating the breeding of a more superior class of animals. President Thos. Jasper and Secretary N. C. McKay were the prime movers in organizing the Association and are deserving of much credit for the success that has so far attended their efforts.

Town Hall Sinking.

About a year or so ago the side walls were noticed to be bulging out and iron rods were put through the building to remedy the defect. So badly in fact was the floor in the Opera House found to have sunk that a Leap Year Dance, which the young ladies of the town had arranged to be held on Tuesday evening last, had to be abandoned as an unsafe proposition. The Property Committee met on Wednesday of this week to look over the situation, and it is possible that an expert will have to be brought here to devise ways and means of overcoming the trouble and preventing further sinking of this splendid edifice. Near the present site of the Town Hall over forty years ago, while ex-Alderman Conrad B. Schnurr was driving along, his horse suddenly sank through the ground and disappeared from view, leaving the driver holding the lines on an invisible steed. This pioneer episode reveals the early marshy condition of the soil in the vicinity of the Walkerton Town Hall.—Herald-Times.

Soldiers Mob a Lutheran Pastor's Home.

Once more the racial fires of the city of Berlin, Ont., have burst into flames. This time it is at the expense of the Rev. R. C. Tappert, pastor of the Lutheran church, who from his supposed pro-German sympathies has aroused the animosity of members of the 118th Battalion stationed there. The hostile feeling unning against him reached its pitch shortly before 11 o'clock, when about 60 soldiers broke into his home, treated him to more or less physical violence, dragged him into the open, paraded him about the streets for an hour hatless and coatless, and were about to lock him in their barracks when he was rescued by one of the officers of the 118th.

The result is that two soldiers, a sergeant and a private, sorted out as ringleaders in the attack, have been placed under civil arrest on a charge of assault and have been turned over by the military authorities. A further result is that Rev. Mr. Tappert is threatening to make the affair the means of international complications with the United States, whose citizenship he claims. Already the American consul at Hamilton has been communicated with and Lt.-Col. W. N. O. Lochead, commanding officer of the 118th Battalion, has received a long telegram from the Consul at Hamilton protesting against such treatment of an American citizen at the hands of the Canadian soldiers.

The Price of Gasoline.

The head of a corporation which has offered the most persistent opposition to the Standard Oil Company, predicts that by midsummer the price of gasoline will have reached 40 or 50 cents. He says that there never has been a greater available supply in this country, and that while the price has increased 205 per cent in five years, facilities for the extraction of gasoline have been radically improved. The war demand and the extortion of a monopoly are given as the reasons for exorbitant prices.

While the gasoline problem in this day of the internal combustion engine is a grave one, it is not quite as desperate as some would have us believe. If the prices are arbitrarily controlled by a monopoly it is certain that far-sighted financiers will not permit the screws to be put on too hard. The demand could be permanently reduced by too much price boosting which would lead to cutting down the use of gasoline to its minimum thus inflicting a permanent injury on the market. Cars and engines of light consumption would be manufactured in larger quantities to offset the expense of fuel.

Therefore, at about the time the foreign needs let up a sharp slump may be expected.

Furthermore, the cost of gasoline is not the chief factor of expense for a motorist. At the present rate an average expenditure of \$100 for a year might be assumed for every car owner. Car depreciation exceeds that item by a large margin, while tires and other necessities of upkeep are considerably greater. If gasoline prices are being artificially juggled as is generally taken for granted, they are being juggled being juggled by experts who for the sake of their own profits, will not go beyond certain limits.

General Sam Hughes presented to a Toronto militia regiment a flag which has rather an interesting history. It was given to him in New York by an old Britisher named Harry Piper, once a resident of Toronto. It is a Union Jack and was presented to Mr. Piper in 1862 by an old Indian chief in the Northwest who had in return received it from Lord Strathcona. Mr. Piper desired that it be presented to some Toronto regiment.

Frank Warner, the thief who plundered the branch store of S. A. Rife & Co. of Walkerton, and who was traced to his lair by Harris Rife, who discovered blood stains on the store counter and tracked it to Warner's room in the Mid-land House where blood was also found on the bed-clothes, and Warner himself had a finger tied up which he cut on the window on entering the store, was tried at Owen Sound the other day and sentenced to six months in Ontario Reformatory.

There are over one thousand military officers, graduates of the schools at London, Toronto and Kingston, who are still without appointments for overseas service, although the majority of them are anxious to participate in the fighting. The latest proposal to get these men to the front is to form an officers base battalion, from which specialists could be drafted for any branch of the service.

Sir Sam Hughes was at one time derided on every side by the Opposition for his drill halls, armouries and cadet training, but no one laughs now that the advantages are so greatly apparent. The men are ready to go because Sir Sam has evolved a splendid system that has been materially assisted by the work done in years of peace, and because of the Minister of Militia does not hesitate to break any red tape that would interfere with effectiveness.

Use Burning Liquid.

The Germans in their assaults are using several sorts of burning liquid projectors. One of these is in the form of a small tank, which is carried on the back, filled with a composition liquid which seems to be mostly kerosene. Attached to the nozzle is an ignition apparatus. The liquid is projected by means of a hand pump. The radius of action of the oil depends on the skill and the physical effort of the man who projects it, but it is ordinarily from 60 to 90 feet. Some French soldiers have been burned to a crisp by the flaming liquid. Other chemical weapons used by the Germans in the battle at Verdun include asphyxiating shells, vapors which irritate the eye and incendiary shells.

THE ENGLISH ARE AHEAD.

How They Sent a Man to an Address By Parcel Post.

The parcel post has made its usefulness felt in many ways, unexpected as well as foreseen. But the English parcel post does one surprising thing that has not yet been introduced into our own system.

An Englishman wished to reach a customer living in a remote part of Balham, one of the suburbs of London, and it was very necessary that he find him quickly. Knowing nothing of the district, he called at the general post office at St. Martin's-le-Grand, to consult a directory. On explaining his case to a clerk, he was amazed to learn that he could be sent to the address by parcel post by paying a fee of three pence a mile.

The gentleman had never heard of such a thing, and it is said that very few persons in England know that it can be done. He was placed in charge of a messenger who was familiar with all parts of the city, and was soon on his way. The boy carried a printed slip on which was written a description of the "parcel" in charge, under the heading, "Article required to be delivered," and before leaving the customer's house both the customer and the gentleman had to put their signatures on the paper. The limit in weight for anything delivered by parcel post in England is generally understood to be eleven pounds, but there is one clause that reads, "A person may be conducted by express messenger to any address on payment of the mileage fee."

CHILDREN MAKING SHELLS.

10,000 Boys Work in the Arsenal at Woolwich.

Ten thousand boys too young to fight are doing what they consider the next best service for their country—turning out munitions in the Government arsenal at Woolwich. In ordinary times many would have become office boys, clerks, or telegraph messengers, but to-day the majority come from points miles from the factory, and help the older men make the shells and guns needed by the men at the front.


The pay is attractive. A smart boy can earn \$7.50 a week, or even \$10, if he has a good machine and can keep steadily at work for as long as 12 hours a day. Parents who have to choose between putting their boys to learn a trade at \$2 or \$2.50 a week, and allowing them to go into the arsenal at the higher remuneration are naturally inclined to decide on the work which not only brings in the quickest return, but seems to be in the national interests as well.

Social workers who have the boys' welfare at heart are inclined to lament that so many should be entering what may not perhaps prove a permanent occupation. They say that their future is not unlikely to become a problem after the war, and that the country might well remember then that the great army of boy munition workers played no small part in the difficult time.

The daily life of these boys shows what sacrifices they are making. **Thousands live an hour's journey from the factory,** and some have to leave home as early as 6.30 in the morning, and cannot get back till 9.30 in the evening. All work 12 hours a day, starting at 8 and finishing at 8. They take the night shift, too, and often a boy may be

A FAMOUS GRAPEVINE.

Supplies King George With 200 Bunches Yearly.

James Jack, keeper of the famous grapevine at Hampton Court Palace, England, has retired after thirty-two years active service as chief custodian of the King's vine. The vine was planted in 1768 by "Capability" Brown, the famous landscape gardener of the eighteenth century.

The vine is now considered one of the finest in the world. It stretches in wide perfectly trimmed squares, eighty feet by twenty-six, the whole length and breadth of the greenhouse. Two hundred bunches of grapes from it are sent to King George at Windsor every year. The grape is the old Black Hamburg.

Some years ago twelve bunches were shown at an exhibition of the Royal Horticultural Society and were awarded the Hogg memorial medal for special excellence and culture. Two of the bunches weighed 3 pounds 14 ounces each, and the whole twelve weighed about 42 pounds, an average of 3 1/2 pounds each.

LIVE STOCK MARKETS TORONTO.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards since Saturday morning were 175 carloads, comprising 1899 cattle, 928 hogs, 17 sheep, 108 calves and 1699 horses. The horses were in transit to France.

Trade was active in nearly all of the different classes of butchers' steers and heifers, with an advance of 10c, and for really extra choice cattle we think fifteen might be recorded in some instances, but one of the heaviest buyers for an abattoir only reported 10c advance.

There would be about 20 carloads of cattle that sold at \$8 and up to \$8.25, and there would easily be 20 carloads more that sold from \$7.75 to \$7.90. It will thus be seen that there were more good cattle than has been here for some time. The common and medium sold at steady values, but a little quicker sale on account of the good demand for the better classes.

Butchers' Cattle—Choice heavy steers \$8 to \$8.25, choice butchers' cattle, \$7.75 to \$8; good butchers, \$7.40 to \$7.60; medium butchers, \$7 to \$7.20; common butchers, \$6.40 to \$6.80; choice cows, \$6.50 to \$6.75; good cows, \$6 to \$6.75; medium cows, \$5.50 to \$5.85; common cows, \$4.75 to \$5; canners and cutters, \$4 to \$4.50; choice bulls, \$6.75 to \$7; good bulls, \$5.50 to \$6.65; common bulls, \$5.25 to \$5.75.

Stockers and Feeders—Choice feeders 800 to 900 lbs., \$6.50 to \$6.75; good yearlings, \$6.25 to \$5.50; stockers, 700 to 1000 lbs., \$3 to \$6.25.

Milkers and Springers—Choice milkers and springers, \$85 to \$80, good cows \$75 to \$60.

Calves, \$11 to \$10.75; common calves, \$8 to \$7.

Sheep sold at \$7 to \$8; lambs, \$11.50 to \$12; spring lambs, \$10 to \$11.

Jas. Wright went to Rothsay for some hay. Hay is very hard to get here at any price. It is scarcer than a year ago and that is saying a lot.

R. R. Lang of Listowel is bringing a car load of stock to Listowel on Wed., March 22nd. There will be a number of good cows and young cattle.

We hear the farmers say that there was a very large number of hogs shipped from Gorrie and Fordwick on Monday. It will be a wonder if hogs do not take a slump soon.

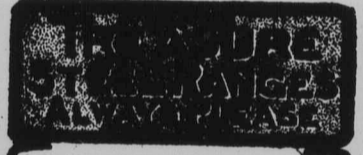
