Immediately after the close of the annual meeting the full board of officers and directors met and appointed E. Lovrin, Athens, as Secretary and Edward Davy, Addison, Treasurer, at the same salaries as last year.

On motion, the annual exhibition was fixed for the 15th, 16th, and 17th September, and the Secretary instructed to notify all agricultural societies in the counties of the same, so as to present, as far as possible, the clashing of dates of this fair with any other.

The substantial balance of \$234.80 in the Treasurer's hands, after paying all outstanding liabilities, speaks well for the successful management in the past and provides a good fund with which to commence the operations of the next year.

An informal talk over matters at the close of the meeting revealed the fixed determination of the board to make the fair of 1896 surpass any previous one in the history of the society.

DEATH OF A NOTED ARTIST.

New York, Jan. 18.—It has just been learned that Matthew B. Brady, well known as the pioneer photographer of the United States, died at the Presbyterian Hospital, in this city, Wednesday evening.

Mr. Brady was born in Warren County, N.Y., in 1822. For 15 years before the Civil War he conducted a studio in New York. In 1851 he entered his work in a London exhibition and took first prize. His pictures were to be seen all over Europe. During the War of the Rebellion, Mr. Brady placed a corps of artists in the field and obtained a famous collection of war studies at a cost of \$100,000. The Government now owns the plates.
