Acadia's Anniversary.

The closing exercises of Acadia College and affiliated schools, which took place during the present week, have been attended by exceptionally favorable weather conditions. With bright, cool days and under cloudless skies the country has been at its prettiest, and visitors have had an opportunity of seeing 'the garden of Nova Scotia' under most favorable conditions. While the attendance has not been up to that of other years, the exercises were of the usual interesting character.

The program opened on Friday evening last week when the graduating recital by pupils of the Seminary took place in College Hall. There was a good attendance of the friends of the school and a very artistic and well arranged program was rendered in a manner that reflected great credit upon all.

On Saturday evening a concert was given by the Bostonia Sextette Club, assisted by Madame Claudius. This was a very delightful affair and was well attended.

The baccalaureate sermon on Sunday morning was preached by Rev. George Hooper Ferris, D. D., of Philadelphia. The subject was 'The Fighting Optimist,' based on the text: 'Thy light will be done on earth as it is in heaven.' The discourse was an able one and greatly appreciated. Solos by Miss Martha Claudius, of Boston, were a very pleasing feature of the service.

The evening service was under the auspices of the college Y. M. C. A. Rev. William Wallace, of First Baptist church, Brooklyn, N. Y., who was the speaker, had for his subject 'The Life of the Explorer.' The text was, 'So Abraham departed as Jehovah had spoken unto him.' The sermon was divided into three parts: (1) The explorer's call, (2) the explorer's field and forces, (3) the explorer's benediction. The preacher is a forceful speaker. Dr. Wallace left a lasting impression on the congregation.

The annual inter-class track meet on Monday afternoon was attended by a large gathering of people. The events were keenly contested and all passed off very satisfactorily. At the close of the program Dr. Catten presented the prizes to the successful competitors.

The closing exercises of Horton Collegiate Academy were held on Monday evening, when an interesting program was rendered. The class history was given by F. H. Gullison and L. H. Barnaby and the class prophecy by W. S. Ryder, of Moncton. C. A. S. Howe was the valedictorian. The address to the graduating class was given by Rev. W. M. Smallman, M. A., of New Glasgow, his subject being: 'The cultivation of altruism.'

The class day exercises on Tuesday morning were of the usual interesting character. The president of the class, Mr. James A. MacLeod, made a very appropriate and clever opening address. The class history was given by Mr. F. S. Roy and was very interesting. Then followed the class prophecy by Mr. Hady B. Fitch, which was thoroughly appreciated and enjoyed.

The closing exercises of Acadia Seminary, always the most popular event of anniversary week, took place on Tuesday evening. The Seminary faculty occupied the platform with reserved seats on either side for the alumni and governors. Rev. Dr. DeWolfe presided, and after a very attractive program had been rendered, presented the diplomas and addressed the graduates. The graduating class this year numbered thirty-eight accomplished young ladies.

The formal exercises of Acadia University, the most important and auspicious of the week's program, took place on Wednesday morning. The graduating class is a large one, there being twenty-two graduates in arts and nine in science. Five students received certificates in engineering. Of the thirty-four graduates nine are ladies. Names were read as follows: Paul M. Bishop, 'Modern Allegory'; A. S. Kaine, 'The Peace Movement and the Outlook'; J. D. MacLeod, 'What are Men for?'; Miss Helen Burnett, 'The Faith of the Poets.'

Following the conferring of degrees, Dr. Catten made a very striking address to the graduates. The address was especially characteristic of the man himself. He took the class over to watch out for the present. Said he: 'Remember to come back on the part to neglect of the present. We can only use the past as it lays emphasis on the present, and the present if attended to, will forecast the future.'

Is That Doing Well?

TO THE EDITOR OF THE ACADIAN.

The Government has done so well it is not wise to press the Prohibition matter further at present' is what nearly all the 'good Temperance men' and even some of the Prohibitionists are saying these days. Let the record be examined. The Government has been in power, to use a common term, for twenty-nine years. For about twenty-five years it practically stood still, occasionally putting a patch on the old License law, sometimes for the better, sometimes for the worse. It has been twenty years, or nearly since it was made clear that the local Governments were empowered to prohibit the sale of liquor, so for all this time up till 1910 they refused to exercise the power the Constitution gave them. Is that doing well? It is say twenty-five years since the Government asked the people of Nova Scotia whether they wanted the liquor traffic stopped or continued. They voted with an overwhelming majority that they wanted it stopped. Is that doing well? About thirteen years ago the people voted again to have it stopped. The Government did not heed them, is that doing well? For the last eight or ten years particularly large delegations have been going to the Government yearly to plead for the cessation of granting licenses—the Churches have been voting their declarations yearly—petitions have poured in from every corner of the province. The Government turned the delegations down, they disregarded the declarations of the Churches, they refused the prayer of thousands of petitioners—men and women the very flower of the land. Is that doing well?

When the constitutions began to vote against them and not till then the Premier changed his mind. All other influences were counted nothing. The prospect of loss of power only moved the Government. Is that doing well? Alex. McKenzie held on to his principles, but lost his position. It looks now as if nearly every one will soon say, 'McKenzie did well.' The Government found about one hundred licensed dram shops in Nova Scotia in 1910, every one of them in defiance of the people's demand. They passed a bill that put only about one-quarter of them out of business. Is that doing well? If the census shows the population of Halifax to be under 70,000 a few will go out, but the centre and stronghold of the traffic in Halifax remains. Is that doing well? As for the unlicensed traffic, a general inspector has been appointed to assist in enforcing the law. At the last session of the Legislature an enquiry was made for his report. None was forthcoming. Nothing to report it would appear. No doubt he draws a fair salary. Is that doing well? Now no one but a partizan can write these things except in pain. We would much prefer to speak well of the Government of our province, and we can in truth speak well concerning 'many things, but when we press the matter of securing the Halifax to be under the Union Reform candidates, with the names of speakers. Fire at Chip. Hall.

A Sad Death.

In the death of Mr. Norman M. Sinclair, which occurred on Friday last under peculiarly sad circumstances, Wolfville loses a citizen who was highly esteemed by all who knew him. Mr. Sinclair was a native of Halifax, and came to Wolfville from Liverpool some years ago and engaged in the boot and shoe business here. His business dealings were marked by strict integrity and his gentlemanly and courteous demeanor won for him a large place in the confidence and regard of citizens generally. A few years ago he sold out to Mr. Mitchell, and since has lived quietly here. During the past year or two he has been in poor health and subject to depression. He leaves a widow, who has the deep sympathy of all. The funeral took place at his late residence, Locust avenue, on Sunday afternoon, and was conducted by Rev. G. W. Miller, pastor of the Presbyterian church, of which the deceased was a member. Rev. J. W. Prestwood assisting. In his address Rev. Mr. Miller spoke earnestly to those present of the need of a wider appreciation of and sympathy for the sorrows and troubles of others. The people of Nova Scotia, through their representatives make the law that licenses them. Our Temperance Act prohibits the sale of liquor elsewhere in the province because it is wrong. Then why allow it in Halifax? Should we license wrong and protect it by law?

Is not prohibition needed most where the evils of the traffic are greatest? Halifax is the capital. Our legislators go there to make our laws. Our boys and girls go there to the various colleges and schools and our people in general to conventions and exhibitions. It should be a clean city. Instead, it is blotted with bar-rooms and their adjuncts, the brothels. From it, liquor pours forth freely debauching the rest of our beautiful province. Its newspapers, circulating everywhere, are full of glaring advertisements by the assembler it vites our country boys to send to Halifax for liquor. Ruin is caused on all sides.

The remedy is in the ballot of the conscientious voter. If enough Temperance men elected the prohibition law will be applied to Halifax and its ramshops be closed. In Quebec, the liquor men propose to put up candidates who will stand for the saloon. Will not you support men who will stand for the boys and home against the saloon?

The government candidates in this county are against applying prohibition to Halifax. When Mr. Campbell introduced a resolution in the legislature to do so, last session, Mr. Wickwire voted against it. Mr. Campbell has been referred to by Rev. H. K. Grant as 'the Father of Provincial Prohibition.' Mr. Eaton is a lifelong temperance man and a strong supporter of it. Will you not help these two men to join with other prohibitionists who may be elected both liberals, such as Pursey and Smith, of Queens, Reid and Wilson of Hants, McKenzie and McKay, of Pictou, Nickerson and Irvin of Shelburne, etc. and Conservatives from many of the counties, in closing the bar-rooms of Halifax at the next session?

We do not believe that the government of Nova Scotia should say to any city or town whatever: 'You may take a Plebiatic and decide whether you will continue to permit wrong or not, to sell liquor or not to sell it.' No city is allowed to vote on whether it will legalize stealing, obscenity or murder, etc. within its borders. The law says of these, 'Thou shalt not. So it shall be in regard to the mother of nearly all crimes, the liquor traffic. Independence is the keynote of the present age. Voters are no longer led around by a string of monkeys are attached to street hardy gurdies.' Thus says a leading party newspaper in reference to the campaign of Mr. John Joy, the independent candidate in Halifax.

Conservative campaign literature gives credit to Mr. Campbell for his independent action in voting with the Opposition and against the government, when he believed the latter was wrong. And I got my job, too—and I got my clean shirt.

"But I lay that night in a Bowery lodging house. It was a heaven of rest and ease and quiet and seclusion after Solomon's ceasr. I was too dirty to be put in the long room with the decent Bowery rowdies and drunks. I was given a bunk in a section reserved for the worst of us. I had fallen very low, you see. But I was too weak to crawl into bed; they must lie all that night—in tears and prayers and fervent aspiration. My tears were of contrition; my prayers were of rejoicing; of gratitude; my aspiration was toward work, and service, and self respect, and the love of all men. A wonderful night—a night in which those things which I had once cherished, but had long abandoned, were restored to me—hope, truth, love, pure ambition. The things of St. Paul: 'Whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, if there be any praise.' It seems to me, now, that in that night I travelled back over the long way I had come—that I was once more in the company of the pure things of my manhood. And in the morning I stumbled rejecting to the labor of the first day in a new life. And I was sober—and I was not at all afraid."
