Debate at Acadia

The Junior class debating team defeated the Freshmen debaters in College Hall on Saturday evening last. The subject of the debate was, Resolved that Canada should become an independent nation. Messrs. Lumsden, Jeffery and Mosher, of the Junior class supported the affirmative, and Messrs. Camp, Tuplin and Anthony, of the Freshman class, the negative. The debate was one of the best of the inter-class series, and was closely contested. The judges, Dr. Tufts, Dr. Rhodenizer and Prof. Cavichia, decided in favor of the Juniors by a vote of two to one.

Rev. A. J. Prosser has been secured by the Promotion Committee for the task of organizing Kings County, N. S., for our Baptist Forward Movement. A more fortunate choice could not be made, though perhaps the Cornwallis church cannot be expected to feel altogether happy over it. Yet it is only for a few weeks and the generosity of the church will not be unrewarded. The record of the Cornwallis church, under Mr. Prosser's leadership has been unparalleled in respect to its development in Christian stewardship. If brother Prosser can carry the contagion to the rest of the churches in the country and make it "take," then we shall expect great things from Kings County in the coming campaign.—Maritime Baptist.

It is reported on good authority that Sir Robert Borden, Premier of Canada for eight years, will retire the first of the New Year, on account of failing health.

Valley Fruit Growers Meet

There was a good attendance of representatives of the different fruit companies of the Valley at the quarterly meeting at Kentville last Friday afternoon. President Bishop, of Lawrencetown, was in the chair.

The principal business of the morning session was the consideration of the report of progress submitted by the Board of Management. This was the first quarterly report of the eighth year of operation of the United Fruit Companies of Nova Scotia, Limited.

The fruit report on apple shipment brought out considerable discussion as to the cause of so many barrels being reported slack this year. This seemed to be accounted for by the quick ripening of all fall fruit and its early decay. The barrel question also brought out much criticism as to the present large barrel, its shape preventing storage in tiers in warehouses and cars over four tiers without toppling over. The discussion also showed that the barrels manufactured this year varied very much in size, there being a difference as great as eleven shillings when sold by weight. Fruit growers were anxious to have the legal barrel so that manufacturers of staves and coopers would be compelled to make a barrel of the proper capacity.

The report on potato shipment showed that the company had marketed 47,752 barrels to date, with prices net realizing as high as \$5.90 and one shipment, which had just been reported, proved disastrous.

The report on flour, feed and fertilizers was also adopted. The company hopes to get its fertilizer the coming year at a lower price than last season, though present quotations are same.

Oratorical Contest

The Ralph M. Hunt Oratorical Contest was held in College Hall on Friday evening of last week. There were only two competitors this year, Messrs. C. S. Corey and D. D. Cameron. The former took for his subject, "Oliver Cromwell," while the latter spoke on "Reconstruction in Canada." Both addresses showed careful preparation and were well delivered. The judges, Dr. J. D. Logan, Rev. G. W. Miller and Rev. W. H. Watts, decided that the prize should go to Mr. Cameron.

The Girls' Guild of St. Andrew's church gave a social to the boys of the church on Thursday evening of last week, and a very pleasant evening was spent. Games were played, then the following program was given: Reading, Miss Helen Schurman; piano solo, Miss Jean Foot; vocal solo, Mrs. Alex. Sutherland; vocal quartette, Messrs. MacDonald, Murray, Davies and Ernst, of the College; vocal solo, Mr. Waldo Davidson. Refreshments were served and the social brought to a close with the singing of old familiar songs.

A recent letter from Rev. W. V. Higgins brings the good news that he and Mrs. Higgins are steadily improving in health. He writes enthusiastically of the climate of Colorado Springs. When the winter is past they will resume their oft-interrupted journey home. Then, if health permits, they will return to India in the spring.—Maritime Baptist.

Group 3.—All teachers interested chiefly in High School work, under the direction of Principal Ford, and Principal Trask, of Kentville.

Notes and Comments

The Imperial House of Commons by 192 majority decided against Lotteries, Premium Bonds, to raise money for Government purposes.

The Toronto Presbytery has agreed to allow women to occupy the pulpits one Sunday a year, and take full charge of the service. This new departure will be the woman's part in the Forward Movement.

Fredericton reports a temperature on Dec. 3 of 5 degrees below zero. The St. John River has been so securely sealed by the cold weather that persons have crossed on the ice between Fredericton and Devon.

The pupils of Public School No. 14 in New York City have in eight years placed \$62,000 in the savings bank of that school. This school is in one of the poorest sections of the city;—A simply remarkable achievement.

The Nova Scotia Apple Shippers Associations have been successful in obtaining a reduction of 50 cents per barrel on the ocean freight rate of apples to Great Britain, and a further reduction of like amount is probable.

An old pension of ten shillings a week for every citizen in England reaching 70 years of age, has been proposed. It would inspire a burden in the budget of \$200,000,000. The cost of the present old age premium is \$90,000,000.

In Peterboro, Ont., the city council has decided that, as women have votes, all females of 21 years of age and over must pay poll-tax the same as men. The woman has this consolation, that few of them ever reach the age of

America, Europe and Australia have now been linked by the airplane, Captain Ross Smith making the last leg of 11,500 miles from England to Australia, and incidentally tucking ten thousand pounds sterling money under his belt.

The exchange rate on the Canadian dollar is now 5 per cent. That means that every Canadian who spends his money in Canada instead of in the United States saves five cents on every dollar. This is another strong argument in favor of patronizing only home industries.

Maine had 75,000 acres planted to potatoes this last season, and has harvested a crop of 19,000,000 bushels, and as the potato growers will receive not less than \$1.25 a bushel, we are told, the Aroostook farmers will get not less than \$23,750,000. How much more will they get?

There are 2,000 divorce cases pending in England, mostly due to the unfaithfulness of wives while their husbands were doing war duty. But in Vienna, according to a news item, there are 80,000 cases, with the prospect that the number will reach 100,000 before the end of the year.

Boston baked beans out of golden pots were on the table at the luncheon given in Boston to the King and Queen of the Belgians. Two gold pots were made for the occasion and were presented to the royal visitors after the meal. They were fashioned after the ordinary bean pot, and were about six inches in height and eight inches in diameter.

Every means of transportation should be provided, so that these keen-eyed and clear-brained gentlemen and ladies from every part of the Empire may see as much of our vast territory, our farms and towns as it is at all possible to see. We want them to carry back to their homes the world over a remembrance of other things besides generous banquets and formal receptions. We want them to take home with them the picture of broad lands, of the wealth of mine and forest, of growing and busy cities and of limitless opportunities for man and women in less favored parts of the Empire to embrace by coming to our shores to seek their fortunes. No better or more effective plan for advertising the country could possibly be conceived than holding the session of the Imperial Press Conference here in 1920.





To Properly Set a Table

"Isn't it funny how much one has to know to properly set a table?" asked Marjorie, as she watched Marie setting the table for luncheon in her aunt's house. "It certainly is a study in itself to know just how to arrange a table for a meal," returned Marie. "There is nothing so satisfying in housekeeping as a properly laid table, proper service, and quiet and correct eating."

In setting a table correctly all forks, with the exception of the small one used for raw oysters are laid to the left of the plate. The oyster fork, the soup spoon and the knife with the sharp edge inward, are laid to the right of the plate in the order in which they are to be used.

As oysters are often served before soup, the oyster fork is laid farthest from the plate, the soup spoon next and then the knife. The other spoons should not be laid on the table when the service is formal, but should be put on the table when the coffee and dessert are served.

Bread and butter spreaders should be placed on the bread and butter plates. The tumbler should be placed at the top of the knife and the bread and butter plate in front or at the tip of the forks. Some prefer to have the butter spreaders placed with the other knives at the right of the plate.

For informal serving the tea spoons are sometimes placed at the right with the knives, and again they are placed on a spoon tray on the table and passed when the dessert is served. The napkin, neatly folded, is placed at the left of the forks.

A shoal of herring is sometimes 5 or 6 miles in length and 2 or 3 in breadth.



Prepare the Ice House

"We have ice cream every Sunday, and we have lots of it, which is probably more than the average city family has."

This statement was made by a farmer, whose family, though grown up, has not deserted farm life. The inducements which cause many young folks to migrate to the urban centres, are counteracted by the comforts of the farm home.

The above remark refers to one of the incidentals, which, individually, seem insignificant but, collectively, mean much.

With ice so easy to secure, and the expense of packing so small, the wonder is that so few farmers put up a summer supply. Almost any kind of a building or lean to will serve as a storage place. All that is necessary is good drainage and solid packing with sawdust.

The comforts that accrue to those having an ice supply are numerous, apart from its utility in providing cold storage for milk, butter, fresh meats, etc. The cost of the supply is nominal, and the labor is required at a time when other work is not heavy on the farm.

Canada's Future

The Hon. S. F. Tolmie, Canada's new Minister of Agriculture, has summed up the outstanding facts of Canada's agricultural position in an article appearing in the November number of The Agriculture Gazette. He presents statistics showing the growth of Canada's financial burden during the past five years and points out means by which our national debt will be reduced. He says in part, "I am confident that this Dominion, through the development of her natural resources, will in time wipe out her debt. Forests, fisheries and mines all contribute their part of the revenue, but by far the greatest returns will be derived from agriculture, which industry we must continue to establish in permanency and increase in magnitude. One of the greatest responsibilities that falls on either the federal or provincial departments of agriculture is the conservation of the great wealth that lies in the virgin soil. Innumerable considerations are involved in this one problem, but the whole affair can be accomplished if we engage in mixed farming with live stock as a basis. This is the fundamental principal underlying success in Agriculture."

The suggestion by an English physician that airships be used as sanatoria for the treatment of tuberculosis has much to recommend it. Now it is recruited by medicine in the battle for health. In what new field will it appear tomorrow?
