A FEW STATEMENTS MADE UPON OATH.

As a goodly number of people may know, Mr. Murray Kay, a person who for the past few months has received so much newspaper prominence that he is spoiled, on behalf of the Province of New Brunswick, a week ago summoned the Grand Southern Railway Company before a committee of the House of Assembly to show that it was not in the interests of the Province that said road should go on. We clip a few extracts from the sworn statements of Mr. Green and others:

1st.—The Company was organized in 1874, and made a contract with the Government under the Subsidy Act in 1876, commenced actual work in June 1876, and by December 1877, had expended in bona fide work on the line \$300,000, according to the report of the Government Engineer—upon which was paid of subsidy \$120,000.

2nd.—That in all the estimates made by the Government Engineer, the Grand Southern, was treated differently from any other subsidized road, for example: Grading on the Albert Road at the same period, was estimated at \$6,000 per mile. The Grand Southern at \$1,775 per mile.

Ties or Sleepers on the Albert Road were valued at \$6.50 per mile, or nearly 30 cents each! and on the Grand Southern \$2.20 per mile, or less than 9 cents each! On Western Extension, grading was called by engineer over \$7,000 per mile, and sleepers 40 cents each! The same difference will be found in every other item, shewing clearly the exceptional manner in which Grand Southern was treated. This needs no comment.

3rd.—The contractor Mr. Green was delayed in his financial arrangements for a year and a little more, by the extraordinary financial depression so generally felt, and especially by the Glasgow Bank on the eve of success. That finally he succeeded in contracting for the metal for the Road some 7,000 tons, valued at \$400,000. That the barque E. D. Jewett, sailed from Cardiff Jan. 10, with 1000 tons of steel rails on board. That another cargo of 1200 tons was to leave Cardiff last week, that the balance will be shipped monthly.

That Mr. Green has procured through a syndicate at New York sufficient funds to fully complete and equip the Grand Southern during the coming season. That the locomotives, switches, frogs, turntables, etc., are contracted for in Jersey City. That James Harris & Co., St. John, have contracted for 50 flat cars and all passenger, baggage and express cars. That M. Moore of St. John, has the contract for making all the spikes required and Levi A. Young of the same place has the contract for the bolts and nuts.

That Mr. Green has actually paid out in cash during the last few months, upwards of \$40,000, and is paying out every day. That all the ties about 200,000 are contracted for and nearly all delivered and distributed. That work wherever it is possible is progressing rapidly in finishing, grading masonry, bridges, etc. That the grading is substantially done on nearly the whole 80 miles of the road.

That the character of the work is good, and that the original gauge of 3 feet 6 inches has been changed to the standard gauge of 4 feet 8 1/2 inches.

The Company now ask for an extension of time under their Charter for the first time, a request that never was refused to any Company making similar application in this Province.

The opposition to this fair and reasonable request comes from a Road that has received about 14,000 per mile, from this Province, and has had renewals whenever wanted and several times—as all others have had under less favorable circumstances. A refusal to grant extension would mean:

Repayment practically by the Province, and a breach of faith on the part of the Government.

An act of injustice to the bond-holders of the Grand Southern Railway to whom 200,000 have been issued.

An unprecedented proceeding by the Legislature of New Brunswick, and literally ruin to a number of industrious people who have been, and are now engaged in working on said Road in various capacities—traders, mechanics, laborers, and property owners, to whom large amounts of money are due. Besides, the St. John and Maine Road who ask the Province to act so dishonestly, have no contract with the Government: the Grand Southern has, since the opposition to the just demands of the Grand Southern Railway has been brought out, petitions have been pouring in from the Mayor and High Sheriff, and 1174 others of the city of St. John, from several hundred persons in the parish of Lancaster, and from the Carleton Branch Railway Company. Further, Charlotte County through her representatives is a unit in the demand. We need say no more than to state the above facts. No fair-minded honorable man, can hold that under the circumstances the Grand Southern Charter should not be renewed. We believe however that it will be.

WHAT A COUNTRY EDITOR, SQUIRE STEVENS' SAYS ABOUT FREDERICTON.

About the highest honor ever conferred on the Editor of the Moncton Times, was when the Government created him a Justice of the Peace. That event happened last summer twelvemonth. Since that time the Times has become most insufferably impertinent and claims the right to have its say on every question that comes up. For example the capital question could not be settled unless it had to put in its "ore." It thinks the Governor ought to be turned out of Government House, and compelled to go to his farm at Belmont. Sustaining this idea, after its Editor's rustic fashion it says:

The public business would not suffer in the slightest degree. A swarm of Celestial "snickers" would miss a number of dinners at Government House, and that would be all. But what regard should the Province as a whole pay to such "vested rights" as these on the part of the small fry official circles of Fredericton? Let them dine with each other when they feel in the mood.

The vulgar sneers of Squire Stevens are exactly like what the corner boor would say, his mouth full of tobacco, who had never in his life sat at the table of a respectable man and never expected to. No man of fine feelings or respectable early training would utter such a sentiment: for the vulgar scrawl is evidence in itself, that at the surprise party, where buckwheat pancakes and molasses candy were the dainties, the writer derived all his knowledge of either parties or dinners. Squire Stevens is manifestly coarse and uneducated. He possesses a little of the vulgar sharpness that helps to make him an instrument to keep respectable people in a state of chronic misery. It is more than likely Squire Stevens' associations are such that he never enters the better class of society that even Moncton possesses, and we are not surprised that the society Fredericton enjoys is quite hateful to his little spiteful and coarsely-formed mind. But it is a man like Squire Stevens after all that makes the most abject funk. Admit him once across the great man's threshold, and he will lick the very dust for the smile and the nod of those whom he knows to be his betters. Suppose Fredericton could stomach such a pill as Mr. Stevens, we venture to say that his first object would be to get at some of those parties or dinners, though we have not the slightest doubt but his ill address and his uncouth appearance would prove an unsurmountable obstacle.

THE BUDGET SPEECH.

Budget speeches always bring the talent to the front, and there is no exception in our Canadian Commons. After Sir Leonard had made a convincing speech, Sir Richard followed, brimful of wrath, and haughty to a degree that must have been offensive even to those who by their fulsome praise have spoiled him. His speech was in great part made up of sneers against the National Policy, and in part abuse of Sir Leonard. The best word he could find for Sir Leonard, who had gone through the Dominion and visited the workshops of the common people, to see how the policy he had given them operated, was that the honorable gentleman had reminded him of a commercial traveller, tramping through the country. To visit the humble workshops of the humble workman, in Sir Richard's eyes, is *infra dig* of a Minister of Finance; but the people will be able to know how to receive a speech made up of such unworthy sneers. Sir Richard would not visit the workmen: not he; he is too high toned for that. He would not run the risk of soiling his white gloves by going in among the smutty four-eyemen, or the grimy machinists. It was for such contemptible pride that Sir Richard was hurled from power, and for such contemptibly high notions he will be retained for this many a day just where he is.

Sir Charles Tupper followed the "stank up" Knight and gave him such a lecturing as must have humiliated any man less presumptuous than Sir Richard for the rest of the term. Sir Charles remarked, and O how truly, that deficits was a subject with which Sir Richard was eminently fitted to deal; for no man in Canada had more experience in deficits than that Honorable

gentleman. And when he asked Sir Richard how he was to provide for those deficits he had begotten, that arrogant Knight did not hang his head, but depended on his brassy front to cover his confusion. And well did Sir Charles meet the opposing knight's taunt that the prosperity of the country was in "mere fits and starts" with the retort, "Yes Sir Richard, the fits were with you, but the starts are with us." We have an able array of Conservative members in our Commons, and it is only ridiculous folly for the Liberal leaders to run the risk of encountering them.

WHAT THEY THINK OF IT IN NORTHUMBERLAND.

The question of the removal of the seat of Government from Fredericton to St. John, has recently been discussed by the Grand Jury at the Northumberland Circuit, and on the question being put before that body the vote stood as follows: TWENTY FOR FREDERICTON; two for St. John.

No one doubts for a moment but every honorable member from Northumberland is in favor of Fredericton, and that the County almost as a unit would stand up, and to the question, Will the capital be changed? record an emphatic No. Yet it is well to record such facts here, that honorable gentlemen who read such sheets as the *Star*, may see how absurd and how false, as these papers state, is the assertion that all the Province, except the river counties, is in favor of St. John.

It were as well that, in this connexion, we dispelled a St. John illusion. The vote of Wednesday night was as illusory as a vote could well be. Party considerations on one side and on the other swelled up the vote for a forlorn hope; and but for this the result should have been, TEN FOR ST. JOHN INSTEAD OF EIGHTEEN. And now if St. John wishes to know the popularity of her hateful fogs with our House of Assembly, Mr. Elder better bring in a square resolution: and then if he can get more than ten votes, we shall say we have been as sadly and as madly astray as himself.

THE BRIDGE BUILDER ONCE MORE.

The opposition seems to have fallen under the blast of some *Vendetta*. The last blast upon their reputation has come in the shape of a man into their ranks, and that man is the malodorous politician Mr. Bridge Builder Killam.

That man has proven a plank upon which scores of politicians have walked to power. To say that the candidate was opposed to the notorious "Bridge Builder" Killam, was the policy he was asked to possess. Mr. Blair, whose right-hand supporter Mr. K has lately become, helped himself to power by abuse of Killam; and Mr. Fred Thompson in his incoherent way denounced and vilified the scandalous Bridge Builder with whom he is now fraternizing. Most of the members from Charlotte got their election by abuse of Killam; up to the North every child trembled, turned pale and ran to its mother's arms when the name of Killam was heard. There was something murderous in its very sound, and there was something worse in the man who bore it. And now Mr Killam is to be Chief Commissioner in Mr Blair's new Government!

When Hon. Wm. M. Kelly was in the Government, he had the name of being a horribly unscrupulous politician and those who knew how many bridges he gave Killam to build used to say: "While ever Kelly reigns, Killam will have bridges to build. We have not done yet."

DEATH OF AN AUTHORESS.

It was learned with much regret here yesterday, that May Agnes Fleming the authoress had died the day before at Brooklyn. May Agnes Fleming was born in St. John, and at a very early age showed considerable ability as a sensational story writer. Her first contribution we believe was to a St. John paper. Then May Agnes started out for New York, and it was as a time when writers did not swarm in the streets of American cities as they do now, she quickly found remunerative employment. She engaged on the staff of the *New York Weekly*, a light literature paper, which has never taken a high stand, and in a few years made a name for herself among thousands. Her writings did not give evidence of much cultivation or deep reading, but they were acceptable to the ordinary reader, being full of incident, and of a light, entertaining nature. We have never known any great moral to adorn her tales: probably if she wrote for the sake of the moral, her pecuniary success would not have been as great as it has been. Still she was a more than ordinary woman and the Province which gave her birth regrets her early end.

THE "SUN'S" SPECIAL.

The *Sun's* special correspondent here, personally a very respectable and trustworthy individual, is not to be relied upon when he speaks about the Capital question. Now, how does he know how much the Government will ask for new buildings? He may, 'tis true, have put his ear some night to the outside of the stone wall, inside of which the Executive were, and thus got his secret. If he did we apologize.

The *St. John Sun* has not yet retracted, but it will be obliged to.

ATTEMPTED ASSASSINATION.

A discharged hand, from the Toronto *Globe* office on Thursday broke into the office of George Brown, revolver in hand, and fired at his former employer. The ball entered the leg of Mr. Brown, who grappled with his assailant, and cried for help. The miscreant was seized and borne away to prison.
