

"I left Barcelona with the Father Abbot on August 3-d and embarked on the Sirio, and, as far as we could tell, the vessel seemed to be manoenvred all right, and nothing of incident occurred until it struck the rocks the next siternoon about 3 o'clock. I was in my cabin at the time, and I can bardly describe the sensation it caused. It was like a heavy grinding, and the impact was so great that it threw me on the floor. As soon as I realized what had happened I bastened to the deck to see the Abbot. However, the shouting created quite a pandemonium, and at one time the consternation seemed to be great amongst the emigrants, but the scene as described in some of the newspapers, who stated that arms and knives were used, never existed. The catastrophe was altogether too n, and I caw most of the chip-red people who were raved, and not one of them bore any signs of having been wounded; neither did they complain of being roughly

emigrants did help their companions

to get to the boats that came later on. The Abbot then smilingly said to me. 'Perhaps you will go down to the cabin and fetch our life-belts? And I, of course, rushed down, but could only find the Abbot's belt. which I brought up on deck, and found that the Abbot, together with two Bishops and two priests (evidently their companions) were on their knees preparing for death, one of the Bishops giving general Absolution. I put the life-belt beside the Pather Abbot, but he did not take it "I've prayed to the Lord a thousand at the moment, and a second later when he turned round and calmly said 'Where is my life-belt?' it had disappeared, but he continued with brave composure, 'someone has taken it.' Since the impact some four or five minutes might have elapsed, but the ship still kept the position she had when she struck. Just then we felt the decks sinking

under us all at once, and I understood it would be my last hour. "I then fell on my knees before the Abbot asking for Absolution, which he gave, and I gave him Absolution. Then we embraced each other, and I said in French: 'Goodbye, Father Abbot, for it is the will of God that we shall die; we die happy; we have nothing to lose.' He replied, Good-bye, Father Ans char,' with tenderness, and I left him to go amongst the numerous thirdclass passengers, in order to prepare them for death, which seemed certain. I had hardly gone five or six steps, however, before the sinking ship went down from bow to stern. Nearly all the first class passengers, and a few hundred of the emigrants -for what reason I do not knowrushed towards the stern, and sank with the ship, Very little chance seemed left for the first class passengers who had the upper promenade deck above their heads. I was far enough away not to be carried down, but at the same time the Sirio lurched from left to right, so as to give almost a vertical position to the deck. This had the effect of pitching me into the sea, but as soon as I felt the water I naturally made an effort to get out, and I succeeded, but how I really cannot tell. The only thing I remember is that I clutched hold of something which I determined not to release. I thought at the moment of my fall that the whole stern was sinking, but only two thirds of it actually went under water. The people, however, were very manageable, and many pathetic incidents could be witnessed among those scenes of horror. When asked them to pray for their departed friends, they all devoutly said he prayers that I recited. It was about half an hour after the arrival f the smack that the last of the migrants were taken on board, but the captain, in excess of cool blood, started taking the portmanteaus and uggage from the Sirio; but when his was seen the people threatened to cut the cable and go off without him. And happily he took heed and stopped it, and within a few minutes we were off beyond the Sirio, and we then thought we should get to land safely. We put off for Palos Bay, and when we got ashore the people thronged around us asking us to partake of their hospitality, and it would be impossible to describe the generosity of these people. I had not landed half an hour before ! heard cries in the street that a Bishop had just come ashore, so I ran to a house where he was and he told me that he had been floating on the sea with his life-belt for four hours. Darkness was fast approaching when he bailed a passing steamer, and he was taken up. He told me that fter the sinking of the stern he came to the surface with five or six other people-among them being Abbot Natter. 
