A. H. N. Jenkins gets Left Again and has Full Costs to Pay. From the Brussels Post.

This now somewhat celebrated case has just concluded with the deliverance of Justice Falconbridge giving the plaintiff, J. R. Grant, postmaster of Brussels, verdict for full costs. Tuesday's [dailies dispose of it as follows:

"This was an action of libel against the defendant as publisher of the Brus-sels Budget, in which the alleged libellous matter appeared.

The action was tried at Goderich hefore Falconbridge, J., and a jury, who found a verdict for the plaintiff for \$1. The question of costs was fafterwards argued in Toronto, and judgment was

rgued in foresto, and judgment was now delivered.

Falconbridge, J. The defendant pleaded a justification, which has been negatived by the jury. At the trial he conducted his own defence—certainly with great ability-but not as certainly with equal judgment, in at least one or two respects. He was, of course, allowtwo respects. He was, of course, allowed greater latitude, in the examination and cross-examination of witnesses, in and cross-examination of withcases, in addressing the jury, than I would have allowed to any consel at the Bar. The necessary result of this was that the plaintiff was handled with great severity plaintin was nandred with grees severity in the witness box and out of it. Ques-tions and suggestions, gravely affecting his moral character and quite unsupported by any substantive evidence, was unsparingly and unmercifully indulged in.

* * * * The plaintiff has dearly bought his small verdict at the price of much mental torture, and I feel bound to give

him full costs.

There is another consideration which I think places the propriety of this order beyond controversy. By this action the plaintiff sought not only damages but an injunction. An interim injunction was granted, for wilful and persistent defi-ance of which the defendant underwent imprisoument in the common jail for days. That injunction was made perpetual by the judgment after the trial. I think the plaintiff is on this ground en-


