#### Dunure's Rough Trip.

Cargo Jettisoned-Men Deserted at Barbados-Passed Icebergs and Whales.

Bowrings' Barqt. Dunure, Capt. Hartery, arrived in port at 8 o'clock this morning after an eventful passage of twenty three days from Barbados, bringing 450 puncheons of mol-asses consigned to her owners. She left Barbados on April 17th, and the first week at sea, favoured by the trade winds, met excellent weather. On reaching the Gulf stream adverse weather was met and a continuation of N. N. E. gales. accompanied by heavy rain showers, prevailed. The vessel was making fairly good prolabor so heavily that on May 1st the crew had to get to work and throw overboard over forty puncheons of molasses to keep the vessel on an even keel. This work was accommended to the control of the con plished satisfactorily. Coming the Grand Banks storms from north-east continued, but did not pede headway and the vessel through without a mishap. On Friday morning Capt. Hartery sighted two large icebergs near Cape Ballard, one says they are dangerous as they are right in the track of shipping, par-ticularly vessels coming from foreign ports. Yesterday coming from foreign southern Shore three large whales were passed off Cape Broyle, but none of the whale catchers were around

to give signal to.

Captain Hartery did not prosecute the deserters but took on board in their places five negroes, who proved themselves competent and capable seamer in every respect. Capt. 

## Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram LONDON, May 10.

That all the members of the crew did not act in the manner expected from men of their calling on the night of the disaster is being slowly drawn out from the witnesses at the British Board of Trade enquiry under the searching examination of Sir Rufus Isaacs and other counsel. It came out during yesterday's hearing that the firemen of the Titanic, when the water flooded their quarters, raided a third-class saloon for life-preservers. Certainly, as is pointed out, these were not needed by the passengers, as the vessel carried only a small proportion of her complement of thirdclass passengers. That importance is attached to the action of the firemen is shown by the question put by Lord Mersey as to how the men reached that part of the vessel.

From another witness, S. J. Rule, a bathroom steward, it was also learned, after close questioning, that there was a rush on lifeboat number 15 and time came the proprietor, thinking that she left the Titanic with only that all hands were gone, locked the four or five women and three children, while sixty-one men got away in her. Rule said that scouts were sent to look for women and children, but they looked only on one deck and then re turned and said there were no more there. Then first officer Murdock told the men to fill the boat. There was then a rush for the boat.




