Footballers' Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Football League occurred last night. Mr. Mark Chaplin, the President, occupied the chair. On the first day this year on which the stores close at 6 p.m. the first League match will be held. After the reports had been discussed and when President Chaplin had retired from the chair, Mr. J. Crotty presided and conducted the election of officers, in which the former executive were appointed to office. These are as follows: President, M. Chaplin; Vice-President, E. M. Jackson; Treasurer, C. Ellis; Secretary, W. J. Higgins; Auditors, Messrs. Crotty and Jardine.

REPORT FOR SEASON 1911.

Our sixteenth season has closed, and we are glad to be again able to announce a successful term. The teams of the preceding year again participated in the Championship Competition, and the order on the table of points at the conclusion of the series was: Collegians, Star C.E.I. Casuals, B.I.S., St. Bon's and Pelidians. The Collegians, for the first time in their history, thus became entitled to a marking on the Championship trophy. This result was very generally popular for two reasons, first, because this club richly deserved the honour by reason of their consistent good play throughout the past season, as well as the fact that on different occasions in the past the premiership position has been lost by the team through an unduly large share of hard luck; and secondly because the result of the past season starts interest in the cup again. The Stars by their win for two successive years had every indication of repeating their record and becoming the absolute owners of the championship trophy, but the Collegians rose to the occasion and like the C. E. I. in the memorable struggle of '08, stopped the onward march of the cup-seekers. The value of an athletic trophy, and particularly a football championship emblem, is largely represented by its history; so age and change of holders, and the new life given to the present trophy by the will of the Collegians last year is generally to be appreciated. The Stars played with their customary dash and enthusiasm, and, as usual, whilst not in receipt of "the first place honours," they were in the foreground at the end of the season. The C. E. I. made good strides of the upward journey, and showed the first signs for some time past of former greatness. The Casuals' play was about the same standard as in the previous season, whilst the B. I. S. slightly improved in their showing. The St. Bon's and Pelidians progressed in the wrong direction, the latter club taking charge of the spoon. Generally the games were an improvement on those of 1910, a little more practice being in evidence at the opening matches. The championship was won largely because of this element being attended to, and the league spirit should not be lost on the aspirants for honours in the coming season. Too much attention cannot be paid to this necessary aspect of our competitions, because apart from the interests of the individual clubs the future of the game depends almost entirely upon the sufficiency of training obtained by the contesting teams before they present themselves to the public. In the Brigade Section the Championship again fell to the Catholic Cadet Corps, who were closely followed by the Nfld. Highlanders, play off being necessary to decide the holders of the Cup for the year. The Methodist Guards and Church Lads Brigade were not up to the playing standard of the two first mentioned teams. Whilst congratulating the Cadets on their well deserved win—a victory which was particularly merited in the deciding match—we desire to compliment the Highlanders for the marked improvement in play, judged by their work in seasons past, theirs was a sudden jump into fame, but their continuous good play throughout their fixtures last summer made their fine showing only a natural result. Now that they have moved away from the position at the reverse end of the table, we trust they will continue to furnish the right quality of play, as their keeping in the game, despite their ill-luck in the past, makes their prosperity now all the more appreciated. The financial result of the season worked out slightly better than for the year previous. The total receipts from all sources were \$1,432.55, as compared with \$1,333.93 in 1910, and expenses of \$1,413.00 compared with \$1,398.65. This showing is satisfactory when it is borne in mind that in 1910 the sum of \$100.50 was obtained from matches outside the regular league games—a source of income which does not appear last year. The total amount now to the League's credit is \$2,811.93. We are sorry that we had not our usual games with the Naval teams during the past summer, due to H. M. S. Cornwall being unexpectedly ordered away. It was generally regretted that our annual "test" could not take place, as so far these games form

our only means of noting the progress or otherwise of our play. The arrangements as to a joint use of the field with the St. John's Cricket Association, outlined in our last report as possible, did not materialize, and so far the present revival of the League generally for their continued co-operation, we have to impress upon the representatives of the various clubs the necessity of putting some new life in the different teams. The strength of the League depends on the individual efforts of its members, and if we are to expect the game to retain its popularity, we must see that it deserves it by way of supplying good competition. "Be Sober and Watch."

The members of the T. A. & B. Society assembled in large numbers last night in their spacious hall. Precisely at the hour appointed, President W. J. Ellis, Esq., took his seat and was greeted with the usual ovation. His absence of several months' sojourn in the United States and Canada where he had gone in the interest of his health, he stated last night he never felt better in all his life than he did at the present time. The object of the meeting was to discuss important resolutions introduced by J. M. White, Esq. in behalf of the old and faithful "standard bearers" of the Rev. Theo. Matthew who for the past forty years have continuously kept the pledge of Total Abstinence. After an interesting debate the measure passed. Now, all members of forty years standing are exempt from further taxation. The other resolution was for the establishment of a "Charity Fund." Was it ever occasion require to enable the President and two others "only" to be in a position to succeed any member who may through accident or sickness become in need of assistance. President Ellis availed of the opportunity to congratulate the introducer, Mr. White, on this measure, stating that it met with the unanimous approval of the Executive, for in a manner it was bringing back one of the objects for which the Society was established for over fifty years ago, viz., to aid its members in times of need. The motion being put by the President was carried amidst great applause. It was shown by several speakers that it was necessary that a complete record of the rules of the Society take place to incorporate the amendments just passed. A committee will be formed at Sunday's monthly meeting which will be so important that every member is requested to attend.

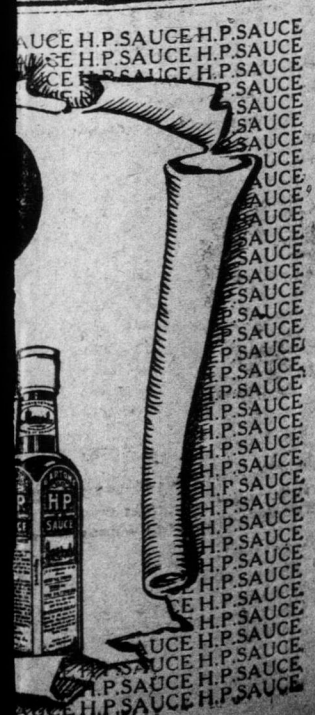



LONDON, To-day.—Bonar Law, addressing the annual love feast of the Primrose League in Albert Hall yesterday directly charged the Asquith Govt. with assisting the States in its alleged designs on Canada, from which it was saved by the instinct of the Canadian people. Bonar Law went on to refer to the Anglo-German war armaments. He said the time was rapidly approaching when Britain alone would not be able to maintain the navy. The only solution of the problem was to unite the great sister nations of the Empire. The quarrel between Taft and Roosevelt showed that the object of the Reciprocity negotiations was to make Canada an adjunct to the United States. It was the duty of Taft to look after the interests of the United States Government, it was also the duty of the British Government to look after the interests of the British Empire, but it went out of its way to make Canada an adjunct of the United States.

RAIN.

Rain is a wet article which falls with great enthusiasm just when somebody is trying to pull off a lawn party. It bears a close resemblance to water and is sometimes used as a substitute by people who prefer to take their microbes in a raw state. Rain is a very uncertain quantity with everybody except the weather bureau experts, who can always tell where it is going to light if they see it headed their way. There are several distinct varieties of rain, all of which are quite moist. The most obtrusive of these is dew, a substance used by Robert W. Chambers to make some very amorous dewy eyes and dewless norms. A great deal of poetry has been written about the dew, but nobody ever mentions its effect upon the paper-sold pump and the "erchid" petticoat. Another form of rain is the Kansas thunder storm, which is a distant relative of the Japanese typhoon and step-father to the double faced wash-out, the spring fresher and the lightning rod industry. The most devastating form of rain is the cloudburst, which always waits until the score is tied in the ninth inning before mingling with the spectators. In the arid regions people get tired of waiting for rain and go after it with dynamite and protruded meetings, while over in the rain belt farmers have to cultivate their corn in a row boat. Hail is rain in pill form, and is the silent partner of the plate glass trust. Snow is a chlorinated form of rain which perspires freely in the spring and prevents the accumulation of dust on the country roads. One of the most appetizing varieties of rain is the summer shower, which fills the cisterns of the plain people with hope and decayed vegetation. The rainy season of the Pacific slope is a damp epidemic which results from a mournful leak in the average mean precipitation. It is of slight importance, and is not advertised to any extent by the transcontinental railroads.



Dunure's Rough Trip.

Cargo Jettisoned—Men Deserted at Barbados—Passed Icebergs and Whales.

Bowling's Barq. Dunure, Capt. Hartrey, arrived in port at 8 o'clock this morning after an eventful passage of twenty three days from Barbados, bringing 450 puncheons of molasses consigned to her owners. She left Barbados on April 17th, and the first week at sea, favoured by the trade winds, met excellent weather. On reaching the Gulf stream, adverse weather was met and a continuation of N. N. E. gales, accompanied by heavy rain showers, prevailed. The vessel was making fairly good progress against the elements. She had a heavy starboard list and began to labor so heavily that on May 1st the crew had to get to work and throw overboard over forty puncheons of molasses to keep the vessel on an even keel. This work was accomplished satisfactorily. Coming over the Grand Banks storms from the north-east continued, but did not impede headway and the vessel came through without a mishap. On Friday morning Cape Hartrey sighted two large icebergs near Cape Ballard, one of which was a monster and both appeared to be aground. The Captain says they are dangerous as they are tight in the track of shipping, particularly vessels coming from foreign ports. Yesterday coming along by the Southern Shore three large icebergs were passed off Cape Broyle, but none of the whale catchers were around to give signal to.

When the Dunure was at Barbados her five seamen deserted. They showed fight and refused to come aboard. Captain Hartrey did not prosecute the deserters but took on board in the places five negroes, who proved themselves competent and capable seamen in every respect. Capt. Hartrey reports the Galatea as having left Barbados a day ahead of him and she should soon be heard from.




The Socialist Movement.

BY ANDANTINO.

VII.—INDUSTRIAL DEMANDS OF SOCIALISM.

The collective ownership of all industries which are organized on a national scale and in which competition has virtually ceased to exist.

Ruskin says that the notion of Discipline and Interference lies at the very root of all human progress or power; that the "Let Alone" principle is in all things which man has to do with, the principle of death; that it is ruin to him, certain and total, if he lets his land alone—if he lets his fellow-men alone—if he lets his own soul alone. That his whole life must be continually one of ploughing and pruning, reeking and keeping, governing and punishing.

Now the discontent of labour has underlying it principles of Justice which have been violated by the business world. And while the labourer has found that the only way his demand will be granted will be by striking, yet this does not make the matter any better, for the employer promptly adds the increase to the produce and it really means more profit for him and more hardship on those who buy. But the real trouble began when the business world forsok the paths of righteousness and instead of fair dealing substituted "keen financiers" and gave the greatest honour (?) to him who could best "do his brother" for the largest amount. But without going into the details how this is done I want first to state the ethical side of business, and in doing so shall quote largely from Ruskin.

The greatest material result obtainable by master and servant will be, not through antagonism to each other, but through affection for each other, and the master will get the greatest possible return not by endeavouring to get as much work as possible from the servant but by seeking to render his appointed and necessary work beneficial to him, and to forward his interest in all just and wholesome ways. Of all the professions the merchant only is presumed to act always selfishly. His work may be necessary to the community, but the motive of it is understood to be wholly personal. The merchant's first objects in his dealings seems to be to get as much for himself and leave as little to his customer as possible.

But the truth of the matter is that of the Soldier's profession is to defend the Nation; the Pastor's to teach the Physician's to keep it in health; the Lawyer's to enforce jus-

tice in it; the Merchant's duty is to provide for the Nation. And it is no more the function of a True Merchant to get profit for himself out of that provision than it is a clergyman's function to get his stipend. The stipend is a due and necessary adjunct but not the object of his life, if he be a true clergyman, any more than his fee is the object of life to a true physician. Neither is his fee the object of life of a true merchant. He has to understand to the very root the qualities of the thing he deals in and he has to apply all his sagacity and energy to the producing or obtaining it in perfect state, and distributing it in at the cheapest possible price where it is most needed.

"Rob not the poor because he is poor," says the wise man, but this seems to be the mercantile form of theft, consisting in taking advantage of a man's necessities in order to obtain his labour or property at a reduced price.

Ruskin gives a case of commercial wealth acquired on the exactest principles of modern political economy. Suppose that three men formed a little isolated republic and found themselves obliged to separate in order to farm different pieces of land at some distance from each other, each estate furnishing a distinct kind of produce and each more or less in need of the material raised on the other. Suppose that the third man, in order to save the time of all three, undertake to transfer the commodities from one farm to the other, receiving as payment a portion of each parcel of goods. And supposing this carriage, watching the course of each man's agriculture, keeps back the article with which he has been entrusted until there comes a period of extreme necessity for them, on one side or the other, and then exacts in exchange to them all that the distressed farmer can spare of other kinds of produce: it is easy to see that by ingeniously watching his opportunities, he might possess himself regularly of the greater part of the superfluous produce of the two estates and at last, in some year of severest trial or scarcity purchase both for himself and maintain the former proprietors thence forward as his labourers or his servants.

That similar transactions have taken place, and are taking place now is only too true. The formation of the enormous Trusts in the States and elsewhere is full of such dealings. (Continued in Wednesday's issue.)
