



**Brighter Prospects** in Russia.

Hopeful news comes from Russia General Deniken, with his Cossack Volunteer forces, has met and successfully countered a big Bolshevist offensive aimed at Rostoff; Admiral Koltchak has swept so far ahead, making big captures of prisoners and material, on the way to Moscow, which he announced as his objective, that the seat of the Siberian Government has been shifted from Omsk to Ekaterinburg; General Ironside has inflicted heavy punishment on the enemy on the Vaga and Dvina fronts, with the aid of British 60-pounder guns and British monitors, which the break-up of the ice permitted to be mployed, and General Maynard reports an equally satisfactory engagement as far from the Murmansk base as the northern end of Lake Onega. Revolt against the Bolshevists, actual or incipient, is in evidence in more than one direction. What part the British Government are taking in it is not divulged, and members of Parliament who want to know have been reminded by Mr. Bonar Law that he is debarred from imparting information precisely in proportion to the extent and character of steps that may have been taken or be in contemplation. All we know is that British volunteers have left for Russia, the first contingents sailing on transports named Tzar and Tzaritza. For the rest, Russia, with the assistance of British munitions. is working out her own salvaiton. Her efforts constitute a claim, not only on her late allies but on the whole of civilization. General Miller, the Governor-General of Archangel, foresees the end of the Bolshevist regime by the autumn.—United Empire Magazine.

ably in trouble, and the underwriters who have accepted the risk of insuring her now re-insure so as to save themselves from a total loss. They, of course, pay much higher rates, and the longer the ship is overdue the higher the rates rise.

The premium may even reach 90 per cent., which was the case with the big liner Bulgaria, reported unmanageable and sinking off the Azores. Many thousands changed hands at the 90 per cent. rate, and that very evening came news that the ship was safe at the Azores. Fortunes had been made and lost that day.-Tit-Bits.





#### Dried Fish.

The continued depression of export markets, particularly in the West Indies, naturally has had the effect of weakening the dried fish market in New York and elsewhere. This weakness is more apparent in this market than elsewhere, however, for to the Eastward a good demand has been noted from South America and in Newfoundland there has been a steady movement of stocks to Europe. The Cuban situation has been a decided disappointment. It was expected that conditions would gradually improve there, but there has been a reaction within the past week or two, which places the market again in a weakened condition. Porto Rico has . not recovered from the recent overstocking with inferior quality dried fish, although there seems to be reasonable expectations that stocks will soon be exhausted -unless new supplies are received. New fish is coming into the market and producers are holding firm for their prices. While the levels are enerally lower, the new gives promise of better market conditions. The cavity left on the Sunda States after this explosion was one thousand feet deep. Billions of tons of rock, dust, and mud were blown heavenwards for not less than seven-





#### Where Miners Go Up To Work.

Miners Working at a coal mine in the Cascade Mountains of Canada do not descend a shaft, but have to climb up a mountain to a height of nearly

The mine is rich in coal, which occurs in many seams, and five of these are now being now being worked at three different levels, the highest being 5,224 feet above sea level. The high altitude makes the means of approach a big item of expense, but it also makes the cost of transporting the coal correspondingly low, as each loaded truck runs down the incline from coal seam to ground level under its own weight, and at the same time pulls up an empty truck on the other

side of the cable. The coal obtained is anthracite, and this is the only anthracite located so far among the vast stores of coal in Canada.

The mine has an average yield of thousand tons a day.

### How to Fool Flies.

We can keep our houses free from flies by a very simple contrivance This is to stretch nets of thread or string with meshes one inch wide over the open window or door of a room. It is, however, absolutly necessary that the rooms to which this is applied should have the light enter by one side only. But you will say the flies could easly get through such wide meshes. Of course they could. But-and this the remarkable thing about it-they don't, and they won't!

This is not a new idea at all. In fact, it is over two thousand years old. Herodotus records that the Egyptian fishermen protected themselve from the attacks of mosquitoes by spreading their fishing nets over their beds. Americans often have mosquito nets with meshes an inch square put over their beds, and find them a perfect security, though, as is well known, mosquitoes will creep through any small hole in an ordinary gauze net. 
