



Storrington Wonder

Man Without Hands Who Writes and Paints.

In a tiny cottage at the foot of a winding lane at Storrington, Sussex, lives a cripple whose astonishing accomplishments have earned for him the reputation of a "wonder." He is Mr. Frank Knight, who is married and has two children aged five years and nine months. Mr. Knight was born without hands, and, through contraction of the muscles of the legs, has never been able to use them. He walks in specially made boots, fitted to his knees, can climb ladders, write, paint delightful pictures, and is a first class carpenter. For a number of years he carried on business at Dunstable as a nurseryman and married a local girl. "About seven years ago," he explained, "I disposed of the nursery business and came to Worthing. While there I built several houses, doing all the carpentry work. I lost all my money over them, and two years ago we came to Storrington, where I have put up two houses and have just finished a bungalow. If I can sell that, I shall be all right. I can do anything and go anywhere." That remark was no idle boast, as Mr. Knight quickly proved. He left the room to get his pony and trap ready, whilst his wife displayed a collection of water colour paintings that he had executed. One represented "a little bit of Whitby," and was beautifully finished. On the walls of the sitting-room were several oil paintings, and a large one depicted a number of sheep on the South Downs. Asked how her husband did them, Mrs. Knight explained that he put the paint brush between his teeth and rested it on one arm. He was awarded first prize at Northampton Fine Art Exhibition for a water colour painting, and a bronze medal at Bedford Art Exhiition for colouring lantern slides. Just inside the cottage door was a well-made oak hat and coat stand, also the work of Mr. Knight. When the trap was ready Mr. Knight sat in it, and, holding the reins quite easily with one arm, drove over to the bungalow, where he gave a further display of his activity. There was a ladder leaning against the bungalow, and he astonished his visitor by ascending it and pointing out how he put the battens on the roof. Unfortunately, his infirmity prevents him from applying for employment like other men. He is a good scholar, can write well, and, as indicated, is an excellent carpenter-News of the World.

An Old Weed in a New Industry

In the sober columns of the English Board of Trade Journal, giving an account of the enormous business success of the Empire Exhibition at Wemblev, near London-something which has been called by the Prince of Wales the shop window of the Empire-appears the following remarkable para-

"As an oddity. Newfoundland brought over a small crate of eel grass, merely as a floral exhibit. The modest floral exhibit, since it was shown at Wembley, has developed into a great industry for Newfoundland, and buyers from eastern Europe, Gt. Britain and western Europe have ordered it in immense quantities to use for mattresses and packing. It has greater reliance, and is superior to straw and hay. It is estimated that Newfoundland will export 100,000 tons of this weed in a year, whereas before Wembley it was merely an example of curious flora."

Before the exhibition opened not many weeks ago eel grass was a weed and in some localities a nuisance, remarks the New York, Wall Street Journal, it is now an established article of commerce.-Western Star.

Commenting on the above article, the Minister of Agriculture and Mines, Mr. W. J. Walsh, says, "It is absolutely misleading and positively unfair to Mr. Downey, the ex-Minister, and the present Deputy Minister, Mr. Turner, who were principally responsible for sending the samples to the Empire Exhibition, but not as floral exhibits as the article states, but rather for the purpose of trying to interest capitalists in the development of an old industry on a larger scale than heretofore." According to advices received by the Minister from Mr. Downey, a mattress, made of eel grass, by the well known firm of J. J. Henley, which was forwarded with the other exhibits, has received the approbation of dealers and a large market for the product is anticipated.
