



One breathless moment of hesitation then a plunge into vast emptines Your stomach kind of puckers, you breath catches. You count—

Jump—"two, three!" Falling—"st

Jump—two, three!" Falling—"st seven!" Faster—"twelve, thirteen! Whirling, twisting, head tumbling over heels, lazily as in slow motion pictures. "Twenty-seven, twenty eight." Your hand clutches the ricord of your parachute. Almost time to pull. "Thirty-one!" Now!

to pull. "Thirty-one!" Now!

Crack! With a tremendous jerk the parachute opens, nearly snapping you to pieces. The rest is like a dream. Floating, sailing, you drift along. The earth comes up to meet you. You look around for a place to set your feet. That green patch over there! You touch lightly. All over!

That is the way it feels to plung downward more than a thousand feel as described by Corporal Arthur R Bergo of the U.S. Army Air Service who has just done it.

He fell 1,200 feet in a single drop. His companion in the experiment Sergt. Randle L. Bose, dived 1,500 ft. the height of a 97-storey skyscraper nearly twice the height of the Wool worth Building. Never before have men fallen so far and lived to tell of it. The purpose of the feat was to determine whether an aviator can safely drop great distances before opening his parachute.

whenever a person has fallen from a great height, the usual comment heard is "He was dead long before he hit the ground." This notion is all wrong, authoritatively state the two daring parachute jumpers as the result of their thrilling experiment at Mitchel Field, N.Y. You don't even lose consciousness, they say. Instead,

your senses become more keen.

"I could reach down, pull off a pair
of overshoes, or do any other such
simple motion while falling," declared Sergeant Bose. "I was not dizzy.
I breathed easily."

And as for thinking—tradition would have us believe that in the perilous seconds before probable death, the whole of one's life passes in review like a flash. This, too, is an error, the two aviators declare. What Sergeant Bose says he thought of was dinner.

Three thousand feet in the air they leaped from a plane and deliberately dropped half the distance to earth before opening their parachutes. This great drop aviators estimate, takes seven seconds.







Sargent's popular fame as a por trait painter must not be allowed obscure his great achievement in other departments of art. An indefatigeable worker, he found his heliday recreation in painting landscapes, scenes of peasant life in the Tyrol and in Italy and Spain-impressions so vivid and spontaneous, so true in the suggestion of real light and atmospheric conditions, that they seem to be created by magic rather than by human agency.

Frequently a few loose streaks of paint, formless and meaningless in themselves and set down with feverish haste, combine, when seen at the right distance, into a suggestion of reality so vivid and complete as to be quite beyond the reach of more painstaking and elaborate representation.

Keenly sensitive to every mood of nature and humanity, he expressed in these pictures the chill and terrible desolation of the glacier region, the somnolence of mid-day heat in the south, the balminess of the spring day, the elegance and luxury of life in a Venetian palace, the bantering joviality of the tavern, or the tragedy of suffering at the hospital.

The last years of his life were almost exclusively devoted to his ambitious designs for the decoration of the Boston Library and other buildings in the United States. Sargent idolized Tiepolo, the great Venetian decorative painter, and to a certain extent based his own decorative style on that of the master of his choice.

SOME FAMOUS SITTERS. Apart from the Wertheimer por raits, the National Gallery owns Sargent's magnificent portait of Lord Ribblesdale, while at the Tate Gallery can be seen the group of three children in a garden illuminated by Chinese lanterns,, "Carnation, Lily, Lily, Rose," and the full length of "Ellen Terry as Lady Macbeth." For the Imperial War Museum he painted the the memorable pathetic procession of gassed soldiers returning from the renches.





ick Teeth as **Body-Poisoners**

he teeth may generate disease that is arried to all parts of the body by the d-stream, is told briefly in Chic igo's Health, the publication of that tity's Health Department, by Dr. Edor at Northwestern University. Why lo diseased teeth harm the rest of the ody? asks Dr. Hatton, It is generilly agreed that they do, he says; in leed, there is hardly a bodily infiraity, from insanity to corns, that has 10t been ascribed to infected teeth by ome one, and the natural result has seen the attempt to cure all these ill by extracting teeth, often with no efect. On the other hand, some of the cures achieved by this method seem miraculous. He continues:

"Acute disease or infection of a part of the body is associated with so much pain so much fever, and so much disability, that the seriousness of the condition is hardly ever questioned On the other hand, low-grade disease or infection progresses so slowly, with so little pain and fever, and so little impairment of the use of the part, that little attention is paid to such a disease condition. This is particularly true of diseased feeth.

"In such diseased regions there live and multiply germs that can find entrance into the blood stream or lymph channels, and thereby be carried to all parts. Such a diseased place is like a cottonwood tree that produces seeds that may be carried by the wind, or float on the surface of streams to far distant fertile ground, where they may germinate and develop into new trees entirely independent of the parent tree. In this same way bacteria or germs that have found a lodging place around the roots of a tooth may, through the blood stream, find a new location in which to multiply in the appendix, joints or elsewhere, and persist there long after the offending tooth has been extracted. This new lodging place then takes the place of the old one, and from it bacteria are still fed into the circulation to maintain the diseased condition.

"Not only do the bacteria invade the blood-stream and lymph channels, but in their growth they form waste products which are absorbed by the body fluids, and in turn act as poisons to the body cells.

"The preceding is a summary of the theory of focal infection, a theory which has become well established in the last ten years, and is the key to the solution of many a medical riddle if it is applied intelligently."

The two low-grade infections about the teeth that tend to reproduce themselves in the form of low-grade infections elsewhere in the body, are those around the ends of the roots of teeth, and those about the sides of the crowns and the roots. The former are usually called chronic abscess, and the latter pyorrhea. Dr. Hatton proceeds:

"In the former the infecting germs reach the favorable location at the root end through the pulp or 'nerve' canal of the tooth. This canal is opened and infection gets into it as a result of decay. Infection of the pulp or 'nerve' frequently, tho not always, causes a violent throbbing toothache, while infection at the root-end, after the 'nerve had died,' usually causes the tooth to be tender to pressure, although there may be no toothache. This infection gradually destroys more or less of the bone about the end of the

"These holes in the bone generally show in X-ray pictures. In some positions in the mouth, normal cavities or openings in the bone may be mistaken for abscesses unless the physician or for abscesses unless the physician or dentist is experienced in examining X-ray pictures.

"In pyorrhea the location of the infection is closer to the surface; the gum is detached from the root, the extent may be estimated by the use of small instruments inserted into the pus pockets alongside the roots of the teeth. From this condition the germs are not so likely to get into the blood and be distributed to other parts of the body as from the infectious around

"But the poisons formed by the bacteria are very abundant, and are likes ly to be absorbed into the overlying gum tissue, causing a chronic slow poisoning of the entire system.

"Disease of the lymph of the neck are especially liable to follow mouth infection in children. While it is not generally assumed that tuberculosis of the glands of the neck follows from mouth infection, it seems that it is more common in cases where children have badly decayed teeth. Cavities in the baby teeth may permit entrance for the germs of tuberculosis into the glands of the neck,

"Chronic mouth intection is extre-nely common, and especially so beyoud middle life. The removal of inection about the teeth is, therefore, important as the prevention of its oc-currence. For hauling materials, building tamps, making roadways, laying tracks, and provoiding food, added to those who did the actual drilling, 2,-300 men were employed.

An Alaskan dog wam and driver were imported from Klondike to transport mail and emergency supplies over the ridge in winter.
