

Tavern and Shop Licenses.

Hon Mr Crooks has introduced a Bill into the Ontario Assembly, for the purpose of amending the Act respecting Tavern and Shop Licenses. The Bill has had its first and second reading, and will very likely become law.

The Bill provides that no person shall keep spirituous liquors for sale without being duly licensed, except brewers and distillers, and chemists or druggists duly registered as such.

The following is the most important clause in the Bill, and one which can not meet with the approbation of Temperance men. Instead of limiting the number of places where liquor is sold, the Bill gives shopkeepers the power to sell in quantities less than a quart, thus increasing the number of houses of retail. The clause reads thus—

The Council of every city, township, town and incorporated village, and the commissioners of police in cities, may by by-law authorize the granting of certificates to obtain licenses for the sale of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors, in quantities less than one quart in any one shop or place, other than a tavern, inn, ale house, beer house, or house of entertainment at any one time, and not to be drunk on the premises.

The fee for licenses will also be very much higher. In cities the Government duty for tavern licenses will be \$30, an increase of \$10; in towns \$25, an increase of \$8; and in townships and incorporated villages \$15, or an increase of \$5. For each tavern license in any territory not under municipal government fifty dollars; and for each shop license in any such territory \$40. These fees are over and above the amount to be imposed by municipalities. Officers will be appointed by the Lieut. Governor, whose duty it shall be to enforce the observance of the Act; and the council of every county, township, town, incorporated village, and the commissioners of police in each city, shall, immediately after the Act comes in force, and some time in the month of January in each year, thereafter, appoint an officer or officers for the municipality, for the like purpose, and for the observance and enforcement of any by-law of the municipality, with respect to tavern and shop licenses, and shall fix and define the duties, powers, and privileges of the officer or officers so appointed; the remuneration he or they shall receive, and the security to be given for the efficient discharge of the duties of the said officer.

Defeat of the Prince Edward Island Ministry.

Private notices received at Ottawa announce the defeat of the Prince Edward Island Ministry. An appeal will be made immediately to the people, on the main issue of Confederation. Messrs. Laird and Hague, the delegates who have been at Ottawa for some time past, urging upon the Government the importance of the admission of the Island, as part and parcel of the Confederated Provinces, left for Charlottetown on Saturday, they having arrived at a basis of agreement with the Dominion Government, for the entrance of the Island into the Confederation.

ENTERPRISING.—Ottawa is certainly one of the most enterprising places in Canada. Its energy seems never to decrease, and its progress is rapid and substantial. The latest projects are the establishment of a store foundry, which will require one hundred men, a sewing machine factory which will increase with the requirements of the business, and will have their first machine ready by June, an organ factory, and a loan and savings company. The result of all this is purchase of lots, erection of buildings, and a rapidly increasing population and business.

CHANGING SPES.—It is stated that Mr. Cauchon has gone over to the Opposition in the Dominion Parliament. Disappointed ambition is assigned as the cause of this. It is said he aspired to the Lieut. Governorship of Quebec, and failing that, to be re-appointed Speaker of the Senate. The Conservatives pretend he is a good riddance. We may expect henceforth to find Mr. Cauchon's caustic talents applied to the criticism of Government measures, in which perhaps they will be most useful; but it is to be feared his accession to their ranks will hardly increase the qualifications of the liberal party to administer a pure government.

THE ASHES OF THE PAST.—Eighteen feet below the level of Cheapside lies Roman London; and deeper even than that is buried the earlier London of those savage charioteers who, long ages ago, bravely confronted the legions of Rome. In nearly all parts of the city there have been discovered tessellated pavements, Roman tombs, lamps, vases, sandals, keys, ornaments, weapons, coins, and statues of ancient Roman gods. So the present has grown up upon the ashes of the past.

THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES

Robbery of a Bank. Presentation of Rare Documents. Small Pox at Salt Lake City.

New York, March 10th. Professor John Torry, of the Columbia College, died this evening.

Louisville, March 10th. The Falls City Tobacco Bank was robbed, since Saturday, of thirteen thousand dollars in bonds and cash.

Philadelphia, March 10th. At the meeting of the Historical Society to-night Isaac Norris made a formal presentation of the Penn manuscripts, consisting of the original letters, documents, manuscripts, grants, papers, rare books, and pamphlets with reference to the early history of Pennsylvania, and other parts of America.

Salt Lake City, March 10th. The small-pox is raging to a fearful extent in several towns in San Pete County. Complaint is made that owing to the religious prejudice of the people they are prevented from obtaining proper medical attendance.

LATEST FROM HALIFAX.

Rowing Match Challenge Accepted. Snow Storm in Halifax Last Night.

Halifax, N. S., March 11.—The steamship "Manitoba" arrived from Baltimore this morning. She sails at four this afternoon.

The "Austrian" is making some slight repairs, and sails for Baltimore tomorrow.

The "Niger" has not yet arrived from Newfoundland.

A brisk snow storm occurred here last night, but was much heavier in the country, again impeding trains on the Intercolonial and Annapolis Railways. They are expected to be clear by to-night.

Brown's challenge to Sadler will be accepted; but Sadler wishes to row at Saratoga instead of Halifax.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Ottawa, March 10. Mr. Blake called the attention of the House to the other case of privilege which he had intimated he would bring before it, and he felt that the discussion which had already taken place would enable him to show in very much the remarks which he might otherwise have thought it his duty to make. He referred to the Muskoka election case. He recited the circumstances, already well known, under which the exceptional return was made.

Mr. Cockburn had polled, as appeared by the return, 652 votes, and Mr. Boulton 599. But certain poll books had been lost, and the returning officer thought he could not, for want of a perfect poll, make a return of either candidate. It appeared, however, that even although all the votes belonging to the divisions where the poll books were lost, had been given to Mr. Boulton, Mr. Cockburn would still have a clear majority of 26. He held that the House would not be deciding the election, there was a clear question of law. The facts were as they appeared upon the poll-books, and he quoted the proceedings taken in former cases, some of them having occurred while he held the post of the present Government in the House, to show that it was quite competent for the House to take action at once towards rectifying the return.

Mr. J. H. Cameron was understood to be in favor of giving Mr. Cockburn his seat.

Mr. John Macdonald began by defending the Returning Officer, and closed by accepting Mr. Blake's motion.

The return was amended and Mr. Cockburn was introduced by Messrs. Mackenzie and Dorian, and took his seat. Mr. Blake availed himself of the opportunity to severely chastise the leader of the Government for the inconsistency of his position to-day with that of Friday, and accused him of having been influenced in his course by the fear of appearing in a minority. He then moved that the returning officer for the district of Muskoka be summoned to the bar of the House to answer for his misconduct. The motion was carried, and the House adjourned at 5 p. m., till three o'clock to-morrow, then to take into consideration the Address.

ARRESTED.—We learn from St. Catharines that John Simmons, one of the accomplices in the express robbery, returned on Saturday. He was immediately arrested. At first he pleaded ignorant of the matter, but afterwards admitted that he and Bowden, after securing the money, took the night train for Buffalo, where they remained all day. On Thursday they proceeded to Cleveland, when he left Bowden. He states that all the money he received was \$29. He is now in jail.

GUELPH Pianoforte Factory. IN FULL OPERATION. Warranted for Six Years.

AN EXTENSIVE MANUFACTORY.—The largest comb factory in the world is at Aberdeen, Scotland. According to the description given of this vast and magnificent establishment, there are thirty-six furnaces for preparing horns and tortoise-shell for the combs, and no less than one hundred and twenty iron screw presses are continually performing the operation of stamping them. Steam power is employed to turn the combs. The coarse combs are stamped or cut out, two being cut in one piece at a time. The fine dressing combs are cut by fine saws, some so fine as to cut forty teeth in the space of one inch, and revolving five thousand times in the space of one minute. There are some two thousand varieties of combs made, and the aggregate number produced, of all these different kinds, is 8,000,000 annually, a quantity that, if laid together lengthwise, would extend about 700 miles.
