

Premier Home In Good Spirits

Hon. Richard McBride Concludes Very Successful Tour of Interior.

Conservatives Active Everywhere And Very Enthusiastic Over Outlook.

(From Yesterday's Daily.) The Premier, Hon. Richard McBride, returned last evening from a tour of the Mainland, taken for the purpose of inspecting political conditions.

General prospects could not be brighter for the party. There seems to be a regular slump in Conservative activity all over the country. I found that a great many Liberals propose to support the government, and they are making no attempt towards concealing their intentions.

"I visited Downey, Chilliwack, Kamloops, Yale, Okanagan, Revelstoke, Nelson, Roseland, Ymir, Greenwood, Phoenix, Grand Forks, Midway, Cranberry and Fernie, and held a large public meeting in Revelstoke and at other points. I met the executive committees of the Conservative organizations.

"The situation on the Lower Mainland indicates the return of Mr. Clifford, the government candidate in Westminister. His election is conceded on all sides. The Liberals are making frantic efforts to win the seat, but they are without avail.

"In Chilliwack, I met the Conservative executive, who numbered 40 persons. The committee is organized and will be completed in two weeks' time. There is no question of a Conservative victory in this district.

"In Kamloops, the fight will be between Deane and Fulton, and, as usual, in campaigns at this point, the fight promises to be a very spirited one. Mr. Fulton's majority in the last election was 100 votes.

"At Revelstoke, the Conservative standard-bearer will most likely be Thomas Taylor, the former minister. He will be opposed by Benjamin Socialist, and probably also J. M. Kelly, ex-M.P. Mr. Taylor is now a member of the Conservative executive.

"In Phoenix, Mr. Humburger and the vice-president of the Conservative party in the fight, as is also Mr. PUNCH, ex-M.P., and W. B. COLLISON, ex-M.P. In Grand Forks, Mr. Fraser, H. S. Cayley, Ernest Miller and Mayor Burrill are doing very good work.

"Spending work is being done also in Ymir, the seat of Cranberry, and Fernie. The executives of the Conservative organizations have been meeting for some time, and a preliminary campaign work is being done in the field.

SIR CHARLES DILKE AND THE COLONIES

Accuses Government of Hatching Tariff Question to Force Germany.

London, July 23.—When the House of Commons was in committee, referring to the Foreign Office vote, Sir Charles Dilke, Advanced Radical, assailed the foreign policy of the government, which he said was strangely inconsistent.

He compared the recent visit of the King to France and the proposed official visit to England, with what the government attitude was towards Germany, and accused the government of cringing to Germany in the Venezuelan matter, and of allowing themselves to be hoodwinked.

"But," Sir Charles added, "when there was a popular cry against the government, it hatched up the Canadian tariff question, and the late ministers had used language of absolute ferocity against Germany."

Under Secretary Lord Cranborne, replying, said the German empire had nothing to do, directly or indirectly, with the communications in reference to the co-operation of Great Britain and Germany in the Venezuelan affair, and vindicated the policy of the government in the matter, and said Great Britain was on friendly terms with all the powers.

Continuing, the Under Secretary, denied that Great Britain was getting the worst of it in Missouri. He said, Great Britain recognized the open door policy. Referring to the Canadian tariff dispute, Lord Cranborne said they must put their own colonies first, and an end must be put at once to the disabilities under which they suffer.

NEWPORT, R. I., July 23.—An attempt was made this morning about 1:45 o'clock to burglarize the Canadian Bank of Commerce at this place. Mrs. Campbell, local manager, has his family sleeping apartments at the rear of the bank, but as he is now in Winnipeg for a few days, Mr. E. B. K. Watson, assistant cashier, sleeps in the bank on a stretcher in the manager's office. Mr. Watson was awakened by the opening of a trap door communicating with the street, and grabbing his revolver, hurried to the accounting room in time to see a man raising the trap door and the intruder and the bullet struck the floor a little to one side. The burglar returned the fire, but fortunately missed his mark. The bullet passing close to Watson, went through the office partition and a hole in a coat which was hanging over a chair. Watson next raised the trap and started down the cellar stairs for his gun, when he was again shot at by the desperado, but again came off without harm, although the light from the room made him a fair mark, while his assailant was hidden in the darkness. Without considering his danger, he still advanced in the direction of the retreating burglar and got two more shots at him as he made his escape by an outside door from the cellar, but again missed him. There is no clue to the person or persons that attempted the robbery, but they evidently must have known the possible exit by well, and also of Mr. Campbell's absence. The entrance was made by an outside door to the cellar, which was back the bolt that held down the trap door with knives shoved down through the edge, and cut for the quick and determined action of young Watson, there is no doubt that if the gang had succeeded in entering the bank, they would have been overpowered by the robbers. Mrs. Campbell and her sisters were sleeping in their apartments, and were awakened by the shooting. REMOVED TO BASILICA OF ST. PETERS TO RECEIVE FINAL FAREWELLS.

Message of Condolence Received From His Majesty King Edward.

Rome, July 22.—Tonight the body of Leo XIII. lies in state in the basilica of St. Peter's. Beginning tomorrow at sunrise the people of Rome and those of all nations who in the Eternal City will be admitted to their last farewell. Opportunity for this solemn tribute will end Saturday.

Until five o'clock this afternoon the remains of the dead Pope lay in the throne room of the Vatican, where the leaders of the diplomatic clerical and civil world were allowed to pass the bodies of the dead. When the body was conveyed from the throne room to St. Peter's was one of the most solemn sights of the city.

Dr. Laponi in the course of the day presented Cardinal Gregia a report of the autopsy which was held, which showed that there was no sign of cancer in the Pope's body.

Some hours before sundown St. Peter's was cleared of idle crowds. The throng of sight-seers was passed back to the foot of the great steps, and the throng of several hundred carpenters hastily constructed a stout fence five feet high, with a double row of iron spikes, and crowds which are expected during tomorrow and the two following days.

At this morning's session of the conclave when the subject of the election of a successor was held in Rome it is reported that only Cardinals Martini and Sestini were present. The ground of possible influence of the Italian government, Cardinal Gregia, who is a member of the conclave, has favored a proposition to hold a concave outside of Italy, which was rejected. It was decided that all participating in the conclave should not be allowed to hold communication of any kind with the world. In 1878, Cardinal Hohenlohe was permitted to have his meals sent from home, although when the conclave he notified Crispi, the Minister of Interior of Italy, and Bismarck about the proceedings of the conclave. It has been decided that the cells for each cardinal in the conclave shall be chosen by lot. Preparations for the conclave have already begun in the Sistine chapel, where the balloting will occur.

Outside the Vatican an interested crowd, including a number of Italian soldiers, watched the conclave. In the meanwhile the congregation of cardinals met in the hall of the conclave, where the president of Cardinal Gregia. It was determined to arrange for the accommodation of the cardinals during their seclusion.

At 5 o'clock this afternoon the doors of the throne room were closed and the cardinals in the conclave were dressed by the attendants of the late Pontiff began dressing the body in full pontifical robes.

At 8 o'clock a procession was formed and the body will be taken to St. Peter's.

Rome, July 22.—Cardinal Gregia today received the following telegram from King Edward: "London, July 22, 1903. I have just received the news of the death of the Pope with profound grief and orders me to transmit to Your Majesty my sincere sympathy. His Majesty will always preserve a grateful recollection of his services to the Holy See." (Signed, Lansdowne.)
