TERRIBLE RAVAGES OF FIRE ALL OVER THE PROVINCE.

Much Suffering in Eastern Ontario—Scores of Valuable Crops Destroyed—Desclated Homes—Testerday's Welcome Rain.

The excessive heat of the past few days has produced terribly fatal effects in every part of Ontario. Scarcely a forest of any size in the province has escaped the ravages offflames; in numerous instances whole crops have been destroyed in the fields, rcores of well-filled barns have been swept away, many a frugal husbandman has lost the circuit value of the circuit v the largest and finest in his home, and several villages have been in

The state of the s for David Winters, besides a large amount of other property, such as fences, etc. The neighbors were assisting each other at daylight this morning, trying to check the flames and to save their buildings. Another fire started on the Hayes farm, on the boundary between Tyendinaga and Richmond, in the rear of the second concession of Tyendinaga, and crossed the line into the fourth concession of Richmond into McGreer's woods. A fire started yesterday about 2 p. m. between the ninth and tenth concessions of Richmond, twelve miles north of Napanee, on the west side of a large cedar and tamarach swamp near Mud lake.
