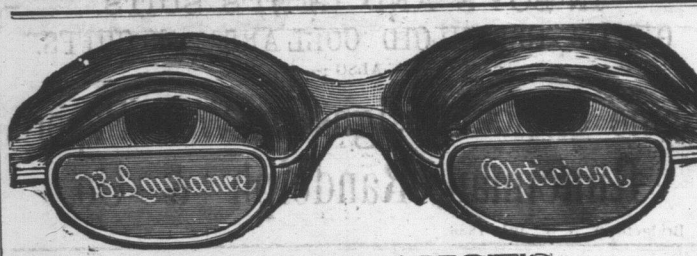

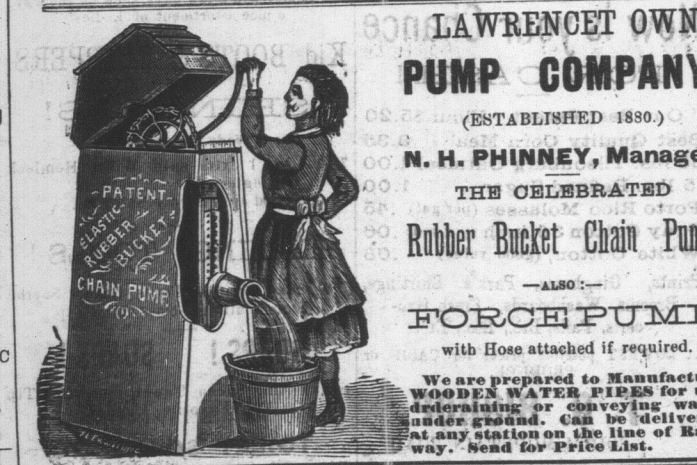

opening of the month for enough to prevent the passage of a knife blade between the teeth. From that point the progress of recovery was rapid, until now the foot is well and the lockjaw disappears. Dr. Taylor said: 'It is the only case or cure of traumatic tetanus in the history of the world. There are only two remedies prescribed by the books, mercury and the calabar bean, and they are not cures, but possible palliatives until death brings relief. Even at the best, if they could cure tetanus, mercury is likely to cause palsy and calabar bean produces paralysis of the muscles of the chest, which results in death. So I went to an anatomy theory of treatment, assuming the responsibility for the results, and am glad that I did. For seven weeks I never left her side, day or night, until her recovery was assured. I simply gave her all the morphia and stimulants that she could bear. Fifteen ounces of whisky, and I don't know how much of other liquors and wines she took, she consumed, and, with the exception of the morphia, not a drop of other medicine. Now she is well, and going out riding every day, and is getting her strength rapidly. Traumatic tetanus is very different from epidemic tetanus, which is produced by other causes than violent physical injuries, and is easy of cure.
