Franco-Russian Alliance.

New York, Sept. 28.—A despatch to the Heraid from Berlin asys: The Kreuz Zeitung declares that the Franco-Russian alliance has become a political factor of the first impor-tance. At any moment war, which up to the present time has been avoided only by a miracle, may break out. The signal for hos-tilities will, however, be given from Paris, not St. Petersburg, where the want of a firm hand on the government is everywhere ap-parent.

A Derelict in the Bay.

The four-masted schooner Gypsum Prince, which went ashore on the old Proprietor, Grand Manau, last July, has drifted off, and is now floating around the hay. Pilot boat Lightquing, of St. John, reports seeing the schooner bottom up five miles inside Seal Ialand, Machias. She is very dangerous to navigation, and right in the track of steames bound to St. John.

The Armenian Question.

London, Sept. 27.--In the Daily News yesterday the statement appeared that in consequence of the reported imminent with-drawal of the powers from further action in regard to demanding reforms in Armenia, it has been decided to hold a conference at an early date in Paris to discuss the Armenian question. No mention is made by the News of the promoters or details of the project.
