Consumptives' Sanitarium. The Nova Scotia legislature at its last session voted \$15,000 for a consumption sanitarium, to be established at Halifax or vicinity—a hospital for the special treatment of consumption. A commission, consisting of Dr. Edw. Farrell, Halifax, chairman; Dr. Huxley McDonald, Antigonish; Dr. John Mackay, New Glasgow; Dr. Stewart, St. John; Murray and Farrel, are inspecting several sites in Halifax and Dartmouth, Scotch Village, and other places in the suburbs, which have been offered available for a locality for the sanitarium, which will be commenced next day.
