TRADE AND COMMERCE.

COMMERCIAL JOURNAL OFFICE.

Victoria May 18, 1897.

Jobbers report a steady and highly satisfactory trade. On the whole, British Columbia may be considered in as good shape for business as any other part of the country, and a good deal better off than some.

GROCERIES AND PROVISIONS.

The B. C. Sugar Refinery has stopped quoting Confectioners' A, a grade of sugar between granulated and Empire A. Confectioners' A was, it is said, intended to meet the competition of the Hong Kong granulated, which is quoted 14c. below the refinery price for their granu-

Canned tomatoes and wax beans are advanced 5c. a dozen. California butter is firm and advancing. San Francisco advices say receipts of butter have been moderate, a good deal of packing now going on. Prices are higher than last week, and the market is firm at quotations. The cheese market is active and steady.

FRUITS AND VEGETABLES.

New potatoes are quoted by jobbers at 1%c, per pound. The California market is steady. New potatoes being a trifle higher. New silverskin onions are weaker owing to a large supply in the Sa nFrancisco market. Local dealers quote 2e. In oranges St. Michaels are quoted at \$3.75 to \$4 per box and Mediterranean sweets \$2.75 to \$3. Oranges are in good supply in San Fransisco, but a good many of the consignments received there are of poor quality and practically unsalable. Choice stock is firmly held.

SALMON

There is a continued fair run in the Sacramento river, with the Sacramento Packing Company still packing, says The Herald of Trade. More sales are reported but at prices withheld. It is reported that the price is over \$1.05 but not quite \$1.10. From the Columbia river the runs have been interfered with by two or more days of unsettled weath-The pack so far is said to be dis appointing small. From London mail advices state that Alaska is firm and unchanged but Fraser river was offering at 19a, 3d. for flats, with no sales. The market was well stocked. We are informed that new season pack is offering there at 16s, for talls and 17s, 9d, for flats c. f. i. This is an exceptionally low figure which indicates that low figures are not confited to Columbia river alone

INTERNATIONAL GOLD MINING CONVENTION.

Circulars have been issued announcing that the above convention will be held in Denver, Colorado, on 7th, 8th and 9th of

The objects of the convention are to secure such national legislation as may be calculated to promote the business interests and development of the resources of the mining industry in North and South America; to bring together mining men and investors; to increase reciprocal trade among them; to discuss such questions as are naturally suggested by its objects; to cultivate acquaintance, fraternal feeling and hearly co-operation among the various mining, commercial and labor bodies represented; and especially to take under advisement the importance of the creation by Congress of a department to be known as the Department of Mines and Mining, thus securing a Cabinet officer that represents an interest which affects more than one-third of the people of the United States.

The basis of representation is intended to be broad so as to embrace delegates of all classes interested both directly and indirectly in the mining industry. The convention will be called to order by the Hon. Alva. Adams, Governor of Colurado.

#### NOT BUSINESS LIKE.

Mining companies ought to act as do other trade organizations on business principles. It should not be so difficult to find out whether mining property is valuable or wortness that the buyer derends for the security of his investment on any name, however honorable. Of course the element of tisk is never ansent from the parchase of undeveloped or partially developed mining property; out the intending purchaser by the exercise of ordinary prudence can and should obtain such information as to the indications of inneral wealth in the properry for which he is negotiating as would justify him in investing or retusing to invest his capital in the venture. In no other business would a man come to his customers and say, "I want you to buy so-and-so because the Honorable. This or Sir Somebody That has imught some of it." If a grocer, a farmer, a dry goods man or : banker were to talk in this way ho would be very soon asked to show his goods, or if that could not be done to give convincing testimony as to their vialue from people who had seen them and understood ad about them. It seems to us that mines like all other property should be offered for sale on their man ker value and that their owners have vo right to strive to advance their proby any adventitions circumstance calculated to gain the confidence of the ignorand and mexperienced. Several of our entemporaries have published the letter sent from this city by W. J. Dowler to Sir Henry Joly and the telegram of the Latter in reply. Sir Henry was asked to become a partner in the company of which Mr. Dowler was secretary-treasover, and offered for als name and in fluence, without cost to hanself, "20,000 fully good up and non-assessable shares .; the capital stock of the company." Sir Henri very curtly refused to have anything to do with the company. It would be will if all gen lemen to whom sim lar offers are made in the future wid be as serupulous as Sir Henri Joly. If centienen in his position can be shown that it is for their morrest to invest their money in any company they are, or cusht to be, quite able and willing to pay for any shares they may wish to purchase. If, on the other hand, the scheme is dishonest or badly conceived, er's shop, barns and houses for the mem-

no man of honor wants to have anything to do with it, no matter how carefully he is secured against risk or loss.

### FAILURES.

The following extracts from a late issue of the Montreal Star show that the working of the new tariff bears hard on some manufacturers and business men.

The Ontario Silver Works at Humberstone, one of the products of the natural gas belt, and the chief mainstay of the town is to be closed down. All orders for material have been cancelled in the cutlery department, and as soon as the goods on hand have been completed, the pant will be shipped to Muncie, Ind. This will throw over fifty men out of employment, the most of whom will icave the country. England and Germany were always hard competitors in cutlery, and the lowering of the tariff has completely ruined the sale of the Canadian goods.

At a meeting of the Toronto Printing Pressmen's Union, a resolution was passed, protesting against the proposed reduction in the duty on printed matter to 25 per cent, ad valorem and asking the government to reconsider the matter and give a protection of 35 per cent. or its equivalent to the printing industry. The present duty on paper, the resolu-tion points out, is 25 per cent, and 35 per cent., and in addition heavy duties are collected on all raw materials used in the printing business. Consequently, it is claimed, the operation of the above daty will cause a large amount of printing that is now done in Canada (and espossibly in this city) to be done in the United States. A Copy of the resolution has been sent to Mr. Fielding.

At a meeting of the creditors of the e date of George Wilson, St. Cathrines, need there on Monday evening, a states ment was read showing Babilities of about \$25,000. Fred, Wilson made an ofter or forty cents on the dollar, which wait probably be acepted.

The old and well known firm of James Morrison, bruss manufacturers, of Adeunde street, Toronto, is in financial difheuries. The creditors met en Wednesday. An offer of twenty cents on the dollar was made to unsecured creditors and they were disposed to accept, but the Traders' bank, which is the larges creditor, objected, and another meeting will be held in the course of a week.

### A CO-OPERATIVE SOCIETY.

The Columbian contains an account of an interesting experiment which is being tried at the mouth of the Stave river, about twenty-five miles above New Westmaster A society called the Redskin Mills was organized in 1895 and es unneuers) operations last fall numbers of the society have built a mill, boiler house, dry kiln, boarding house, general store, smithy, shoemak-

hers. The village also contains a school. The society, which numbers fifty-four, has timber berths on the Stave river. It is a co-operative society, and provides that the management be vested in a board of directors, subject to the initiative and refendum, and any officer may be changed at any general meeting by a two-thirds vote. It is provided that all the members receive the same remuneration, which is rated on the net earnings of the concern. While the members thus secure to themselves all the value of their work, they also have their houses and supplies at cost, thus saving at both

### SCARCITY OF CATTLE.

There is a great scarcety of cattle this summer. The dealers in the central states find it hard to get a sufficient and suitable supply of animals to kill, and the people of Washington are selling their cattle to send east. The indications are that there will not be enough cattle to supply the home market with beef. British Columbia's farmers should remember that it is a bad policy to sell ell their cattle, even if they should get a big price for them, and that their live stock will well repay all the care that can be given them.

### A FEDERAL MATTER.

The frequent and disastrous floods in the lower part of the Mississippi valler shows the inability of the States immediately affected, to cope with the difficulty of keeping the river within bounds. From all parts of the republic come expressions of the conviction that the Federal Government should come to the rescue and prevent the inundations which cause such loss of life, destruction of property and interruption of business. The floods are caused by the surplus water which rise in many states, and the interruption in business affects them all, therefore, it is argued, the whole people will cheerfully take upon itself the burden of keeping the great highway open and securing the safety of those who dwell upon its banks.

### DEPARTMENTAL STORES.

A vigorous wordy war is being waged in some quarters against the large dopartmental stores. It seems to us the best way to fight these concerns is for each dealer to select the very best goods, but them up as tastefully as possible and by the most careful attention to business show his customers that they can always be sure at his store of getting the very best that the market produces. A man who has only one thing to attend to ought to be able to do his work better than he who must oversee a great number of departments. And it is as true now as ever it was that "If you want a thing well done you must do it yourself."

#### TIMBER.

Burk Bre Comment

We hear so much lately about mines and mining that we are apt to forget the immense value of the timber resources of our province. Yet when it is remembered that in the old world the timber supply is year by year growing less and that on the eastern coast of this continent the virgin forest has almost disappeared an idea of the value of the timber limits of the Pacific slope can be arrived at. When it is too late we will have to deplore the wasteful methods by which great tracts of timber land are year by year laid waste. With proper care our forests may for generations to come be a great and increasing source of profit to British Columbia.

### EDITORIAL COMMENT.

The United States merchants are buying large quantities of textile fabrics in anticipation of tariff changes.

It is stated that the output of gold from the Le Roi and War Eagle mines at Rossland is equal to nearly 50 per cent. of the total output of the whole of Western Australia.

The Americans are selling their butter to Great Britain. In March England imported a million of pounds of United States butter, but then her total imort was 32,000,000 pounds.

The new United States tariff which is to come into force on July 1st increases the duties on sugar, tea and beer, and raises the internal revenue tax on souff and chewing tobacco, cigars and cigar-

Some idea of the extent to which the United States purchase foreign wool may be gathered from the fact that within the week ending May 1st, 26,-386,000 pounds of wool, worth about \$4,-000,000 were imported into Boston.

Parcels for all the Australian colonies with the exception of West Australia, and also for New Zealand, can now be forwarded via the monthly line of steamers sailing for Sydney, N. S. W. The postage is 24 cents per pound, up to 11 pounds.

Gold is being largely exported from the United States. Whether these shipments are due to demands for gold from foreign countries or are being sent out to pay the indebtedness of United States merchants, is a matter upon which financial men do not agree.

The Manufacturers' Association of Toronto protest against the preferential clause in the new tariff on the ground that it may be made to include foreign countries as well as England, and on the clause against combines because it is class legislation, and as such objectiona ble.

It was anticipated that those who wished to go "home" this year to celobrate Her Majesty's Jubilee, could obtain cheap rates on the ocean steamers. Instead of that the rates are from 15 to 25 per cent, higher than in former years. Still every berth is taken-in same cases weeks ahead. The Canadian liners are getting their share of the travel, and will, it is to be hoped, find this & very prosperous year.

Captain Turner, of the tugboat Oklahama, a few days ago towed the Japanese ship Tenkio Mara into Portland. For this he has been arrested and charged with a breach of the pilotage laws. A great deal of interested is manifested in the case as many of the merchants of that city consider compulsory pilotage a great injustice. The Pilots' Association are prosecuting Captain Turner and he is being defended by the Company.

A new kind of farming is about to be commenced in the "Everglades" of The Ringling Bros., of Chicago, bave bought a large tract of land in that state where they propose to raise wild animals, such as lions, tigers, hippotami, rhinoceri, giraffes, etc. These animals will be sold to the proprietors of circuses, and to zooloogical gardens. It is a curious enterprise, but its promoters believe it to be feasible, as the climate and conditions of Florida are similar to the regions where most of these animals are found in their native state.

Our neighbors to the south of us are trying the experiment of raising beet root sugar in large quantities. Secretary Wilson says: "If we can succeed in extending the beet sugar industry down to the very line of the sugar cane area. there ought to be no difficulty in producing in the United States all of the \$100,000,000 worth of sugar for which we are going abroad ever year." To this end, we suppose, the duty on sugar is about to be raised, and this is the rea son why many people in the United States object to the recoprocity treaty with Hawaii.

Two large cotton factories, the Columbus Spinning Company and the Bennett Manufacturing Corporation, of New Bedford, failed last month. 3oth concerns, by making false representations of their indebtedness, obtained large loans from the banks, not only in New Bedford, but in Boston and other places. The banks are blamed for their want of business methods in not finding out exactly what the financial standing of the companies was. A proper ex-

amination of their books would have shown an expert accountant exactly how their affairs stood, and what chapce there was of a loan being repald.,

We all know the old adage "cleanliness is next to godliness," but one has only to walk down our streets one of these fresh spring mornings to feel how true it is. The store whose windows are brightly polished, the counters of which are spotiess and upon whose packages or parcels a grain of dust is not to be found invites custom, while the grimy window, the dust-covered parcels and the soiled counters fill the mind with doubt as to the quality of the goods exposed for sale and send the customer to buy of the vendor who proves his faith in the virtues of soap and water by the vigorous use of the scrubbing brush and the hose. It is true that already the dust from the street has begun to wage an insidious war against cleanliness, and that the watering cart is by no means equal to the task of laying it, yet even attorney of the North Pacific Lumber though our street are dusty and our platfroms shabby energy, industry and a love of purity can make our shop windows a source of attraction not only to intending purchasers but to the strangers who stroll along our streets. If the painter can be called to our assistance so much the better. But let us use water and plenty of it.

> The following extract from the London corespondent of the United States Investor, shows what outsiders think of the prospects of British Columbia:

"That the latter country will enjoy an increasing amount of European attention as time goes on may safely be predicted. The report of the minister of mines of British Columbia for 1896 contains information and figures, which clearly shows the long strides by which the mining radastry in that country has advanced. A favorable feature is the establishment by the government of the bureau of mines for the purpose of obtaining and registering full information respecting the various mines, means of communication and other details likely to be of interest and assistance to those concerned in the industry. It is possible that this organization may also eventually prove a valuable safeguard towards preventing a reoccurance in the case of British Columbia of those sounding reparts and tinkling prospectuses which were so successfully employed by unsrupulous promoters in the South Africa boom. All efforts should be used to save the fair carcass of this new El Dorado from a gathering together of those vultures of finance in gleeful anticipation of another unholy mirrort.

The Chicago board of aldermen are discussing an ordinance by means of which retail cigarette dealers will have to pay an annual tax of \$100. It is predictedthat the bill will be passed, and that from 8000 to 12,000 dealers will be "closed up."

The governor has signed the Greater New York bill, and the enlarged city will begin its official existence January 1,1898. It will be the second city in extent of territory and size of population in the world, ranking next to London and ahead of Paris. It will contain 3593 square miles, will be 32 miles long, and 16 miles wide at the points of greatest dimensions, and will contain about 3,000,000 inhabitants under an honestly conducted census.

Probably ninety out of every hundred people believe that war, particularly when it occurs in Europe, acts as a stimulus to prosperity in this country. No grosser fallacy was ever disseminated. As the Minneapolis Commercial Bulletin says:

"It may look like good business to sell your good customer a revolver on which. you make a dollar. But if he gets it to shoot himself with, you have lost a good customer, though you have made a dollar. A general war in Europe means dead Europeans. Dead Europeans eat no wheat; they wear no cloth made of American cotton; they consume no American guns and canned meats for a time while papers and trade journals generally. It inearing future, -[Insurance,

the war lasts, but after the war is over the dead Europeans will be dead for a long time. Moreover, their widows and orphans will not be in a good fix to pay for American canned meats, or to wear much American cotton, or to buy many steel rails. Furthermore, they will have some domestic national debts to pay up, principal and interest, and national debts last a long time, and take great quantities of individual savings before they are wiped out. When powder goes up in smoke it never brings back any substantial return. When bullets are thrown at people they do not benefit business as they would if they had passed from hand to hand in the shape of lead pine or paint."

it has no other effect than to put a stop to some of the foolish talk in the newspapers on this subject it will not have been written in vain.

I shall never get done thinking of life insurance as of work done for some one who can't work; and the picture is ever before me of the strong man battling against stern difficulty, going through cruel storm and into the dark, and evermore the thought of wife and children in his heart. #### PROSPERITY IS INEVITABLE.

"There are three reasons," says the Railway World, "why rates are so well maintained. That they are maintained nobody who has tried to go under them can doubt. They were never maintained better, though never could they be more e-sily broken. If business were up to its standard half as well as tariffs, the railroads would all be prosperous. three reasons why tariffs are solid are these . First, rates are very low; second, officials feel their resp msibility and know that the first man to cut a rate now will be a hoodoo to himself in the business hereafter; third, such business as exists is substantial and promises to develop day by day. The third consideration is perhaps the greatest of all in warding off demoralization. Railroad men who think broadly realize its importance. realize that while business is extremely dull, but looking over the whole field of operations many encouraging signs are noted, one of the first of which is the 'moneyed' condition of farmers. Never, since the spring of 1892, have farmers had so much money. Since the panic of 1893 they have had average crops, and in spite of all the wailing about low prices they have realized well on their products. The average price of wheat has been over 50 ocnts, while the farmer who couldn't produce this commodity under 40 cents, including all costs, fixed charges, etc., should never expect prosperity. implement manufacturing concerns which had a hard grip on the farmer have released it, for the farmer has paid off the chattel mortgages and has money in his pocket. The effect on the country of the experience of the past four years has been like that of refunding on a great railread system. Jobbers have threshed out their books and know where they stand better than they have for many years. They are not doing a tremendous business, but they know their people and have confidence. The men, the money, the brains tons, Capt. and the enterprise are here and business Cundy, arrived May 2, loading lumber. cannot be stopped. Prosperity is inevi-

table, but there will be no boom. The railways were never surer of good, round revenues than they are to-day, revenues to which they are entitled and of which they may be permanently assured. Having seen such dark days they will appreciate these revenues all the more and swell the net results in proportion to the economy they practice and judicious expenditures they make."
