## INSOLVENCY LAWS.

In the absence of a general Bankrupt Law, some of the Provinces are providing local laws to facilitate the assignment and administration of estates for the benefit of creditors.

We have been passing through the aame experience in respect to these matters as our neighbors to the South, and are now in precisely the same position as they are. The Federal Bunkruptey laws there were repealed some yeurs ago, and notwithstanding many attewpis to secure the enactment of a new law the opposition of the South and West to such a messure has hitherto prevented its psssage. The differentStates are now revising their local systems to fill the gap, and the New Hampshire Legislature, at its recent bebsion, enacted an insolvency law which establishes moderate court fees and promises to work well. Of the position generaliy the N. Y. Evening Post says: "Good State laws regarding insolvency "are of course much better than pinor "ones, but the best local system in all "the thirty-eight Siates would not re" move the necessity for a uniform
"N atimal Act,"-an opinion with which wo entirely coincide. We learn that more sensible views are beginning to prer. vail, and that something may be accon:plished next winter.
The position of this important matter is therefore much the same in both countries. We sincerely hope that their expectations and ours for a sound and useful law may bus fully and speedily realized. Meantine we have to make the best of the regulations which we have in the Provinces of Quebec and Ontario, the general provisions of which we propose to note.

In this Province an Act was passed at the lastsession of the Legislature amending the Code of Civil Procedure, in so far as it concerns "Abandonment of property." The principal features of the law as it now stands are as follows:

Any debtor arrested under a writ of capins, and every trader who has "ceased his payments," and has been required by an unsecured creditor for $\$ 200$ and over to make an abandonment, may make a jadicisl abandonment of his property for the benefit of his creditors.
The abandonment is to be made before the prothonotary, who appoints a provisi nal guardian (selected from the creditors if possible) who takes immediate posses. sion of the estate, and is vested with certain powers for the conservation thereof.
Subsequenlly a meeting of the creditors is convened and a curator is appointed, on their recommendation, by the Court.
After the abandonment all proceedings at law against the insolvent are suspended, and the curator is vested with all rights of action possessed by the debtor or by the mass of the creditors. He is bound to administer the estate under the advice of the creditors or of inspectors appointed by them. The reguIations as to notice of proceedings, flling claims, dividends, security, etc., are all of a reasonable kind, and such as are usually found in laws of this kind.
: These provisioss apply mainly to cases where debtors are willing to make a voluntary abandonment, but there are others covering the case of a debtor who refuses to do this. The most important are the amendments of the sections relating to capias and attachment. The only conditions now necessary to be proved in order to obtain the arrest of a trader, or the nttachmeut of his property, are, "that he is a trader, that he has coased his payments, and has refused to make an assignment of his property for the beriefit of his creditors."
In Ontario, an Act passed the Lo gislature at its last session entitled "An

Act respecting assignments for the benefit of creditors." At the time it was passed an Insolvent act was under consideration at Ottawn, and the Ontario Legislature therefore provided that the Act passed by it should not come into force antil proclaimed by the Lieutenant Governor. The necessary proclamation was issued in July, and the Act is in force from the lat Soptember. Its terms are of much importance to our wholesale merchants and bankers, who give credit largely in that Province.
Its most important features are:
It makes void all gifts or assignments of real or personal property " made by any " person at a time when he is in insolvent "circumstances or is unable to pay his "debts in full, or knows that he is on "the eve of insolvency, with intent to "defeat, delay, or prejudice his creditors,
"or to give any one or more of them a pre-
"ference." The operation of this clause is limited in the case of money payments to those made within one month prior to theassignment, which are void as against the assignment, but not as against other claims. It does not affect any transfer of property for which reasonable value is given in oxchange, and no limit of time seems to be fixed for the prescription of claims for fraudulent transfers of real estate and chattels.
The debtor may make a general assign. ment for the bonefit of his creditors to the Sheriff of the county, or to some perso:l residing in the s.me county approved by the creditors. The latter provision is no doubt intended to remove the incentive that existed under the old Insolvent Act, for Official Assignees to promote bankruptcy proceedings for their own good, which was in practice one of the worst features of the old Act, and brought hundreds under its provisions who could and would have worked through their difficulties had not their commercial morality been debauched by interested parties. So far this provision is likely to have a good effect.
The insignment vests the estate fully in the assignee, and takes precedence of "all judgments and all executions not "completely executed by payment."
The voting of creditors is to be on a scale based on the rmount of their claims. This is a new feature, but evidentiy equitable, and its working will be watched with interest. The scale adopted is as follows:

and an additional vote for every addi-
tional $\$ 1,000$ or fraction thereof. This, without depriving the smaller creditors of a reasonable voice in the management, will protect any large creditor or creditors from being overwhelmed by a numbor of small creditors whose aggregate interests may bẹ a very small proportion of the whole. Provision is made to prevent the manufacture of votes by splitting large claims into a number of small ones.

An important clause in the Act is that requiring secured creditors to value their securities, and reduce their claims accordingly. All security given by the debtor, or by the primary debtor where he is secondarily liable, must be valued, and a special clause is added to cover claims of bsuks holding customers' paper endorsed by the debtor, which are declared to be secured within the meaning of the Act.
The main part of this provision is copied from the old Act, but its justice may bo doubted, as it deprives the secured creditor of a right which by his care and diligence he has obtained, and which, under the common law, he had no difficulty in enforcing. A mortgagee, for instance, has ordinarily a double security, as it were, for his dobt, namely a claim on his debtor's general eatate for the. full amount, and a lien or privilege on the property mortgaged for anything not otherwise paid. The mortgagor promises to pay the debt quite aside from the property pledged, if needs be, but this provision of the insolvent law practically cancels this promise, and alters the contract between the partios to one for the payment only of auy balance not covered by the property, which is a very different thing. Any other arrangement woulid no doubt secm inequitable to the unsecured creditors, but if the law simply carries out, as far as possible, the contracts existing between the parties no real injustice is done to sny one.
The main value of the legislation in both provinces is that it brings about the recognition by the law of assignments for the benefit of creditors, and puteran end to litigation.
In this province, at least, instances are not unknown of eatates eaten up by litigation after voluntary assignment, dissatisfied creditors having it in their power to sue for their claims and recover coste, if nothing more, to the injury of the forbearing, creditors and all others interested, except the lawyers.

No additional provision is made in Ontario for bringing insolvent debtors, who may be dealing unfairly or fraiudu-
lently with their estates, to task; but, as far as the legislation goes, it is on the whole useful and practical.

## TUE QUESTION OF THE DAY.

"If I hadn't read it in the papers, I should not know yet that there was any small- $;$;ox in the city," was the remark of a business man on St. James street a few days ago. conversing on the subject with a timid visitor. If ever a mountain was made out of $a$ mole-hill it may be seen in the exaggeration of the extent of and mortality from the small-pox in Montreal during the last few weeks. The city papers too indiscriminately led the way. Certain young professionals aim at bettering their slender incomes by furnishing correspondence for papers to the south and west; and, being more or less over worked, have scarcely time to discriminate in their turn, and do not confine themselves to a free use of the evening papers in preparing their despatches. The readiness with which libel cases are instituted in this Province has doubtless had some effect upon reckless statements in the press; not so, however, with the reports in papers without the Province, especially with those prepared by special correspondents; nothing concerning Montreal affairs is too sensational for their columns. The reports concerning the recent scare, however, casts them all into the shade. Is there no recourse ayainst such wholesale slander? It is not a little singular, considering all this, that the actual figures showing the mortality and number of cases for the last six months, given by Mr. James Coristine at the meeting in the Corn Exchange last Fivilay, appeared in none of the papers, although an apparent attempt was made to give a synopsis of his remarks. The figures were furnished the following day and appeared in the evening. It is to be inferred that, had Mr. Coristine, or anybody elso, stated that there were any number of hundreds of cases or deaths in the city, the statement would not require to be sent to the offices of the paperg. Nany of our citizans who spent some weeks at the sea-side during August, who depended on the published reports for their information, returned home in fear and trembling, many of them leaving their families behind; it was only after a few days in the city that they recovered their self-possession, and began to look around and wonder what they had been trightened about, and make remaka similar to that at the opening of this article. It wero well if people at a distance could also have means equally convincing ot judging for themselves.

Nom, as to the extent of the so-called " epidemic," "scourge," "plague," or other extreme terms used to describe it by our neighbors in their sad disregard for facts. We know that with many people the use of strong language is more natural than with olhers; with them a thing is either hot or cold, black or white, no neutral tints; it is always a boom or a panic, a feast or a famine,-or, as with many of the loveliest of the creation, a thing is "perfectly lovely" or "awfully nice," " perfectly horrid" or "Awfully mean ; " but surely one ought to expect something more exact from the gentle. men of the press. It is bad enough when the character of an individual, a family or corporate body is concerned, but when the reputation and welfare of a whole city-a whole people-are at stake, common sense, common humanity should prompt some degree of caution. The figures given by Mr. Coristine are as follows: Total small-pox deaths in Montreal from 1st April to 23 rd Augusi, 220 ; of these only 8 occurred in St. Lawrence ward 8 in St. Antoine, 2 in St. Anne's and 1 in the Centre ward, the remainder being in the far east end and the separate municipalities to the north-east. None of the wholesale and manufacturing houses are within a mile or two of these districts. Judging from the reports published abroad, Montreal would appear to be having an almost equal number of deaths weekly, or even daily. In the busi. ness portion of the city and in more than three-fourths of the populated area, including all the leading hotels, Montreal may claim equal immunity from smallpox or any other form of disease with any city on the continent. Dr. Larocque, the Federal statistical officer, has prepared for the Government a statement showing the mor tality from smallpox in Montreal during the last three months. In June there were 22 deaths, in July 52, and in August 200 , or a total of 324 deaths. The mortality among French-Canadian children was 241 , all of about the significant age of five, and among adults 29 . The number of Irish Catholics who succumbed was 27 , of which 7 were adults. Among Italians 2 children and 1 adult died. Among Scotch Catholics there was 1 adult and 1 child; among German Catholics 1 child ; among English Catholics 3 children. The mortality among Protestants consisted of 11 chilldren and 7 adults.
Much mischier has been done the city owing to the actual state of aflairs which formed the foundation for the wild statements about us in other cities. Anticipat. ing this and recognizing the importance of preparing for nuy emergency, the
manufacturing houses chiefly concerned tonk early precaution against the possibility of any contagion whatever. The action of the clothing houses in this respect has been most thorough. They jointly engaged a doctor by the month at a salary to make regular visits to the houses of every employe, such employe being obliged to produce a certificate from this doctor that all is well before any work is given him or received at his hands. The doctor is authorized to advise his employers by telephone of any symptom of sickness at any of the houses on his list. There are other precautions, such as vaccination of each member of the family, etc., all contributing to ensure complete protection againat possible contagion. The example set by the wholerale clothing houses is now being followed by the Board of Health, under the authority received last week. At the two public meetings held Friday and Saturday last, ways and means were devised for a thorough stamping out of the disease, by compulsory vaccination from house to house, isolation of small-pox patients, immediate appropriation of some larger building for a small-pox hospital on one of the islands down the river, for this pur-pose,-a thorough cleansing of the streetn, improvement and flushing of drains, the burning of refuse ; fumigation or disinfection where needed; the co-operation of the clergy of all denominationa, and other details, all of which being carried out, should secure Montreal and her outlying municipalities for all time to come againgt possible danger from this or other epidemic diseases.

Much has been said concerning the prejudice of a portion of the French Canadian population against vaccination. This like the small-pox itself, has been much exaggerated, the verygreat majority of our fellow citizens of French descent being as firm believers in Jenner's great discovery as those of any other origin. The efforts mada a few yearsago by a citizen,known, if we recollect aright, as. Dr. Emely Coderre,-to air his belief as against vaccination were doublless as successful as the sensational circulars freely issued during the last fortnight by a Doctor Ross of Torouto who has lately taken up his residence in Montreal,-circulars all the more effective, because of their illustrations, with that portion of the population whom we always have with us, who are not much accustomed to put themselves to a little physical pain or trouble as long as they are well, to provide against a possibly greater one in the future, and to many of whons even the cost is a matter for consideration-who put their' 'trust
in Providence, bul kepp [not] the powder dry." These people are certain to be inthenoed by the voice of the whole clergy, who nre now to a man earnestly enlisted in the cause.
The effects of the exaggerated reports upons summerand fall travel in this direction have caused serious loss to the leading hoiels, more especially to the Windsor owing to the report of one small-pox case in the vicinity. We have yet to learn, how. ever, ol any number of persons counter. manding orders lor goods lirom merchants or mauufacturers. Wholesale or retail importers may as reasonably fight shy of hiverpool where small-pox exists more or less the year round. That portion of the city where all business is Lrabacted, as already stated, and the great proportion of the residence portion of the city are as free from disease as any cily on the continent, and as every precaution is taken to avoid possible contagion, there cannot be the remotest danger firm any goods shipped from this peint, whether of home or foreign manuficture. It is to be hoped that the common-sense of the mercintile community will rise superior to the false alarms and absurd exaggeralions spread by interested writers in certain western papers, who, we are sorry to say, seem to beiray a wicked delight in the mischief they have produced.

## RAES'S COUNTRY BANKER.

## (second notiol.)

In reviewing the remainder of this work we mast not overlook that it bears on the administration of an English country bank, that is of a bank having its head oftice in a provincial lown, with branches in the adjacent county or counties. Mr. Rad's experience has been gained wholly in a hank of this class. Their business ditiers wery materially from that of the Metro pultan Banks; the larger banks here oc apy a yosition somewbat between the tivo.
The question of the "Resorve" first engages his atlention, and is discussed in detail, the relative merits of a reserve of 20 per cent and 3313 per cent being carefully considered. The conclusion arrived at is that the larger reserve is not only most prudent, but that it pays as well, it not better, than the smal!er. 'Jhe reasoning by which this is reached is based on the comparalively tritling difference in the earning power of money employed at call and short notice or invested in consols (all of which he counts as part of the leserve), and that used in the ordinary loaning business of the bank. This rea-
soning ${ }_{9}^{4 i f}$ ffollowed todits'logical conclusion, would lead to the investment of an Englisb Bank's full resnurces in consols and similar securities. But the argument does not hold good here, for there is (at present especially) a large difference in fayor of money employed in discounting ; nevertheless, there is a good deal in the remarks which bears on Canadian banking.
The reserve of one-third recommended is made up roughly as follows:
Cast in hama........................ 8 per cent Money at call and short notice 15 " " Cousols................................ 10 " "
Leaving out of consideration the consols, the reserve mientioned is much the same as nouk be maintained by prudent-ly-managed banks here. The actual cash held here is, however, on the average, much above the percentagegiven. According to the returns for December last the gold and Dominion notes hell by all banks were 13 per cent on the liability on circulation and deposits On 31st July they reached nearly 15 per cent, to which should be aided a latge amount of money lying idle in New York; but the abnormal position of the money market accounts for this, the Bank of Montreal alone showing actual cash on hand for nearly 25 per cent of its liabilities.

The amount of money invested by Canadian banks at call and short notice is not known, and there is therefore no basis for comparison.
'The hird item counted as part of the reserve is very suggestive. It has not hitherto been the habit in Canada to invest any consideratle portion of bauk funds in Govemment securities, although sone banks have from time to time held, Camadian and U. S. Government bonds and even consols. But there can be no question as to the wiscom and prudence of invésting a considerable sum in securities bearing a fair rate of interest, of undoubted salfely, and available in case of need at any tinse of pressure. We are glad to note the example set by one or two of the leading banks in this direction, and hope it will be generally followed. 'Ihe present abundance of money, with the oonsequent depreciation in its loanable value, makes this an excellent opportunity for a change.

It is to be noted in favor of investment in securities quoted on the London Stock Exchange, that monetary conditions here which might reuder realization necessary are extremely unlikely to exist at the same time in Eugland, so that the securities would not necessarily be sacrificed.

The position of English banks holding consols is very different; the conditions
that would there require a sale or pledge of consols might seriously reduce their selling value, or increase the lending rate to a very high figure.
Our author makes a strong plea for a large reserve, on the ground that by showing a strong front to the public, deposits and other business are attracted, which far more than compensate for the profit foregone. We fear that banking experience in Canada would not justify this as a general deduction here, where people seem only too willing to place their money in bauks which offer the highest rates for deposits and have consequently to sail very close to the wind to make them prolit. able.

We must pass over the interesting chapter on "largo accounts," "capital," and "rest," merely quoting the following sensible pasange from the latter :
"Your rest has been accumulated out of un" divided protis, set nside from time to timo it to meet miforeseen losses....... This being the "object of the fund, it onght to bery a certain "proportion, not to the amonnt of your paid. "up eapital, but to the total of your assets; "becatise that total is the true mensure of your "dumuin of loss."

It is true that the Rost is intended to assist in earring profits for the maintenance of a steady dividend, and that from this point of view an amount proportion. ed to the capital is reasonable, neverthe. less there is sound sonse in the opinion given.

In speaking of the directorate Mr. Rae favors strongly the retention of the experienced members of the board from year to year, notwilhstanding the apparent benefits to be gained by the infusion of "new blood." He argues that there is usually sulficient change in the personnel through natural causes to prevent mettal staguation, and that the other course "may involve the "dismissal of gentlemen who are pos"sessed of a knowledge of the accounts " and business of the bank which it has "taken them many years to acquire, in "order that their seats may be taken by "other gentlemen, who for some years to "come can have no reliable knowledge."
We have left ourselves little space to speak of one of the most interesting points to us in the book, the yearly audit of the accounts. The question of the protection of the pablic and the shareholders by some method of examination, every now and then comes prominently to the front, but no practicable pian has yet been suggested. The testimony which Mr. Rae bears to the value of the yoarly audit by independent accountants. is (to us at least) unexpected, but never-
theless we cannot refuse to accord due weight to an opinion based on such practical experience as he possesses.
To the quation "Will credit ever agsin "be shattered, or the public conscience "outraged by a secoud Overend \& Co, "or another Cily of Glasgow Bank?" he replies "I think the question may con"tidently be answered in the negative."

The first reason assigned is the statement which has to be issued, certified by three of the directors and the manager.
"But in addition...... ihere will henceforth be required a declazation on the face of every bulunce sbeet, sigued by indepondent auditurs, that it atfords a trae nall accurate stamement ut the affitirs of the bunk..... I hold this curtitiente to be of more importance crey than lat of the directors themsalies, without thonght of dise paragement to them.
In the first place, in nearly every case, it will be the declaration of men whose training for life has been the analysis of acconuts und the science of bouk-keepith...... whom no sheisht of hand will serve to heodwink fur a msmelt.
In the second place, the testimony of a public nuditor is disinterested. He hats no object to serve in deceiving the public or the shateholders as to the actual pusition of tho bank.

Lastly, the auditor is not rppointed by the directurs. He is chosen muntully by the shareholders, and his renuneration is lised by them. He in not, therefore, ne servant of the Boird; it can neither influence nor dismiss him.
$\ldots . . . \begin{gathered}\text { a } \\ \text { fraudulent } \\ \text { balance-sheet, under tho }\end{gathered}$ allered condition of things, appuars to me, therefore, to be no longer ai possitle thing. If is impossible that the books of nay bank can ever agnin be materinlly falsified by the must astute or the inost nefarious of officials, without immediate detection. Losses in bankium will no doubtarise at times in the future, fif banking principles be disregarded; but they will be subjeet to early detection and prompt exposure. There wili be no more ruinous bolstering uy of large and dangerous accounts. 'The auditors will see to this, if' the directors to not; so that a second edition of the City of Glasgor Bank, even on a reduced seale, is hencetorth beyond the range of probability."

This testimony is remarkable, but we fear it is a rose-colored view of the existing syetem. Still, if it does in a measurable degres come up to this standard it is well worthy of consideration for adoption heve. 'There are difl'erences in internal arrangements which would make it less easy to carry out such an audit, but the obstacles could be overcomeif is were over thought desirable to apply the principle.

The difficulty here is, in the first place, the absence of auditors trained for such work, a deficiency which would no doubt be soon made good should a demand for them arise. In the next place they would certainly be the nominees of the Board or of the president ; an objection which would only lose its weight when there co-exist amongst us establishod firms of auditors and accountunts of the highest character and having areputation at stake, and a public opinion which would constrain
dicectors to nominate or accept the nomination of such men as auditors, on pain of losing caste for their institutions by a contrary course.

## SMALI ACCOUNTS. <br> "Attlictions sore <br> Long the he bore."

Small accounts inay be said to bs the so . spot of trade. A multitude of these, persisted in, will rob the ordinary businesm man of one-half his share of comfort and occasionally drive bim to despair. The difficulty in realizing upon them is not provided against by the power of the law; the law is too expensive, too aggressive. too great a destroyer of good feeling, and is only resorted to long after all other appeals are made in vain. Could the business man find time to call in person on each of the several coores, huvdreds or thousands of his negligent small debtors, the great majority would doubtless pay up, and generally apologize for their neglect of his lrequent enclosure of "account rendered." But this it is impossible $t o$ do, and if a specinl messenger be sent, the thavelling expenses and salary-if the accounts happen, as many do, to be scattered all over the Dominion-wipe out all the profits not alieady eaten up by in. terest.

Commend us to the firm or man who regularly once a month looks over his tile of small accounts payable, and makes a prompt settlement of them. He is doubtless only one among many; but in doing so he contributes largely to the genemal good, for every dollar thus set in circulation starts on a mission of good; it enables each person to whom it gives greeting to liquidate thus much of his indebtedness to another, who in turn employs it again for a similar purpose, and so on, liko the : jpostles of old, it goes about doing good. Were every man-let us say every business man-in the community to pay off his small accounts within thirly, sixty or ninety days from the time of contraction, and not keep on persuading himself of their unimportance because they are trifles, the business of the country would be vustly improved. A littio eftort would conquer the evil habit of neglect, and, apart from the business principle, he would have the proud consciousness not only of having discharged a duty but of baving set agood example and enabled others to follow it. All business men, whatever their department of trade, are nutually interdependent, and what benefits or injures one affects all more or less, but in no way can each assist and promote the general wellare than by the prompt payment of smull accounts.

Large accounts being a part of the regular machinery of trudes are, as a matter of course, well looked after; they have their time to fall due; their importance is too great, yel it is only by the aggregation of a multitucle of small ones that these are provided for, Small accounts have no time of maturity, himy are payahle "any time; " they remolely resemble what are called debts of honor-" more honored in the breach ban the observance,"-the debtor never thinks that it can be any inconvenience to the creditor to wait fur such a trifle, -be will get at it some day when lie has time,-and thus resolves and re-resolves, and the debt continnes to keep bad company with the many like it on tho books of nearly every dealer in the land.

Many persons fancy themselves all the better oft with a multitude of these small accounts-payable on their fyles as long they keep their account at the bank from runuing noticeably low. Whatever excuse there may be for the desire to appear in fair slbape with one's banker-to allow him a fair balanco without interest-it should not be male at the expense of their small creditors, who generally have need of it more than the bank ; and at the present time, when the banks have difticully in providing profitable employment for the funds at their command, there is less excuse than ever for such neglect, and there is likely to be less close sciutiny of balances at the banks.

While upon this question of bank balances we are reminded of occasional complaints from business men who, in payment of small accounts from distant customers, receive cheques on local banks. Such cheques should always have 25 cents added to the net amount to pny for cost of collection. We know of one tirm whose losses in this way last year agaregated nearly S100, some of them being for cheques of: $\$ 3, \$ 4, \$ 5, \$ 6$, and upwards; many of them accounte of two and three years standing, thus compelling the lender to pay the interest, contrary to the long established usnge.
"here are thousands of business men all over C'unada to whom these remarles have no application. They may be seen in Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton and other cities, towns and villages sending out their messengers at the beginning of each month with the necessary cheques or cash to wipe ofl their small bills payable, a practice which has become a part of their system of doing business. They know the value of a reputation for prompt pay ind accuracy to businese men; they havo doubtless themselves had some ex.
perience of the cost of looking after such small accounts, of the worry and annoyance they cause to every bookkeeper, to every man of business; they know that they cause a loss of time as well as of temper more than they are worth, that, in fact, they are the chief affliction of evergday business life and, like the influence of other cares ou goneval life; tend to shorten business careers more than any other of its vexations.

## FIRE INSURANCE RATES AND co.Insurance.

President Lincoln had a theory that when you wanted a measure carried if you only kept " 1 ,egging away" you would gain your point eventually, in spite of all difficulties, and it is with this hope before us that we take up our pen once more regarding the above subject, which we presume may again come lorward at the general meeting of the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association, to be held shortly.

We have continually maintained that rates for fire insuance ehould be fixed so as to be equitable alike to the insurer and the companies, and that this cannol be secured without the assistance of the co-insurance clause, because it is found to be impossible to arrive at a satisfactory average rate without making the cwnersinsuring about the actual value of their property pay for those who only insurea small percentage of that value, the latter causing the companies to carry a very much larger liability than the former, in proportion to the premium,

It is a ditficult matter to make the public comprehend this anomaly, and that so long as partial losses exist, a policy for $\$ 5,000$ upon a value of $\$ 10,000$ has nore than Lualf the liability attached to it that would be the case if the policy were of $\$ 10,000$. When fire insurance is not remunerative to the companies, simply to increase the rates does not remedy the evil, because while some grumblingly pay the advance, others reluce their insurance so as not to pay more premium, and consequently the burden of the increase is thrown upon caretul insurers, which does not savor of justice.

We have already endeavored to support our views by figures, but as these Jatier were, perhaps, a trille too abstruse for non-insurance men, we now propose to place the subject briefly and plainly before our readers by statistics bssed upon the Insurance Department returns which he "who ruts may read."
For the year 1833 the amount insured was $\$ 513,580,302$ and the premiums on
same $\$ 4,624,74 \mathrm{l}, \mathrm{b}$ ing an average rate of 90 c. per cent. For the year 1884 (when the lariff may be said to have had twelve months' trial) th, corresponding ${ }^{\text {Cigures }}$ were $\$ 513,983,378$ and $\$ 4,080,128$, or an average of 97 c . per cent. Which is an adpance in rates during. the tariff of about 8 per cent. Now, glancing back at the records of the pas: 16 years, in which time cightsompanies hure been forced to retire from the field, we cannot consider this result entirely antisfactory to the companies, while fron the various complaints which have conis to our ears we are certain that the toriff is looked upon as unfair by a large proportion of the public - the secret beinc that the rates are not equitably adjusted, putting us in mind of a camel whose load is so badly piaced as

to press unequally, while the companies must be likened to the foolish driver who thus places the burden without reference to the laws of balance. Co insurance is the only just balunce in fire insurance, and supposing it to have been applied in the past year, we are sure of being under rather than over the mark in estimating the following double conclusion, via., that either the amount insured would have been increased 33 1-3 per cent with, at the outside, 5 per cent increase in the losses incurred, or, if the amount insured had remained the same, the losses would have decreased 24 per cent,* the result in both cases (at the same average rate of premium) being identical within a fraction, thus:-

Thus we positively see that for 81 cents per cent with co-insurauce, better results are secured than for 97 c . per cent without, in addition to which, to use an old figure of speech, "the saddle would be on the right horse."

We do not believe we could demonstrate the equity aud fairness of co-insurance more clearly, both from a public as well as an insurance point of view, and can only repeat our conviction, so far as cities well protected with fire appliances are concerned, that, without said principle no just tariff can be framed; in many cases it will press with undue harshness

## SCARCIIY OF GOLD AND LOW PRICES.

The influence of the alleged scarcity of gold in producing the lower prices of commodities generally, has been made the subject of much discussion since the idea was first promulguted by a writer for one of the Ieading English magazines some
ciation of gold, or, in other words, the low level of general prices. "'he tinet of appreciation, or of the incrensed purchasing gower of the sovereign, cannot be denied ; it is the most marked chmarteristic of the present depression, but opinions differ as to the cantses of the apprecintion. Mr. Cioschen, Mr. (Gilfen, and others, consider the scarcity ol grald relatively to the trantactions to be aflected by it' as the prithcipal catuse. It must be observed that it is inpossible to take these two factors-the yuantity of gold and the work to be done by it-sepatately. A diminution in the amatal supply of gold, if accompmied by a fallingoof in the number of transations, of by an inereate of the not of eredil substitutes, might be co-incident with a general rise in priecs. It must, however, also be admitted, that if the monome of gold does not increase in propurtion to trade and jopulation or, sjeaking more strictly, commercial transactions, and if at the sume time there is no expansion of credit, a fill in pries is inevituble. This sems to be the position of those who sueak of the setureity of gold as the chief cuase of tas fith in mites. But it has been pointed out, especiatly in the columms of the Liconomist, that so far as this country is concerned there is no evidence of scarcity of gold. It hus been urged with mueh foree, that the only why in which the, fulling-oll in the gold supply could have atiocted priees was by diminishing the reserve of the bank, and causing atise in the bank rate, whist, as was bhown in your articte on Mr. Giffen's puper, the reserves have been large, and the bank rate below the areruge. Mr: Gilfen attempted to explain this anomaly, by suggesting that the money markat lind been subject to stringencies which luad uppurenty diminished eredit as a purchusing power. I am inciated to think, in spite of your argunent to the contrary, that Mr. Giffen's explamation contains part of the trulh.. It is quite possible that rehaively to the state of eredit and the rate of prolits the movements in the bunk rate may lave land the ethet of stringencies, and it is aseless to consider the ratombue withont regard to these circumstances. But 1 venture to oller as a more sutis* factory solution, or, at ay mate, as an essential purt of the solution, an argument which ders not sem to lase attracted any attention. Tha problem is dis:-llow has fhe fallingodi in fold, relatively to trmasactions, netnatly frought ubout the fall in priees: I think at mistake las been nate in secking for an answer in the great commereial centres, where eredit is lighly devaloped, instend of in the outskirts of the commercial word, where the precions metals phy directly a much more inportant pmet. It is well known that in the conrerse case of great gold discoveries, the rise in prices is first feltin the colmtries whero the mines are situated, and wo may expect, by amalogy, that as the cost of producing gold increnses, the consequent finl in prices will he felt first of all in the gold-producing countries, and next in those conntries which, owing 10 their back ward commerce, have the greatest difliculty in procuring the gold they requiro, Now, according to Mr. Gillen's investigntions. the depression whieh followed the last great julhtion commenced and made itself must severely fell in tho undereloped comuties whith
hat borrowed capitul from the old countries. But in the modern commercial world, a fall in prices in one country must of necessity be reilected to other countries. It seems to me, then, that the searcity of gold las ande itself direetly felt in the new or medeveloped comntries, and has thus indirectly enused the fall in prices in the great comaderciat centres. It is impossible in the present state of shatistical intormation for any private individual adequately to verify this hypothesis, but it is to be hoped hat the Royal Commission will nut conline its labors to this country, so fur as the question of prices is concerned. In eunclusion, I submit that the general fall in prices, if not due to a contraction of eredit, must be due to a filling of in gold relatively to transuctions. Facilities of transporl, intermational telegraphy, and similar cames sometimes mentioned, are inaleguate to account for a genemal full, and could only ex$p^{\text {blain the fall in some commodities compured }}$ with others. I will ouly add, that according to Mulhall's Dieliomary of Statistics, since 1840 tho banking of the world has ineretsed about eleventold, that is, there times as fast as comnerce, and thinty times lastar than population, ant that whilst from 1801-i0 the interchange of precions metuls was equal to 12 per cent of the commerce, i.e., the sea-borne merchandise of the world, from 1851-80 it was ouly 8 fee cent, owing to the extension of the use of cherues and telegraphis. Such great economies in the nie of bullion seem to indicato that the diminished supply enin have acted directly ouly on the remoter chammels of trades.

## IRVIVAL OF LUSINESS IN TIIE U. S.

There are some what conllicting reports as to the extent to which business hats revivod in the United States, but all authorities agree that there is a revival.
Jhe New Lorls Bulletin las collected the opinions of the preas in all parts of the union, and comes to the conclusion that an era of prospuity late really set in. The Commerchal trnd finuacial Chronicle of last week notes that there has been a decided lall, bit expresses the ofinion that it is not an indication that the improvement hats ceased.

The finnucial sillation shows sigus of amendment, for, ahthough loms ate still mombe at rey low rates, the reserves of the Associated hanks show athated deerease, for the first lime in many months. The masetued condition of the sidser question is a large factor in the dullocss of linameial matters. Gapital las been shy of new enterprises and investments for a long time, and the position is probably worse now than ever. At any rate the position of the Preasiry as regnads its holdings of gold and silver coin. is less reassuring, and in the matural eourse, if the silver coinage continue, there must come a time when its obligations cannot bo puid in gold.

If legiblation in the direction of curtailment or cessation can be oblnived in December, so as to give enpital the confdence it now lacks, wo may look for a great revival, which is sure 10 reate to a greater or less degree on this coll." ity.

Shaver, -While business men in the U. S. are anxiously looking for the repeal of the Bland Act to give new lifo to commercial and linancind business, the prospeet of such a change is cunsing great alam in England. The frospur ity of the great Indian Ebupire is largely dependent on the maintename of the pite of silver, and there is no donbt ll at, if the United Siates cease to be purchasers in the silver market to the amomat of two millions a month to which extent they are now consumers, the valuezel silver must be depreciated.

The English phipers are whiting events with some anxirty, and discussing what steps should be taken, if the bill is repeated. The most practical surgestion seems to be the immediate closing of the Indian mint to the public. 'This will prevent any increase of silver coin, and atsist materially in mantaining existing values. But the remedy will be more appurent than real. If silver deprecintea from any cause it is phan that holders of silver coin, or ereditors whose debes cen be paid in silver, wost suffer a shrinkage of their assets. The question is a very practical one to the great listern banking corporations having their lead oflices in Lomdon. Their obligations to their shareholders, to the holders of their English accephaces, and to their Laglish. depositors are all ou a gold basis, while their assels are chichy in silver.

Telehhone and Telegrabil Whes.-Owing to the great comphaines that have been made in England rebjecting the danger from these wires, the post ollice authorities have brought the whole subject before a select committee of the Houst of Commons. The accidents proved hatve been few aud insignifient, but, in view of those that have occurred, and of the extension of the telephonic system; the committee favors an amendment of the latw on the subject. But they are of opinion that public. interest requires the free extension of the system, and for that renson oppose any limitalion of the rights of companies to put up orerhead wines; pressing for morestringent regulations with regard to their erection, under the supervision of the post otlice. They recomanend that all wires should be marked in suelt a way as to ensure identifitention, that all umarked wires should be romoved, and that facilities be provided for the emringe of wires, under certuin restrictions, neross buildings or grounds, nutwithstanding the opposition of the owners. The telephoue subseribers in london now number about 4,000. The total number in the United States is thbout 135,000, of which thero are aboul 10,000 in New York and vicinity (Brooklyn 2,000, Jersey Oity, 1,000), Boston 4,64t, Ohicago 3,465, Philadelphia 2,228, Detruit 1786, Cleveland 1,600, Buthiolo 1,500. There we in Canada about 0,000 in all, of which Montreal has 1,500 (or one-sixth of the whole), Toronto 1,300 , Hamilton 550, Winnipeg 425, Londun 375, Ottawn 370, St. John, N.B., 320 Quebec 290, Halifix: 2j0, The Bell Tolephone Go., to whose system these figures appertain, are now making arrangements to introduce muliplo switel-bonrds in Nontreal, as they have ulrendy done in Turouto, by which com-
munications are grently facilitated. As it is impossible to do this without $a$ change of offices, the company have leased new premises in the British Empire Buildings on Notre Ditme and St. Francuis Xavier streets, whither they will move probably toward the close of the year.

## THE, ENGLISII MONEY MARETAT.

From the Economist of 20 h August we learn that the Money Market, which had shown a slight decline during the previons week, had again hardened, and higher rates were looked for in the near future. The canses for this were the additional money needed for Egypt, the issue of a million sterling of treasury bills, the usual aytimn movement of coin for eirenlation, and the imminence of the gencral election.
In addition, the time seemed to be approneling when golit would be exported to the United States, where theitemptation to hoard gold on account of the silver trouble, and the probable heary shipments of cotton and other products, combine to make gold imports almost certain. From France a report comes that bultion dealers are alrendy lodging gold in the Bank of Prance, in order that they any be prepared to make shipments.
The forecasts made have to some extent been borne ont, the latest cuble advices quote the discounting rate at $1 \$$ to 2 per cent, which brings thejoutsicle market to the Bank of England level, for the tirst time in many months.

Cnops.-A carefully analysed estimate of the crops in England is given by the snme prper, from which we learn whent is a good crop, though not up to last year's; barley an average crop; while onts, beans and peas nre very much below ; the root crop is nlso small, while hay is better than usual. 'laking nil crops into consideration the harvest is nboil equal to that of 1884, with the drawbek of lower priees. The reserve stucks in the country ture believed to be very heavy, and an importation somewhat less than that of last year may be looked for.
"Considering that the whent crops of America "and South ducrica tre extremely delicient, and "that thero is barely an awerage in the rest of "Lurone as a whole, it is not hikely that we shah "obtain thequmatity of breadstufts we require to "import without phying prices in alvance of the "oxtremoly low rates now current. For the pres-
"ont, however, thero is no indication of a rise,
"almulaut supplios having enused, "adrop of 25 a
"quarter on English wheat during August."

Tue closeness with which prices of dry goods have been cut of late years has been threntening to endanger the $2 t$ to 3 per cent commission charged by mamfacturers' agents in Great Britain. Buyers have been endeavoring to get direct at the manuficturers, but, with rare exceptions, in vain. The shipping agent is too great a necessity to both parties, and when both functions, buyer and shipper; are combined in the one individual, it is cheaper probubly in the long run to pry the 4 or 5 per cent for both than pay for the shipping alone in case of a purchase direct. Shipping commission men usually pay the manufacturer for the goods selected and collect the whole amount
from the buyer in his turn. This method is not quite satisfictory to some very close and careful imperlers, who fancy they canfind some advantage an looking after the purchases themselves.

The Porlland and Ogdensburg Railway Co. held out last year for -a rental of $\$ 12,000$ for the Fabyan Ilouse, White Mts., for the season, aud failiug to obiain the consent of the old lessees to pay that sum, concluded to run the hotel for a while themselves, which they did last season, under the management of the proprictor of the Glen House. The Barrons, who for years prast lave admirably conducted the Orawford, Fabyan and Twin Mountain Houses in the White Mis., secured the Mt. Plensant House, a half mile from Fabyans, last year but the Railwsy Gompany were glad to come to terms with them for Fubyans again the present senson, and the travelling public are not sorry for the glange.

Tue Bank of Montreal and one or two other Canadian banks lanving branches in New York and Chicago have, for the last week or two, been in receipt of frequent applicalions from would-be borrowers in various parts of the Uuited States, men engaged in different enterprises in which all they want is a little money to criable them to enter upon a carcer of prosperity. These applications are due to the reports published concerning a plethora of money in the banks. There is doubtless a considerable quantity of moncy lying idle, and the rates to borrowers are low to an exceptional degree. The amount mentioned-ien millions -is probably but little overstated.

Tus Belleville Intelligencer professes to have discovered $n$ new dodge to swindle the honest yeomen of Ontario. It says:-Two strangers meet at a farmer's homse to stayenill night, and duriug the evening they get up a trade between themselves, which requires a witness, and the firmer is asked to sign the pmpers, simply to wituess the trade. If he docs so he soon finds that his name is signed io a note which he has to pay. The law does not appenr to tonch these conses, and farmers should long the first man enughtat it." In connection with the above, it muy agnin be stated in these colnmos that no farmer is bound to pay a note obtained under such circumstances.

Englasit Rallways-The Euglish lailmay returns for 1884 have recently been issued. The prid-up capital shows nu incrense over 1883 of $\mathcal{L I} 6,543,000$ being now $\mathcal{L} 81,404,000$. The mileage has increased from 18.681 to 18.864 . The passenger traffic shows a large increase in third class and a decrease in lirst and second class, with similar movements in the receipts. The goods traflic slows a considerable decrease in tonnage and receipts. The working expenditure was slighly reduced, but the main saring was in " Maintenance of way," where cconomy may be less prudent, than in eother directions.

Hon, J. S. O. Wurtele of this city, Speakr of the Quebec Legislature, succeeds the Jate IFoll. Judge Loranger in the work of revisiou and consolidating tho Provincial statutes. The work has heen under way for some time, and will $\mid$ rabillily require some yens to complete. We congratulate the worthy Speaker on his good fortine. The remumeration is nbout $\$ \overline{5}$ a day, and no one is better fitted to earn it.

In the forcign news occurs the somewhat peculiar item that bullion dealers are accumalatiug gold bullion in the Bank of France in anticipation of the expected demand from the United States in October. The bank loans on this at l per cent, and the money is employed in discomining at 2 per cent.

Tira communication elserfhere signed "Reform" will commend itself to the attention of every insurance and other business man who looks below the surface of the business. The suljectewill probably not rest here.

Thonold.-The supply of Rae's Country Bunker, sent to this city is already exhansted. $\ddot{A}$ further consignment will arrive rshortly and copies may be bad fiom ${ }_{a}^{*}$ Dawson Bros., Montreal.

Our Exchanges note that there are indientions of a revival of business in Great Brituin, but $t 00$ slight as yet to build many hopes on.

The Lohisten Fisimimes.-In 1879 and previous years, three lobsters were sufficient to fill a one pound can at the canneries in Prince Didward Island. Since that time the size bas decrensed and the fishermen have had to content themselres with smaller and evidently younger members of the crustacen family. In 1880, the average required to till $n$
 and in 1884, 0.f. The total number captured in 1879 was $5,896,368$, valued at $\$ 1,965,486$. In 1881, 23,493 , c60 were taken, which were worlh $\$ \overline{3}, 527,920$. In the two succeeding yenrs both number and value showed a slight falling off, but the enteh for 1884, though larger than in 1881, being 20,733,000, was only valued at $\$ 3$,498,000. In 1884, it took, as previously stated, no less than $6 \pm$ lobsters to fill a one pound enn. Bnglish magazines received by last mail describo the interesting experiments now being made by a Scolch scientist, who was connected with the Ohallenger expedition, to enquire into the habits of herrings and other sen water fish with $a$ view to their artificial propngation, if necessary. Should not some move in the same direction be made in Canada looking to the protection and proprgation of the lobster? Unless some decided action is taken it really seems highly probndle that in a few yens the lobster fishery will be umble to be prosecinted for want of inaterinl. The Inspector for New Brunswick rejorts that last year's destruction in hat Province amounted to over 20,000,000 lobsters. He says: "No one knows betier than the canners themselves the inevitable result of this annual drain on the supply. But, careless of this, they are seeking to have the present
insulicient restrictions removed, in order lhat they may still further inerease the production of camed goods, in the hope of making a largo supply compensato for low prices.

A Thonosro produce ngent named D. Shaunom, formerly of Nontreal, in whom much relinnee was phaced by our local honses, has vietimized Thos. Lecming \& Co. and A. J. Brice of this city out of a few thonsand dollars ench. He also attempted to include Messrs. Bedl, Simpson \& Co. hidd. James Oliver \& Co. in his operations, but was ansuccessful, althongh the bank in the case of Bell, Simpson \& Co. will probably be a loser. Shanoon agreed to soll Mr. Brice and the Messrs. Leeming two car-hands of ereamery buter at 103 c , and his offer being aceepied a batak here was notifiod by the buyers diatshannon's drafts on them for the goods would be duly honored. Thinse firms cashed their drafts, and the buter was delirered by the railway company, but on examination it turned out to be poor stuff worth only a few cents per lb. Rell, Simpison \& Uu., who had given a conditional order, refused the butter con inspection, and claim they are not liable to the laak, Shamon has disapperved, and his wife cluims to be alogether ignorint of his whereabouts. The rulbish whieh he secured from parties in Toronto and the West, and which is lield by the bank and the victimized fims, wis obomined by the defaulter on eredit and is not pind for--S. Drury, holel, 'Toronto, lums left, owing about $\$ 2$, ce0 chiefly to brewers.

## FIRE INSURANOE TARIFF.

The Eililor of the Joulinat of Comarice.

Dena Sin,--Inving a liking for Fire Iosurnoce litmoture, I read, as doubtless have many others, the article in your last number, honded : "Fire Insurance 'lurif" with much interest.
the article is evidently an adrocation of schedule rating, the most complete form of which is found in specinlly rating every risk I enn conceive the difliculties of doing this completely or partially. The expense would necersitate $n$ much larger incrense of rates than that which has heen cstablished recently. The benefit would acerue solely to a very fer of tho special hazards or manafacturing risks, whieh ought to be libernl to insurance capital, without which they could inot exist, and the cost would fall upon the general prblic, who are alreads burdened with a daritr, under which I believe a maximum incrense of rates has been renched.

Insurance companies have tried low rates in Cannda for many years, and lost money; they have recently udvanced the rates and lost money ; and you are correct in thinking that a further advance would only increase the loss ratio, for as rates ndvance honest insurers decrense their insuances.

We must nsame therefore, that a maximum tarift has been wached. What, therefore, are we to do in eneousage lusurance Companies to give investors in lorat companies some returas On their cupiant mad to justify the British and Forcign companies operating in Cavada to continue to do so?

Two avenues of relief seem to me to be open First: Government should enlarge and sufficiently empower its Insumace Depmrtment, so that it can deal with the fublie ns well as wilh Insuranee Companies. The disgenceful and chtirely unnecessary consmintion of wealth in Canada by fire should be ntopped. The origin of every lire shourd be investignted. It should be made possibiy to convin of arson by circumstantial evidence as it is to convict of muder ; traudulent claimants shotid be punished, and Insurance Companies supported instead of being condemued for proning exagferated claims. Proper building laws should be enforced, and an Insurance Court should not be easior and more prolitable to pass through than a Bankrupt Court.
Second: Chance the larms of the insurance contract by introdncior penerally the average clanse or some modified finm of it, such as the Cobinsurance clane. This change must come about both here and in are United Sintes. The average chatse is farmes to all; il wonld obyiate many of the dillicultes which arise in the adjustment of losses. it. would lead to such a reluction of rates as that insurunce premiums would no longer be a buden, and it would secure the reform you advecate.

I would like, if allowed, to refer to some of the figures given in the Insurance Superintendent's reports for 1884. la your article yon incidentally allude to his stitement of the inerense of Fire Insumance in Gaand in 1884 over 1883, which puts the increase at $\$ 33,243,748$, a large sum. Can you tell mes where that increase comes in? for it is contrary to fact within the knowledge of every jusurance agent, all of whom miss the laree business that used to be done on grain, hulls, f.rge wholesale slocks, lumber, \&c., and the nocustomed semi-annual inflow of short period risks upon imported goods; and they would like to know whint initerests are repincing the heavy bankrupteies of the last two ycars, and why so few establishments that have been burat down are being rebuilt. Travel through any part of Canadanand note de burnt walls you will see, and where is the inerease of population that would explain such large nnumb increnses in insurable values ; how explatin the reduction in insurnace values on farm properties now owned, mostly unocenpied, by Loan Societies and recently ocenpied by active producers of wealth. It is true manufacturing interest, have inerensed, but their increase is no compensation to insumance compraies for what is being lost, either in values or in diminutionof loss ratios; and where is the instrance on the activities of the enormous amount of capitnl which, for want ofocoupation, is seeking the Post Oflice and otherSavings Banks at unremunerative interest? These are only general indications, but as it is important that the public shatl be able to rely $u_{1}$.jn public figures, let me be more specilic.

It is evident that an error in such a constructive pile once admitted is trmimitted, and I would ask whit steps were laken in secure an necurate foundation, and what ir surnme officers manatin a temi reckening of their terminatious: Embracing short mitods. losses, cancel. Intious and replacements, some do perhaps, but not many I fuse, for I don't see that the anount of three-rear pelieies is sufficient to necomnt for the diffrence betwoen $\$ 605,507,750$, not amonint at risk at the end of 1884, and $\$ 513,083,378$, gross amount of insurances effected during the jear; neither can I soe that the
reported increa se of $\$ 94,243,748$ of lusiness in 1884 over 1883 is explained by the increase of premiums, $\$ 403,07(i$, collected by the Companies mider a materint increase of rates applicable to the whole ex hundred and live millions; except whatever may he the sum of three-jear policies not allected by the Thriff. The increase of premioms collected might represent an average rate on the thirty-three millions, but, if so, there bas been no increase of rates over the larger sum. I am convinced these figures, as are others in the finsurnnce book, are nimeliable. I do nut beliere in the reported increase of insure able values; if any of the Oumpanies maintain a syitem of accurately reckoning the nmount at risk they only mike themetres unenviably prominent in the Table (page X) of loss ratios in amount at risk, which $\mu$ ives a range of experieners trem 1.89 io 0.90 , while the Trable, prge wii., rehation uf loss to preminms, gives a range of only $4 \overline{0} 08$ to $8 \bar{a} .80$, between the highest and lowe:t in the onlier Table.
If uy sumises are correct, the conclusion that arguments hased upan the figures given in the Insurance Blue book are delusive is eelfcrident. It is the uld questicu, Theory vs. Practice.

A freight combination has been effected between three lines of stenmships running from Liverpool to this port, which has decided to advance rates on all heavy chemicals 7s $6 d$ per ton, which is a riso of 100 per cent. If no ontside stenmer is put on the berth this will have the effect of nd vincing the price of heary chemicals generally, All lines are now firm, and $n$ fair business is passing. In drugs the demand is only moderate and leading houses would like to see business a trifle brisker. There has bpen no material change in prices. Dye stufts.--Cutch $7 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$ to 8 c . Sumace $\$ 00$ to $\$ 100$ per ton for prime brands. Extruct of ligeood ise, chip logwood 13 c to 2 c . Archil 27 c to 30 e per 1 b . fur coucentrated.
Coal and Wood.-Business has improved to some extent, but there is no change in prices. In the States the condition of the anthracite conl trade is even more unsatisfactory than a week ago. Stocks are beavy, demand is slow and the market weak and unsettled. Freights to this port are unchanged since the late anvance, and dealers are importing largely. There is satid to be a gond demand for Lower Ports soft conl from finctories and other lurge establishments. Cordrood is moving more freely in a jobbing way. We quote Amcrican anthracite at wholesale as fol-lows:-Stove, 55.65 ; nut, 55.35 , and ege and furnace, $\$ 5.15$. Ordinary distributing prices, are: stove, $\$ 5.75$; chestnut, $\$ 5.50$; ege and furnace, $\$ 5.25$. Cape Breton, $\$ 3.10$ 10 $\$ 3.20$; Pictolu, $\$ 3.30$ to $\$ 3.50$, as to mine: Scotch stenm at $\$ 4$ to $\$ 4.10$; Welsh antbracite, S4.50, Cordwood- Yird prices per long cord (cartage 50c extra) nre as follows:Maple, 6 Gin birch, 55.50 ; beech, 55 ; tamarnc, $\$ 450$; hemlock, 54. Wharf pirices about 50 c lower.
Dainy Produce and Provizions.-The demand for creamery and finest Townships dairy butter has continued fair; sales of the former at 21 cts., and of the latter at 17 cts. to 18 cts., for silected lots. In the medium and low grades there has been little done. Clieese has ruled dull, as adrices from the English markets did not warrant buyers in operating nt the figures asked by holders, and the result has been a stand-off between the treo. The cable declined Gd. yesteriay to 38 s . 6d. Values are nominal here at $7 \frac{1}{2}$ cts. to 8 cts. for fine August, the latter price an outside figure. Good July make 7 cts . to Tde. Eggs are selling at 14 c . to

142c. for good lots ; receipts fairly liberal. Inferior lots have sold as low as 13 c . Provisions are in moderate demand at revised prices elsewhere.

Dry Goods,-Mengre remitiances are still a cause of complaint, and until the harvest is saved and marketed in part no decided improvement is expected. Travellers are making eareful preparations for the sorting trip. There is a fair number of voyers in the market from various points, many, no doubt, attracted by the usual opening up of goods at this spason by the great millinery houses for exhibition and sale. The cause of some timid ones not visiting here is gradually passing away, and our good city is regaining the confidence of outsiders. The city retail trade has exhmbited some improvement within the last few days, as many citizens have returned and othersare constantly returuing from the seaside and elsewhere. The Boston woollen goods market is responding to the advance there in wool. Worsled yarns and heavy hosiery have risen during the week. Worsteds, light and heary, are nearly sold out. Tho increased demand for jeans and docskins has opened mills at Manayink which have been dosed for years. Moreover cussimeres, the long depressed, nre at last moving more treely thm at any time since 1870. Cotton goods in Boston are steady, under the general adrance of five per cent, which has been arcepted all along the line. Any further advance at present is unlikely. Comparatively litule machinery has been staried as jet, but the turn has been reached, and, with the present demand for goods, the clanges in the production of a mill are now in the direction of an increased product. The export movement in brown cottous is good for the season, nud goods suitable for export are moving readily aud are even in some instances sold ahead. Blenched goode are in free movement at higher prices, although there is a complaint ocensionally on some lines that business is still slow. Colored cottons are netive, but still at very low prices in spite of the recent sliglat advances. Denims may be said to be erea in brisk morement. The recent liberal movement in cotton flanncla has resulted in small stocks of low grades in first hands with $a^{2}$ continued fair request. Table damasks are in steady novement.
Fish and Oils-Cape Breton herrings havesold at low prices, it is even reported that a figure below $\$ 4$ has been toucbed for round lots. We quote them at $\$ 4$ for 100 brl. lots and $\$ 4.25$ for smaller quantities; halves, 82.25 to $\$ 2.50$. There have been no arrivals of Labrador herrings as yet. It is said ihnt a lot from the Nurth Shore has arrived at Quobec on the Statucona which have been called Labrador herrings, but it is not probnble that any of these will reach this market. Mackerel have sold at $\$ 4$ to $\$ 4.50$ for No. 2 and at $\$ 3.50$ to $\$ 4$ for No. 3. Green con No. I have brought $\$ 3.50$ to $\$ 4$ and dry cod $\$ 350$ to $\$ 3.75$. No 1 salmon $\$ 10$ to $\$ 10.50$; No. $2, \$ 9$ to $\$ 9.50$; British Oolum bia, $\$ 910 \pm 9.50$. As this is the chief distributing joint for fish in Canada, and the sales of the Lower Ports agents to wholesale firms are frequently reported, country buyers should beware of accepting inside prices as applying to jubbing lots. Wholesale merchants naturally object to sell goods at the same prices they luve themsulves prid. The anme remark applies to oils, the only sales of which reported refer to round lols, ocean cargoes from the fixheries being broken up here or in Quebec. The market for fish oils las been quiet at revised quotations. Petroleum is unchanged but steady at the late advance, with improving demand. Linseed oil is about a cent a gallon dearer. Spirits of turpentine firm.;
Flour and Grain.-The local demand bas been fair at stondy prices. Among recent sales

Liverpool freights on finisted iron and different motals have been advanced 2s od per ton from the first of September, but this advance is not large enough to appreciably nffect values out here. The local trade this week hus been quied, and fewer orders arrived from the West. We notice that attempts are being made by the outside press to poke fun at our metal merchants in connection with the small-pox seare. Iron nad metals are not likely to carry the seeds of infection, and of course reports that orders have been cancelled as a preperintionary measure by timid buyers are more annoying than real. The Western fairs have drawn away the attention of Western huyers to a certain extent this week. Makers' prices of pig-iron are unchanged. A Glasgow prices by last mail says:-Our market has been lirm nod warrants have advanced as high as 413.7 d , but trade does not lonk any better." Anothre correspondent says there is nothing to advise except the increased firmmess of iron, but higher prices and higher freights will probably rule during the winter. Woos.-There is a stendy and moderately active market for both domestic and foreign wools. Pulled is said to sell as fastas it can bo taken off. A fer good lots of fleece have changed hands at quotations. Two cargoes of foreign are on passage here. The markot, generally, though showing no signs of a boom is in a more satisfactory condition' than for some time past. The sales of domestic wool in the Boston market during last week were the largest on record, being $5,224,300$ pounds, against $4,837,300$ pounds domestic for October 30, 1879, and 4,907,200 pounds domestic for the week ending Feb. 8, 1883. The remarkablo activity of the market there continues without the slightest effort on the part of dealers, who at present are very indiferent sellers, and are soliciting but fers sales. Prices continue to advance, and now are at nearly the same level as a year ago, with a tendency upward. Enough wool is held rather than sold at quotations to make the market very firm. Dealers are sold well ahend. Some of them have sold all they can deliver for two months, and even a cessation of demand would not therefore necessarily imply new prices. A recent cablegram from London says: At the wool sales to-day 11,082 bales, chiefly Port Phillip and Sydney, were disposed of. Thero was moderate competition. At yesterday's sales Sydney fleeces sold at lld to ls lod; New Zealand scoured at 7d to ls 10 ìd ; greasy at $5 d$ to is $0 \frac{d d}{}$; locks and pieces at $2 d$ to 13 5 d ; Onpe secured at 9 d to is 6 d d . The other sales were made at previous prices.
