



## ABOLISH BUSINESS TAX **CRY OF MANUFACTURERS** TO SPECIAL COMMITTEE

Deputation From Canadian Manufacturers' Association Gave Reasons Why Present Law of Taxet on Was Inadequate-Unimproved Land Should Be Heavily Taxed and There Should Be a Reduction of the Tax on Improvements, Were Some of the Arguments-Adjourned Till Dec. 19.

"The C.M.A. does not think it necessary to substitute any tax for the income tax. The extra burden, as they saw it, could be placed on unimproved land. A remedy should be found for cases in which unimproved land was held for an increase of value of adjoining property. Germany was getting at the root of the evil by a special tax on unimproved land. Mr. Wegenast believed that the committee should act upon the question, as there was nothing to gain in giving municipalities the light to act. Public opinion was realtylor a change. If some principles were adopted that would not penalize industry, the manufacturers would support the committee.

"Most Absurd."

"It is the most absurd tax that was ever put into effect," said Ely Henderson of London, referring to the business tax. "Why should there be all these inequalities? A distiller pays 150 per cent. Why should there be such discriminations?" He believed that the poor workingman was paying the business tax and not the employer.

Result of Single Tax.

H. H. Stevens, M.P. for Vancouver, was asked to impart some information about the success of the single tax in the Tenminal City. Mr. Stevens said that there had been great building activity as the result of exemption of improvements, The land was net assessed for more than 50 per cent, of its value. He considered that taxation was a matter that should be dealt with locally, as one system might suit one particular municipality and not another. "Despite the criticism of F. C. Wade, K.C., of Vancouver," he said, the single tax system was working out satisfactorily."







Sage Pudding.
One scant cup of sago, one quart of milk, one cup of sugar, a third cup of butter, one tablespoon of lemon or vanilla extract, half teaspoon of sait, four eggs; wash the sago in three waters and put it into saucepan with the milk; place the saucepan in a deep dish of boiling water and let it stand on the back of the range for an hour to soften and swell. Remove from the range and while still hot add the butter, sugar and sait. When cooled add the beaten egg yolks and flavoring: turn it into a buttered pudding dish and bake in a moderate oven from 35 to 40 minutes. Remove from the oven and spread over the top of any kind of fruit preserves, then make a meringue of the whites of the eggs and flavor the same as the pudding. Spread this over the top and brown lightly in the oven; serve with hard sauce.

## DEER PARK RATEPAYERS WANT ONE-FARE SERVICE

At a Meeting in the Schoolhouse Last Night the Matter of More Equable Transportation Was Discussed-Controller Maguire Advised Association Against Hasty Action.

Gibson, deputy minister of mines, in the chair. Among those present were W. J. Hill, W. J. Thomson, J. Nelson, W. Michell, W. D. McDervel, Messrs. Sanderson, Crown, Gibb, E. Grainger, and J. J. Cdok.

In his opening remarks the president recited the history of the Ratepayers' Association. It was launched at the time when the annexation movement was alive, and since then had done good work for the district, as they had presented their claims to the city council from time to time, with the result that Deer Park now has watermains, sewerage, permanent paved roads and sidewalks. More than that, they were successful in retaining their public library, which has also been to a large extent augmented. The business before the association was, he said, to claim the location of a park in that district. He deplored the fact that with the widening of St. Clair avenue land had been sacrificed. The association has not yet outlived its usefulness. There is always something which can be improved, and the many associations thruout the city are proof of this fact, for many things need to be done, in the shape of planting trees and shrubs, erecting fences, and numerous other things which will tend towards beautifying the district. As the association had not met for some time, the first business to be transacted was the election of officers, and Mr. Gibson, invited the ratepayers to become members, the annual fee being 50 cents.

The election of officers resulted as follows: J. J. Cook, president; W. J. Hill, vice-president; W. J. Thomson secretary-treasurer; T. W. Gibson, J. Nelson, E. Grainger and W. J. Gaw, executive committee.

It was moved by W. J. Gaw: "That in view of the lack of accommodation in the present quarters of the Deer Park branch of the public library; the library board as early as possible."

Speaking to his motion, Mr. Thomson said he thought that if the Church street library is being disposed of the proceeds might be reasonably devoted to the building of a public library in this district. The motion was carried

unanimously.

The College Heights' Ratepayers' Association will work in conjunction with the Deer Park Association, and both the executive committees will interview the library board on this matter.

Better Car Service.

It was moved by W. Michell and seconded by W. D. McDowell: "That the needs of this district demand the extension of the Toronto Street Railway up Yonge street to Mount Pleasant Cemetery, so that the privilege of travelling within the bounds of the city for one fare may be enjoyed by the people of Deer. Park in common with their feilow-citizens in other parts of Toronto; and that the city council in its negotiations wifth the company be urged to obtain the extension promised years ago by the management of the company."

It was the opinion of the association that Deer Park has paid two fares long enough now, and as the district is part of the city they should receive city transportation conveniences.

W. J. Hill stated that the district could get the civic railway line extended on St. Clair avenue to Moore.

W. J. Hill stated that the district could get the civic railway line extended on St. Clair avenue to Moore Park and connect with the Church street line, and even the Yonge street line may be double-tracked and allow the Toronto Railway cars to run over the Metropolitan system.

Controller Maguire stated that the city had an agreement with the Metropolitan to double-tracked and allow but Corporation Counsel Drayton did not sanction it, as a wrong interpretation might have been put on the Metropolitan franchise. He did not think that the Toronto Railway Company would run their cars to Mount Pleasant Cemetery, and he would not even favor aprpoaching the Toronto Railway Company in this matter. 


